The allotment of funds was made available for fiscal year 1971 under the provisions of Part A of Title I, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act which provides special programs for educationally disadvantaged children.

District champion Goldthwaite and runner-up De Leon hogged positions on first offensive and defensive units of District 10-A all-district football teams chosen by league coaches at De Leon last Wednesday.

Two Cross Plains gridders were picked on second teams. Brad Harris, senior and son of Bob Harris, was named as a running back on the second offensive unit and as a defensive back on the second unit.

Bill Melton, senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Melton, was picked as an interior lineman on the alternate defensive squad.

Goldthwaite grabbed five spots on first offensive and main defensive units. De Leon got two places on offense and three on defense. Ranger captured three defensive slots and Early got one spot on each team.

Three Goldthwaite Eagles doubled on first offensive and defensive squads. They were Kennon McLean, Scott McLean and Sam Watson. David Gilder, a unanimous pick, doubled for De Leon, and Rocky Ford earned a berth on each unit for Dublin.

Albany, Eula Grab Local Cage Titles

Eula girls and Albany boys won championships of the Cross Plains High School invitational basketball tournament held last week end.

Runners-up were Rising Star girls and Cross Plains boys. Cross Plains Buffettes captured the consolation trophy in feminine division, and Talpa-Centennial won boys consolation crown.

Albany was extended to two overtimes by Cross Plains before carting off the championship trophy. Buffaloes finally bowed 66-64. Regulation play ended in a 54-54 deadlock after 23-29 deficit at intermission. First overtime saw both quintets tally six points for a 60-60 stand-off. Robert Lewis copped scoring honors with 23 points,

and Albany's Melvin Hudman hooped 14. Other Buffs in double figures were Ronnie Pancake 19 and Tommy Merryman 15.

Bison gained the finals berth by thumping Santa Anna 56-37, and rallying in the fourth quarter for a 42-33 decision over Rising Star in that game Buff Ronnie Pancake hit a bucket from the back court with one second left. Albany earned its championship with preliminary wins over Talpa-Centennial 67-44 and Eula 72-46.

Eula Girls Win

Eula girls romped to three easy victories in picking up the diadem. In the finals Saturday the Callahan County sextet bounced Rising Star 45-32. Nita Rock paced Eula scoring with 13 points, and Ruthie Wilson had 13 for the losers. En route to the top laurel Eula blasted Putnam 57-12 and rolled past Talpa-Centennial 50-37. Rising Star girls defeated Bangs 40-24 and nipped Santa Anna 38-35 to gain the runner-up spot.

Consolation Winner

Cross Plains Buffettes took an early lead and kept it for a 52-35 victory over Albany and consolation crown. Terry Edington led Cross Plains scoring with 35 points. After bowing to Santa Anna 31-36, Buffettes slapped Bangs 44-29 for the consolation berth.

Talpa-Centennial boys came from behind in the second half to grab consolation crown by defeating Bangs 34-25. Bangs left a intermission leading 17-13. Following the opening loss to Albany, Talpa-Centennial decided Putnam 47-23.

All-tournament teams, five boys and six girls selected by a committee, were announced and team trophies awarded after completion of the boys championship game.

Feminine sextet was composed of Pat White of Rising Star, Terry Edington of Cross Plains and Favor of Eula, forwards; and Diane Helms of Eula, Norma Merrill of Cross Plains and Dean of Santa Anna, guards.

Boys all-tourney quintet was composed of David Lane of Talpa-Centennial, Dick Clarke of Rising Star, Ronnie Pancake of Cross Plains and Rocky Hagood and Lackey of Albany.

Head Coach Mack McConal expressed his appreciation for fine cooperation during the tournament. He said that the more than 200 athletes and other young people conducted themselves in a sportsmanlike manner, and only trouble was brief temper flare-ups, expected in heated competition.

\$444,000 Annually Claimed Paid County's Needy War Veterans

An indication of how much money is being spent annually to aid Callahan County's war veterans and their families may be gleaned from the latest government figures.

They show that expenditures in the form of cash benefits and services are at an all-time high, locally and elsewhere.

An estimated \$444,000 in financial aid of various kinds

went to needy local veterans and to the dependents of deceased veterans during the past fiscal year.

The figure was derived from detailed data for the State of Texas, released by the Veterans Administration in its report for the year.

Among the benefits received, in addition to pensions and compensation, were hospital

and health care, education and training, business and housing loans, insurance and various others.

The local expenditure for pensions and compensation alone, related to the veteran population of Callahan County, was equivalent to \$336 per living veteran.

This was arrived at by dividing the total outlay by the num-

ber of local veterans, which the VA places at 1,320.

Throughout the State of Texas, which has a veteran population of 1,354,000, the amount so spent was \$455,518,000.

A breakdown of the \$444,000 in benefits going to those in the local area shows that approximately 62 per cent of it was for pensions and compen-

sation to living veterans and to the dependents of former veterans. Nationally, the ratio was 57 per cent.

According to annual report, some \$9.16 billion was spent in the United States in fiscal 1969 to provide benefits and facilities for the 27,300,000 living veterans and for the dependents of deceased veterans.

With the number of them on

the rise in all sections of the country, due to the war in Vietnam, Congress has been urged to step up the amount of assistance provided for them.

Special action has been sought to aid newly discharged veterans to improve their career opportunities through vocational or academic training so as to enable them to find satisfactory employment.

Survivors include his wife, two sons and an adopted daughter; two sisters, Mrs. R. C. Durringer of Alpine, Calif., and Mrs. A. J. Gensley of Cross Plains; three brothers, John, Moorman and George, all of California.

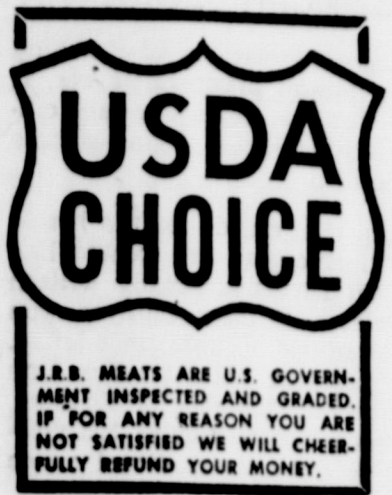

Callahanian's Load State-Local Tax Bill

study made by the Commerce Clearing House, an authority in tax matters, utilizing data compiled by the Department of Commerce.

The finding is that it takes more money than ever before to operate the various state, county and municipal governments and provide the public with necessary services in the fields of education, sanitation, health, welfare, roads, libraries, police protection and the rest.

Because of special local conditions, such as unusually large welfare costs, the tax burden is much heavier in some states than in others. It ranges from a low of \$221 in Arkansas to a high of \$576 in New York.

The costs of equipment, supplies and labor have been rising rapidly, in tune with the general inflation, and have led local governments to seek additional sources of tax revenues to meet their bigger needs.

As a result, local and state taxes have been zooming upward. During the past five years, according to Census Bureau statistics, the rise has been 52 per cent.

And, in the last 10 years, the tax load has gone from \$33 billion to \$84 billion, an increase of 155 per cent.

In Callahan County, the state-local taxes reached an estimated total of \$1,800,000 in the fiscal year.

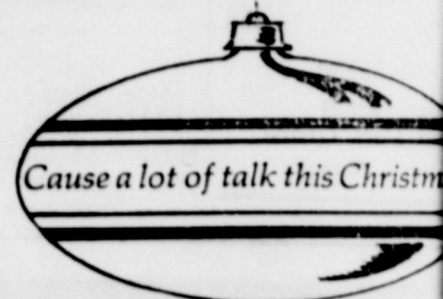

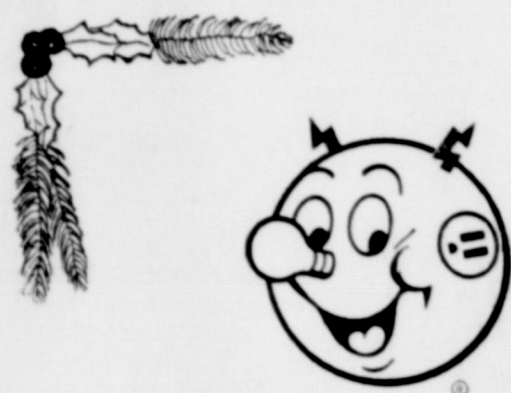

Area Counties Fail To Hit Bond Quotas

No county in this section of Texas now seems likely to meet its assigned quota of U. S. Savings Bonds during the calendar year of 1970. Percentages reached through October were as follows: Brown 61, Callahan 58, Coleman 56, Eastland 48 and Comanche 44.

In Brown County, where H. L. Evans serves as bond chairman, October sales were reported at \$29,404, bringing the aggregate for the first 10 months of 1970 to \$200,984. Brown County's assigned goal is \$330,000.

Callahan County's October sales were reported by Howard Farmer, chairman, as being \$7,493 which brought cumulative purchases for the year to \$75,473. The year's assigned quota is \$130,000.

Eastland County has no bond sales chairman. October sales there were \$20,932, bringing the 1970 aggregate to \$143,022. Assignment for the year is \$300,000.

Comanche County, where Jack W. Moore is chairman, bought \$3,978 worth of bonds in October. The total for the year is now \$70,501. Quota for the year is \$160,000.
