Address your letter to: Ton Due Thank, President of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam, Hanoi, North Vietnam. Ordinary letters require 13c postage for the first ounce and 8c for each additional ounce thereafter. Air - mail letters are 25c for each half ounce.
