He pointed out that feed grains, wheat and cotton are important farm crops in Callahan County and that exports of these farm products to Japan have gone up dramaticially in recent years.

More than six million tons of feed grains were shipped to Japan last fiscal year - just about one-third of U.S. feed grain exports. Sovbean exports to Japan had a 251 million dollar value, and wheat exports \$136 million. Japan is our best cotton customer, taking onefourth of its cotton from the U. S., and Japan bought \$50 million worth of tobacco from the U.S. during the last fiscal vear.
