# Former Local Lady Exhibits Jewelry At TWU In Denton

A jewelry exhibit by Miss Ida Neil Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Williams of Cross Plains, is being featured on the campus of TWU at Denton. Miss Williams, a graduate of TWU, is art consultant for Texas Education Agency at Austin.

In addition to her work at TWU, she has studied jewelry at the Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts at Gatlinburg, Tenn., which is a school operated jointly by the University of Tennessee and the Pi Beta Phi Sorority.

Included in the exhibit which will be on display until Dec. 1 are constructed, forged, and cast pieces of silver jewelry with a few being a combination of these methods of working. Miss Williams prefers the constructed and forged methods to the lost wax casting method.

Working directly with the silver in sawing, shaping, forging, soldering and polishing the metal gives her more satisfaction and pleasure than casting. For in the casting method, the only actual work with the metal is in cleaning and polishing the cast piece. Therefore, most of the exhibit is of constructed pieces. Since she likes to design necklaces, numerous one are in the show and many are set with stones. Good design is basic to all pieces on exhibit for she believes that good de-

sign and craftsmanship are inseparable.

Jewelry by Miss Williams has been accepted for the Texas Craftsmen's Exhibit, Dallas Museum of Fine Arts; Southwest Regional Crafts Exhibit, Santa Fe, N. M.; Craftsmen's Fair, Asheville, N. C., and the Dogwood Arts Festival, Knoxville, Tenn.

Miss Williams is a former art teacher in the Austin Public Schools. She has been active in professional art organizations in the state, serving as treasurer, vice-president and president of the Texas Art Education Association and currently is a member of the TAEA Council.

She has also served as vice-president and president of the Austin Art Education Association. She has been a member of the Council of the Western Regional Association and the Representative Assembly of the National Art Education Association and served on numerous special professional committees, both state and national. Also, she is a member of the American Craftsmen's Council.

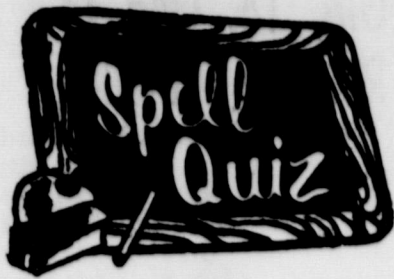
