The name Cross Plains prevailed. Because here through the wooded country ran cattle trails to markets up north, routes followed by Buffalo hunters, evidences of abandoned Indian passageways and campsites. Here too crossed military roads leading westward into open

mesas and plains. One nillitary road coming through here ran from Fort Gates to Fort Phantom Hill, and another from Fort Grogan to Fort Belknap. Through here came the circuit rider, the trader, the cattle drover. Crossing of their trails in the midst of the plains meant commerce and communication for the struggling settlement. The name Cross Plains seemed to suit

On Jan. 12, 1911, the Texas Central Railroad ran its first train here and held a town lot sale. The town moved to its present location and took on new growth. City limits now encompass 811 acres and population, according to the federal government's 1970 headcount, is 1,155. Elevation at the high school building is 1,717 feet. There are 602 meters on the municipallyowned water system; bank deposits are over \$4,500,000. Cross Plains Post Office, established July 25, 1877, is the oldest in Callahan County. The town has about 75 business establishments, eight churches and is the largest city within a radius of 25 miles. People are happy and






