Some Senior Citizens Face Important Date January 1

An important date is near for some area residents over age 65, stated James Smith, Callahan County field representative from the Abilene social security office. This date, Jan. 1, is the beginning of a three month "General Enrollment Period" provided for under the Social Security Medicare law.

A person who is still eligible, but who is not enrolled in part "B" of Medicare, can sign up during the "open" period which ends March 31, 1971, Smith stated. Coverage will be effective the following July 1.

Part "B" of Medicare or medical insurance helps pay for doctor bills, diagnostic tests, and certain other medical expenses incurred outside the hospital he added.

This will be the last chance to enroll for those people born between Oct. 1, 1902, and Sept. 30, 1903, Smith emphasized. Those born before Oct. 1, 1902, and who never enrolled previously are no longer eligible.

A person who enrolls for part "B" during the "open period" will have to pay a slightly higher monthly premium rate if he has passed up an earlier opportunity to sign up.

Burleson Proposes Broad Health Care

Rep. Omar Burleson has proposed far-reaching health care legislation which he said would provide a comprehensive health care insurance plan and better delivery of health care services.

The bill, introduced in Congress Thursday, would make the health insurance plan available to everyone through a system of state pools of private insurers subsidized by federal and state funds, and tax incentives for individual contributors.

must be studied "long and carefully" by the health care industry and others before any action is taken.

Other principal features of the bill, according to Burleson, would:

- Provide preventative as well as therapeutic services to make quality health care less expensive and more accessible particularly in areas where such services are scarce.
- Give health planning agencies greater authority and financial support.
- Improve control over cost and quality of medical care by more effective methods of reimbursement.
- Create a Council of Health Policy Advisers responsible to the President "to provide national leadership in the health care field".

"Few proposals will have a greater potential for altering, for the better or for the worse, the health and well-being of our citizens and the soundness of our fiscal policy," Burleson said.

Eula Water System Has 185 Consumers

One hundred and eighty-five persons have paid \$50 and signed up to have tested and filtered water delivered to their homes in the Eula community. They will be served by the newly-organized Eula Water Supply Cooperative, a non-profit organization which will buy water from the new municipal lake at Clyde.

It is expected to be early 1972, however, before water deliveries actually begin.

Representatives of this board and members of the Clyde City Council were in Dallas last week, expediting loan applications through the federal government's Housing and Urban Development Agency.

The young men, Ricky Westerman, David Hinkle, Randy Shields and Ricky Worley, all students in Cross Plains schools, were downtown Monday night about 9 p.m. when the burglar alarm at W. T. Cox Super-Market sounded. The group saw two men running from behind the grocery on South Main, get into a 1961 black Thunderbird and leave town to the south. The boys hailed a friend passing on Main Street in an automobile, and they went directly to Thomas' house to report what they had seen.

Although the two burglars had not been apprehended at noon Tuesday, warrants for their arrest were issued and charges filed in Billy C. McMillan's justice court here Monday night.

Thomas said that through the observation and cooperation of the four local boys, the burglars

communication with a computer in International Harvester headquarters at Fort Wayne, Ind.

Many Choices

"There are so many combinations in models, engine designs, wheel base, gear ratios, colors and trims," said Dan Johnston, owner of the business, "that it would be impossible for any dealer to keep on his floor sufficient trucks to fill any request that might come in; this computer service allows us to quickly locate what is needed."

While a reporter looked on Johnston queried his computer regarding a particular type of pick-up truck, for which one of his salesmen had a customer. Wanted was a "bonus load" pick-up with 131-inch wheel base, 345 horsepower V-8 engine, equipped with white sidewall tires, power steering and air-conditioning. The prospect specified that the vehicle had to be white with a blue interior.

Johnston dialed his computer number on the telephone, plugged in a contact cable and punched his identification number. He fed into the device code numbers of the specifications required. The mechanical marvel ran a fast search and in five and one-half minutes told him that a Corpus Christi dealer had exactly what he was looking for, and there were very similarly equipped pick-ups in Dallas, Mesquite and Houston. Estimated cost of telephone long distance time was less than \$3.

"I picked up a truck in Searcy, Ark., one day last week," Johnston said, "which would justify six months expense on this equipment."

Rare Feature

An unusual feature of the "computer contact is that it may be unplugged and carried anywhere. It can be used any place there's a telephone.

Johnston, who occasionally travels by plane to various sections of the United States, where he often figures fleet deals, feels the little device which would just about fit in an attache case, will give a handy edge in competitive selling.

Foolproof Thing

Just to test the computer's accuracy and "double checking its honesty", Johnston asked the Fort Wayne

marvel where was the nearest point at which he could pick up a certain type truck. After a momentary pause the reply came that such a truck was available at Johnston Truck & Supply, Cross Plains, Texas. Johnston didn't say anything, but he smiled as he looked out of his office window at the very truck about which he had just inquired. The computer was so right, it was only 50 feet from his telephone.

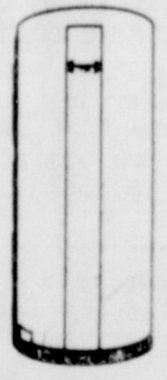

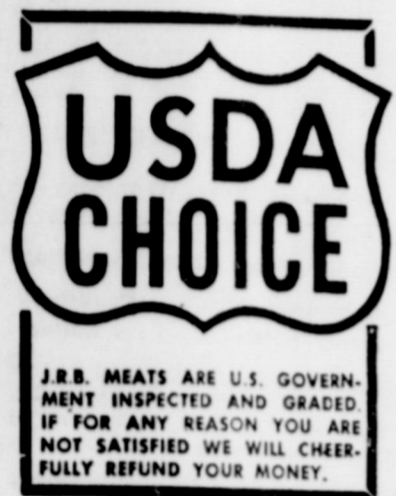

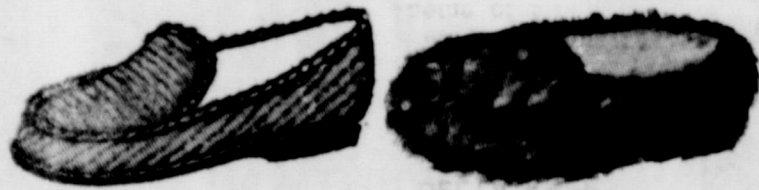
