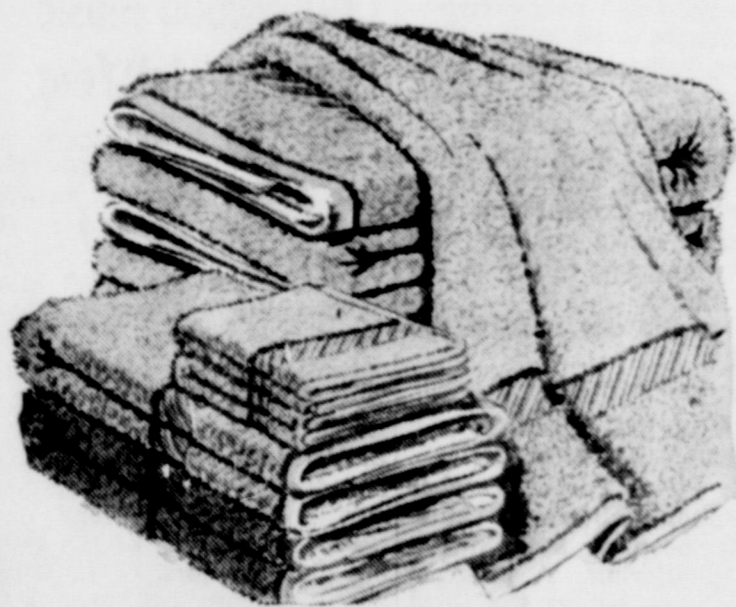

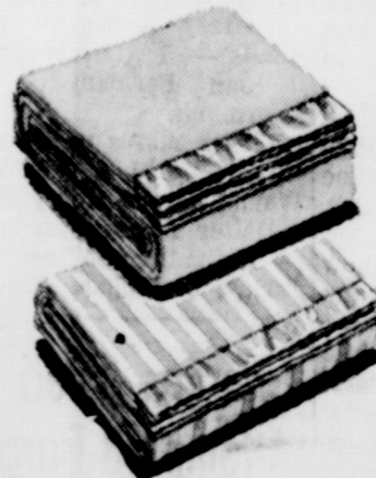

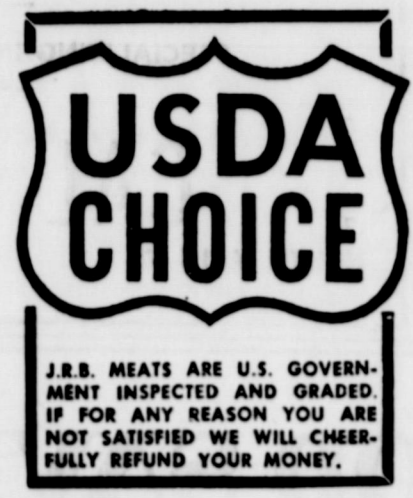

B. Williams, 82, Died On Saturday

Mr. B. Williams, 82, veteran Cross Plains businessman, died at his home at the corner of 11th Street and Avenue D Thursday morning. He had been ill about two months.

Funeral services were held Saturday at 11 o'clock from the Cross Plains Chapel in Cross Plains with the Rev. H. Grady, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church here, officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains.

Williams was born in Cross Plains, Neb., April 15, 1888. He was a resident of Cross Plains for 60 years and prior to that time he lived in Houshington. He was a building contractor here at the time the old Cross Plains was moving to its present location and constructed the first buildings and shops in the present town. He opened a planing mill here and had operated the mill through the inter-war years.

He was married to Carrie Belle Tyson Dec. 25, 1913. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on Dec. 25, 1963. They were attended by many of their friends and kinsmen.

He is survived by his wife of three daughters, Mrs. (Berdette) Galloway of Cross Plains, Mrs. R. G. (Emma) Dumas and Mrs. Ida Bell Williams of Austin, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. (Harrish) Enid, Okla., and Mrs. (Julia) Woody of Houshington; grandchildren and nephews and nieces.

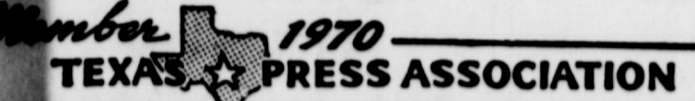

Statement of Nondiscrimination

"Texas Telephone & Telegraph has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. Under this Assurance, this organization is committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color, or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extensions of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and participation in any meetings of beneficiaries and participants or the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization."

"Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D. C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complaints will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations."



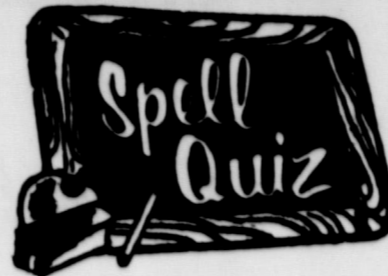
3 Local Musicians In All-Region Band
