Homecoming Sets High In Attendance

They came home in unprecedented numbers Saturday for reunion of former students of Cross Plains schools. The gathering was the first of its kind held in five years and was such an outstanding success that it was voted to wait only three years for the next such homecoming.

A total of 597 ex-students registered, however, re-checks of the sign-up sheets reveal that scores never got around to attending to this detail. They were far too busy, catching up on years of visiting and re-living great experiences on the local campus and in the old home town.

At a business meeting in the high school auditorium Saturday afternoon officers were named to plan the 1973 homecoming. They are Pat McNeil, Jr., president; Noah Johnson, vice-president; Mrs. Tommy Hinkle, secretary, and Mrs. Johnny Pancake, treasurer. They replace Harold Garrett, Jack W. Tunnell, Mrs. Jim Gilmore and Mrs. Oran Bains, who did an outstanding job in organizing this year's reunion.

Junior Ivy of Ingleswood, Calif., a member of the class of 1939, was recognized as the ex-student coming the greatest distance to attend the homecoming. It was the first opportunity many former schoolmates had to visit with him since World War II and his years as a prisoner of war by the Japanese.

Recognized as the oldest former student to register was Mrs. Jim Barr of Cross Plains, who attended school here in 1904.

Chosen coming-home queen and crowned during halftime ceremonies at the football game was Mrs. Weldon Newton, the former Cynthia McCuin, a member of the graduating class of 1957. She now resides at College Station, where her husband is chief entomologist with Texas Extension Service.

Baird Jury Says No To Homicide Charge

A Callahan County Court jury at Baird deliberated only 20 minutes Wednesday of last week before acquitting Ross Wallace of Athens, Tex., of misdemeanor "negligent homicide" in connection with a one-vehicle accident last Dec. 29.

Wallace was driver of a D. R. Pole Line Construction Co. pickup which skidded on a patch of ice and overturned nine miles east of Baird, killing a fellow employee and passenger, Bill Wright of Athens.

County Attorney James Paul Shanks, who prosecuted the case, contended that Wallace was driving too fast for the icy conditions.

Wallace testified that the men were en route to Colorado City to repair telephone lines which had been downed by the year's biggest ice storm. Both men were thrown from the pickup when it overturned into a ditch. Wright's head was crushed when the pickup rolled over on him, testimony showed.

Buff Threats Fizzle As Wildcats Win 16 To 8

Inability to penetrate Rising Star goal line defense and second half turnovers foiled Cross Plains Buffaloes' bid to please a large homecoming crowd here Saturday night as Rising Star Wildcats defeated the Thunder-Herd 16-8.

Five penetrations deep into Wildcat territory were rebuffed. Cross Plains drove to the six yard line in the first and second periods and to the two in the third quarter, but could not get across the double stripe. Two thrusts, to the 11 and 13, in the last stanza failed on lost fumbles.

It was the second straight week that Cross Plains won battle of statistics, but lost on the scoreboard. Turnovers also hampered Wildcat efforts. Cross Plains lost two fumbles and had two passes intercepted, and Rising Star lost four fumbles and had an aerial swiped.

Wildcat Wingback David Middleton grabbed a fumble in mid-air from arms of Right Halfback Tommy Bibb and went the final two yards of the four-yard play to score Rising Star's first touchdown. It culminated a 55-yard drive in 11 plays. Quarterback Dick Clarke passed to Tight End Larry Alford for the two-point conversion with 9:55 left in the second quarter.

Two Rising Star turnovers led to the only Cross Plains tally. Linebacker Donny Dillard intercepted a Clarke pass and returned it 26 yards to the Rising Star 27, but in five plays Buffs surrendered possession on the six. Next play Buff defender Robert Lewis pounced on a Wildcat fumble at the same place. Right Halfback Brad Harris got three yards. Bill Melton, regular center playing as fullback, rammed over with 5:04 left in the first half. Left Halfback Rodney Renfro scampered through a big hole opened by Buff right side for the tying two-point

conversion.

The two teams went to dressing rooms at intermission deadlocked 8-8, but not before Cross Plains had engineered a 62-yard drive to the Wildcat six as time ran out in the half.

Rising Star came back strong in early stage of the second half. The Wildcats took the opening kick, marching 50 yards in 10 plays for the winning margin. It all started as Bibb almost broke loose on the kickoff return. He then climaxed the drive with a five-yard sweep of left end with 8:04 left in the third period. He went up the middle for the two points but fumbled. Wildcat Randy Goldston fell on the ball.

Buffaloes retaliated moving 59 yards in 10 plays, primarily on Renfro's 32-yard romp around right end. The drive fizzled at the two.

Guard Darrell Walker put Buffs' next thrust into operation with a fumble recovery, forced by Buff Oliver Robertson, at the Wildcat 33. Four plays and 20 yards later Wildcat Danny Cook gobbled up a Buffalo bobble. Cross Plains took a Wildcat punt and made another thrust. It carried 35 yards in two plays on runs of 25 yards by Harris and 10 yards by Renfro before two plays later Wildcat Mike Childers smothered another Bison fumble.

A last desperate try by Cross Plains, coming after an unidentified Buff picked up a Rising Star fumble at the Buff 44, was foiled when Wildcat Clarke intercepted a Bison pass with about 25 seconds left.

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Star Church Died By Fire

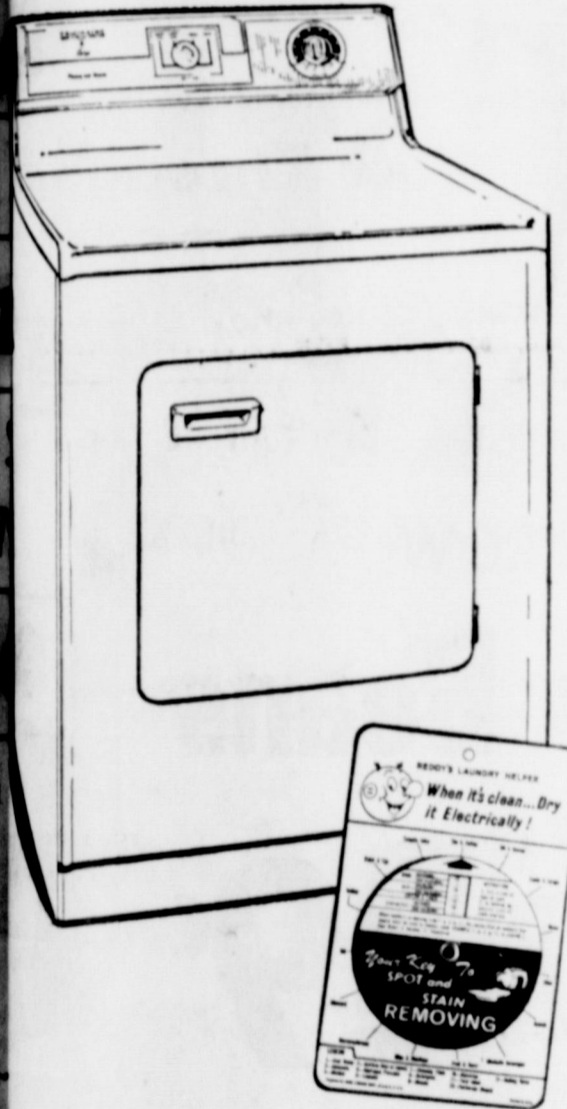
