The Rev. Mr. Herrington has launched an appeal for funds to make the building suitable. "It will take about \$500," he estimated.

Present plans call for operating the Center on a membership basis. The fee will be \$1.50 to join and monthly dues of 50 cents. This money will be used to help pay utilities, rent and functions to be scheduled at the facility.

"Our rules of operation are not yet complete in all details," the Rev. Mr. Herrington said Monday, "however, we plan to issue membership cards and to have youngsters sign in when they arrive and time of departure; this is intended for the benefit of parents who may wish to know when and for how long their children are at the place of public recreation."

"We welcome support and suggestions from everyone," the minister said.

## OIL VITAL FACTOR IN LOCAL ECONOMY

Callahan County's petroleum industry produces 1,620,630 barrels of crude oil valued at \$5,200,908 and 1,587,313 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$217,462 for an annual economic value of \$5,418,460.

These figures, just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, show the county ranked 125th among state counties in oil and gas production during 1969.

Texas production which has registered an increase over each previous year during the past decade hit another all-time high in 1969 with 1,151,775,000

barrels, according to U.S. Bureau of Mines statistics. This is a production increase of 24.2% since 1960.

"Production from Callahan County helped meet this record demand," says Kenneth E. Montague, association president.

"We are now calling on it and the rest of Texas to meet an even greater demand as events in the Middle East have again forced us to dip into our declining reserves. Unfortunately, the price for Texas oil is inadequate to stimulate exploratory drilling to replace reserves."

Callahan County landowners and others with mineral inter-

ests received \$677,308 in royalty payments last year. Texas received \$239,246 from crude oil production taxes and \$15,440 from natural gas production taxes.

Estimated drilling totaled \$2,585,762 with \$1,082,610 of that amount spent on dry holes yielding nothing for the driller. Ira Rinehart's Yearbook showed drillers completed 56 oil wells and 69 dry holes. Eighteen wildcats were drilled with 17 of them dry.

Seventy-one persons are employed by the oil and gas industry in this county with an annual payroll of \$275,324.

North Putnam Area**

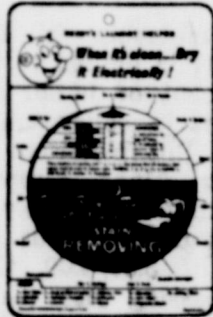

**County's 22 Mishaps Leads D.P.S. District**

Callahan County led the Department of Public Safety District 4B2, encompassing Callahan, Eastland, Shackelford and Stephens Counties, in total number of highway mishaps during October with 22, according to a report from Sgt. Jerry Mathews of Eastland.

Eastland County accounted for about 80 per cent of the district's property damage, \$49,780 for a total of \$62,155, in 19 mishaps. Shackelford had \$5,690 damage in 12 crashes, and Stephens had \$990 in four mishaps. Callahan's damage total was \$5,695.

No fatalities were recorded in this district in 13 personal injury accidents in which 24 persons were hurt, 11 in Eastland, 10 in Shackelford and three in Callahan.

Fifty-seven crashes were reported to the Highway Patrol, and property damage resulted in 44 instances.
