If you have not already written a letter to Hanoi asking release of these captives, you are urged to do so at once. A second, or even third letter, would be appreciated. Address your letter to: Ton Due Thank, President of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam, Hanoi, North Vietnam. Ordinary letters require 13c postage for the first ounce and 8c for each additional ounce thereafter. Air-mail letters are 25c for each half ounce.

Rangeland Owners Urged To Go On Trip Wednesday

Plans are complete for a field day to be held at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center at Knox City Wednesday, Sept. 30, according to A. H. Ringhoffer, SCS range conservationist, of Baird.

Ringhoffer, said guided tours are planned through the 30-acre center starting at 9 a.m. Bus trips will run continually until about 3 p.m. He stated there would be a group from Callahan County leaving from the courthouse at 8:30 a.m.

To get to the center, Ringhoffer said, you go north of Knox City on Highway 283 about two miles, then turn left on FM 1292 for two and one-half miles. There are signs at both the turn-off and the center, he said.

Grass seed dealers, seed growers, conservation district directors, research workers, wildlife enthusiasts, livestock producers and others interested in the search for better plants are invited to attend. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma and a large crowd from both states is expected.

Grasses which are attracting wide interest at the center include a desert strain of sideoats grama; a southern strain of sand lovegrass; a western

wheatgrass selected for bottomlands and waterway plantings in west central Texas; a grass called old world bluestem collected from an arid region west of the Mediterranean Sea, and a blue grama selection adapted to the red soils of western Oklahoma and Texas.

A new grass variety, Selection 75 Kleingrass, was certified and released last year as a result of work done at the center in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Other grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include El Reno, Uvalde and Vaughn Sideoats grama; King Ranch Bluestem, Green Sprangletop and Grenville Switchgrass.

Ringhoffer said SCS plant materials work developed ways to harvest and plant most of the range grasses being planted in Texas and Oklahoma today.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in its plant materials work in Texas include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A & M University, Texas Tech University, Prairie View A & M College, Abilene Christian College, U. S. Air Force, U. S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and soil and water conservation districts.

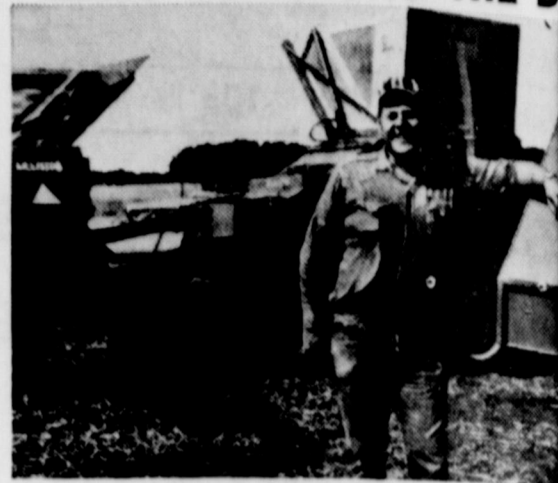

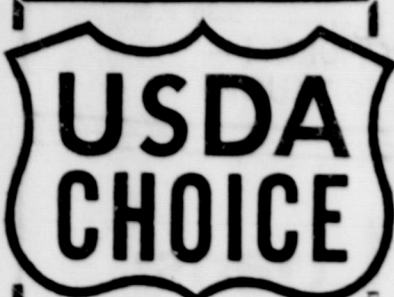

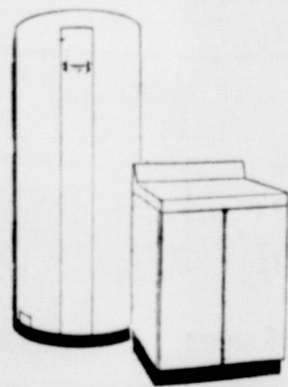

Buffaloes Beat Santa Anna 18-7

Cross Plains Buffaloes rallied from a 7-6 halftime deficit to defeat the larger Santa Anna Mountaineers 18-7 Friday. The victory was the first of the season, evening the Herd's record at 1-1, and the third consecutive triumph over the visitors.

Buffaloes Score

Cross Plains took the opening kickoff and drove 65 yards in nine plays for the first touchdown of the season. An 18-yard pass interference call, on third down and eight, gave Bisons a first down on the Mountaineer one. Fullback Kim Beggs rammed in for the score. A pass fell incomplete on a two-point conversion try. A 30-yard pass from Quarterback Ronnie Pancake to Right End Robert Lewis on first play from scrimmage got the drive started.

Santa Anna countered with a 58-yard drive to the Herd's six before Bisons defenders held for downs. The two squads battled ineffectively until late in the second quarter.

Mountaineers Lead

After taking a Buff punt late in the second stanza, Santa Anna began to send Tailback Dwight Eppler wide, gaining big

hunks of yardage. The Mountie carried three times for 63 yards. Eppler's tally run was a five yard jaunt around left end. Guard Ronnie Walton split the upright with his placement kick and Santa Anna led 7-6 with six seconds left in the half.

The visitors were still point hungry after intermission. The Mountaineers marched 54 yards to the Herd's seven before Buff defenses again became impregnable. From that point Cross Plains started a counter-drive moving 73 yards in a dozen plays before the drive fizzled on the 20. An illegal motion penalty cost Buff Halfback Brad Harris a 28-yard touchdown run, in which he broke several tackles.

Fumbles And Pass

Buff Pancake hopped on his second of three fumble recoveries at beginning of the fourth quarter on the Mounties' 44. Next play he passed to End Lewis who snared the ball with a defender draped over him. He shook loose and rambled into paydirt with 11:21 left in the final quarter. Harris was stopped on a two-point conversion try, but Cross Plains had regained the lead 12-7.

A brief Herd drive bogged

down at the Mountaineer 41, and Cross Plains punted. A Mountie signaled for a fair catch then fumbled the ball. A wild scramble ensued with the ball being batted and tumbled into the end zone where Lewis pounced on the loose pigskin for a touchdown. Again a two-point try failed, but with 7:55 left Cross Plains led 18-7.

An exchange of punts set the stage for Cross Plains holding for downs at the Santa Anna 32. A 15-yard penalty moved the Herd to the Mountie 17, and Pancake found Left End Tommy Merryman with a seven-yard aerial. Next play, however, Mountaineer Rocky Dean intercepted a pass at the two. Santa Anna ran out the clock.
