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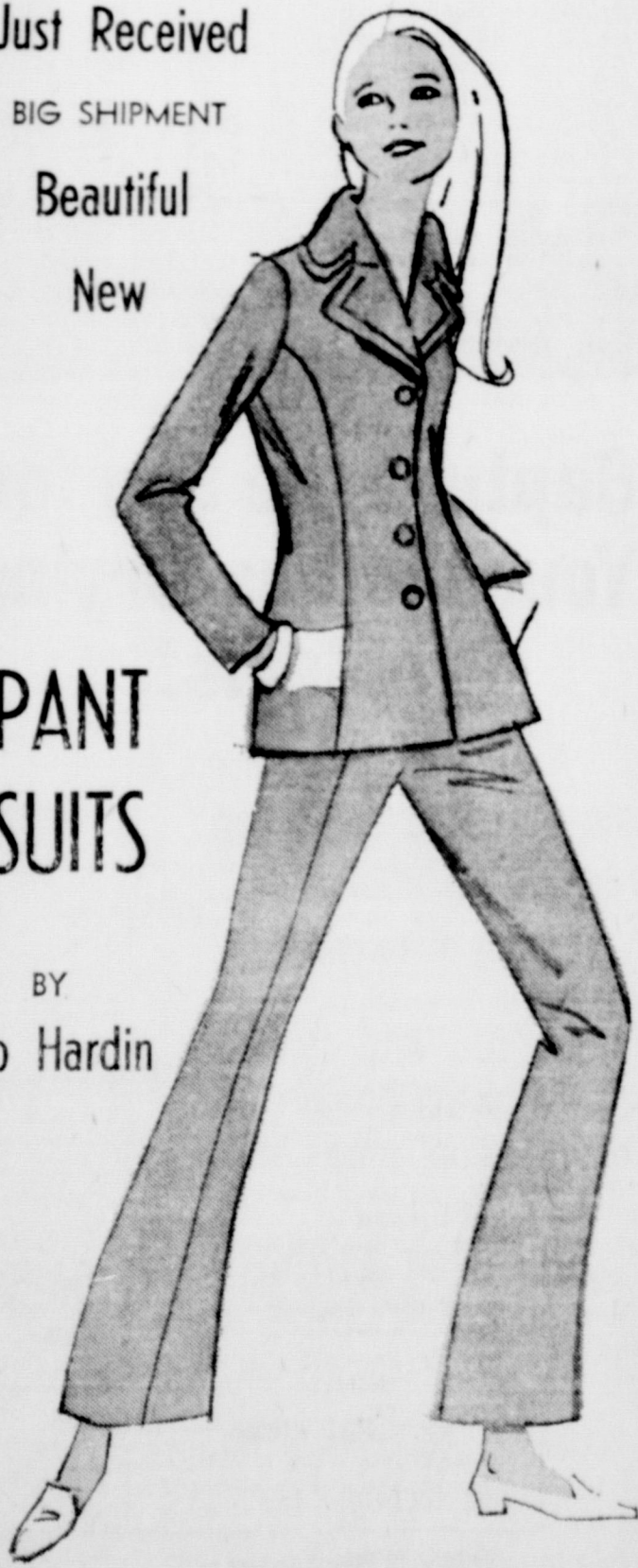

Youth Center Sought By C.P.H.S. Students

Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce went on record Tuesday at noon as endorsing a Youth Center to be established by local students in the McGowan Building on East 8th Street.

A committee of students had prepared a tentative proposal regarding the center and issued copies to business and professional men at Tuesday's meeting. Their proposal touched upon 13 points and was as follows:

1. A panel of adults (4 or 5) will do the actual administrative duties connected with the Center.
2. A panel of students (4 or 5) will also be appointed to help the adults with decisions concerning the administrative duties.
3. An adult will be present any time that the facilities are open for business.
4. The actual taking care of the building, policing the area and keeping the youths in line will be done by the students themselves.
5. In the beginning, the activities available will be a ping-pong table, pool table, shuffle board and small gym. Later, when it is possible, the activities will be broadened.
6. A local police officer will make frequent checks of the facilities to make sure that it is running smoothly.
7. An age limit of 20 years and younger will be set for the Youth Center.
8. Dues will be charged (monthly) and will be set by the two panels.
9. Once or twice a month (whichever is found to be best) a dance will be held.
10. The dances will be held on Saturday nights and only on Saturday nights.
11. The Center will be open on week days after school until 12 p.m. except Wednesday. On Wednesdays the Center will close at 6 p.m. to allow people to go to church. On Saturdays it will be open all day except the days the dances will be scheduled. On Sundays it will be open from 1 p.m. until 6 p.m. (The Center will close on Sundays all day if it is felt that it is necessary to do so.)
12. The facilities will also be available for fund raising activities of the Senior Class of Cross Plains High School. It will also be available to other activities if the two panels agree on it 100 per cent.
13. To help with the bills: cold drinks, candy and sandwiches will be sold.

We students of Cross Plains would appreciate it very much if you would consider this very carefully. If there is anything in this document you feel needs to be changed, feel free to do so. We would be grateful for all the help that you would like to give us. Also, if there is anything that you feel is lacking feel free to add it. The students of Cross Plains would very much like to see this Youth Center get started. As it is now, there is nothing for us to do. We feel that the Center would be beneficial to all of the citizens of Cross Plains.

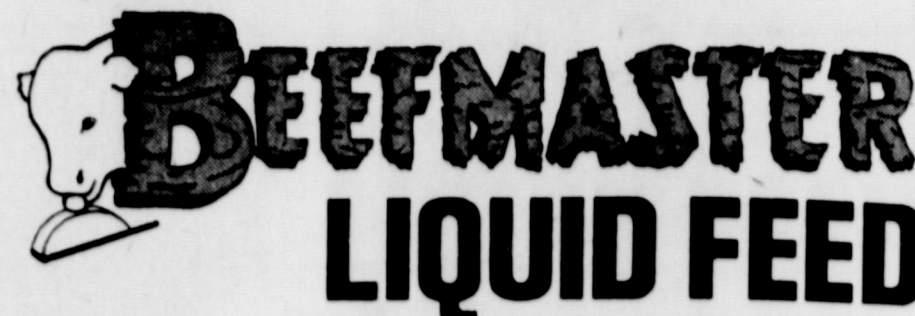

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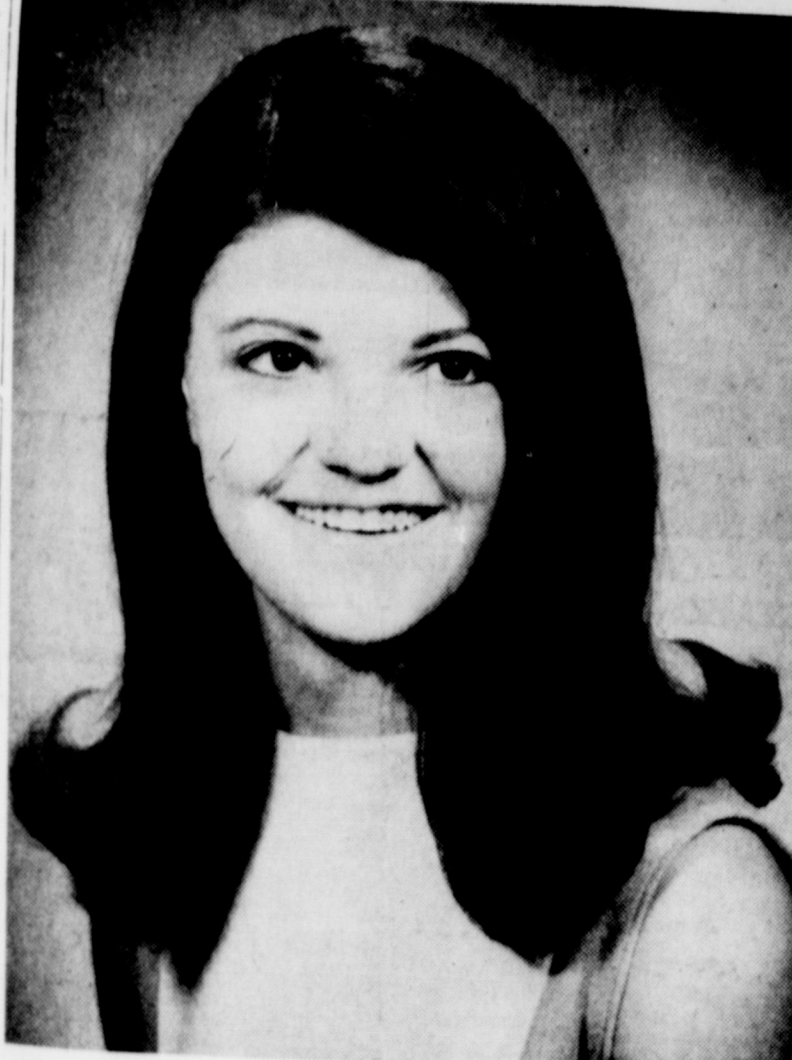

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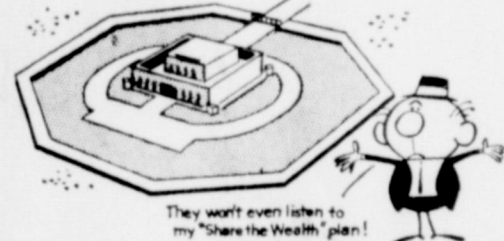

Herd Whips Early 20-6 For First 10-A Victory

Cross Plains Buffaloes captured first District 10-A win, a 20-6 verdict over Early Longhorns, here Friday night after a shakey start.

The triumph, coming on parents' night, lifted Buff record to 2-6 on the season and 1-2 in 10-A competition.

Turnovers played a big role in the outcome. Cross Plains scored one touchdown on a fumble recovery, and halted two deep Early threats with bobble recoveries. The Herd stuck almost entirely on the ground, gaining 247 yards rushing. Early was limited to 71 yards rushing, but got another 46 through the air.

Longhorns Drive

Early took the opening kick and marched 40 yards to the Buff five before an unidentified Herdsman fell on a loose ball. Cross Plains unleashed a promising drive only to lose possession on a fumble 45 yards upfield. The Early attack carried to the Bison six where another misque gave Cross Plains the ball again.

Midway of the second quarter The Herd held for downs at its 35, and marched 65 yards in 10 plays for its first touchdown. Right Halfback Brad Harris scampered the final seven yards with three minutes left in first half. He followed the left side of his line in for the two-point conversion.

Harris returned Early's short punt 25 yards to the Horns' 28, but six plays later time ran out as Harris was bounced out of bounds at the Longhorn two.

Herd Pads Lead

Opening second half a Bison drive faltered at the Early

nine, but on first play Buff Tommy Brown smothered a Horn fumble. That opportunity, too, failed to get points. An Early punt returned 18 yards by Harris got the second scoring drive underway at the visitors' 23. Four plays later Harris knifed over right guard for the tally. Conversion failed with two seconds left in third canto.

Another Cross Plains drive fizzled at the Early eight, but on first play Defensive End Robert Lewis knocked the pigskin from grasp of Early quarterback, and Buff Tackle Joe Sylvester fell on it for six points. A two-point conversion attempt failed with 2:13 left in the game.

Early's Frankie Wilder almost broke the ensuing kickoff for a tally, returning it 47 yards to the Herd's 21. Seven plays later Tailback Kenny Horner traveled five yards into glory land with 20 seconds left. A completed pass failed to get necessary yardage on the two-point conversion try and final score stood 20-6.

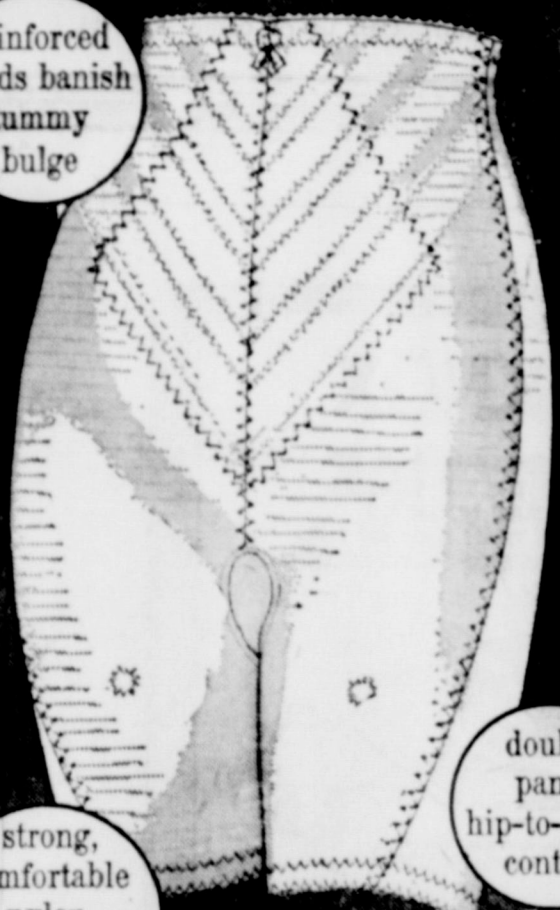

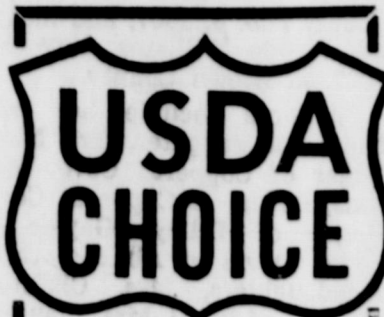

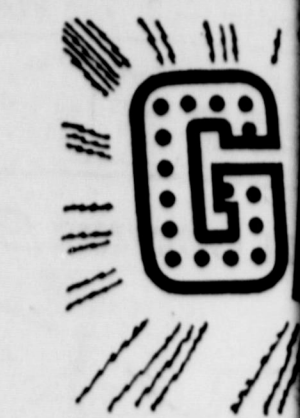
