Local Sheep Upgrade Best Flocks For India

86 head of registered Rambouillet Sheep from the Cross Plains area are now in the hands of American Rambouillet breeders Association has a membership of 3,500 registered breeders in the United States and at least 100 of the contracted breeders are expected to come from Cross Plains, one of six districts in the United States of the American Rambouillet Association.

Twenty-four head, 20 ewes and four rams, were furnished by Pope from his land holdings in the Atwell Community. Another 62 sheep, 58 ewes and four rams, were consigned by Clyde Thate of the Burkett locality. Both local groups were a part of the first shipment of about 600 head which was airlifted from San Antonio Wednesday night of last week for the 30-hour trip to India. Twelve West-Central Texas Rambouillet breeders are participating in the Indian sale.

Other area Rambouillet breeders participating in the program include T. Knox Campbell of Coleman and Scott Lansford of Blanket. It was reported that consignments were expected from Brown County and Taylor County.

Pope noted that shipments of 600 head will be made about every three days until the entire consignment is flown to India. He estimated that total amount of the completed sale would go over the quarter of a million dollar mark.

First such shipment of sheep to India was made about three years ago. Pope advised, and he added that Congressman Omar Burleson and staff greatly aided handling arrangements of the international sale.

Law Cracking Down On Liquor Violations

Nine minors and one adult were charged with alcoholic beverage violations in Cross Plains last week.

Six counts involving four local high school boys and two junior high school students were filed by City Marshal Chuck Thomas Friday. Patrolman H. D. Welch made four additional charges against three other minors and an adult Saturday.

One count of "making alcoholic beverages available to minors" was filed by Thomas. One youth was fined \$142 and handed a three-day jail term, with the latter being suspended for 90 days, in Callahan County Court at Baird.

Three high schoolers charged with "minor in possession of alcoholic beverages" in City Court pleaded not guilty.

The pair of junior high school boys were charged with "minor consuming alcoholic beverages" in Juvenile Court at Baird.

Patrolman Welch filed three counts of "minor in possession of alcoholic beverages" in local Justice of the Peace Court Saturday. He also charged a Cross Plains man with "making alcoholic beverages available to minors" in County Court at

Baird. He was fined \$242 and given five days in jail on the count heard Monday.

\$250 FINES IN TWO DWI COUNTS MONDAY

Fines totaling \$250 were assessed on two counts of driving while intoxicated, tried in county court at Baird Monday. Probated jail sentences were given in each case.

5 Fires Require 39 Man Hours

Five fire alarms in three days last week required 39 hours and 15 minutes to extinguish, according to records maintained by Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department.

Rural division of the local company spent 33.15 man hours on four blazes, three of which were at the same pasture fire just north of Williams Community. The initial call was responded to by eight local fire-fighters who put in a total of 16 hours and 40 minutes, from 8:45 p.m. to 10:50 p.m. Friday. Three firemen returned to the site less than an hour later and put in another five hours and 15 minutes, aggregate. Again Saturday, from 2 p.m. to 5:10 p.m., two firemen battled the blaze.

Five rural firemen answered a call three miles north of Cross Plains from 1:15 to 2:15 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

The lone blaze in city limits required 30 minutes of 12 firemen's time for a total of six man hours.

Peanut Meeting At Rising Star Feb. 3

He will be followed by Dr. Wendell Horn, plant pathologist, whose subject will be peanut diseases and their controls. Afternoon speakers will be Dr. John Chapin, who will discuss plant fertility, and Dr. Cliff Hoelscher, who will speak on insect controls.

Rates Increased On Long Distance Telephone Calls

Petrons of Texas Telephone & Telegraph Co. are paying increased rates on some out-of-state long distance calls, effective Tuesday at 12:01 a.m.

Harvey Womack, manager of the system serving this area, said the higher rates were re-

quired after the Federal Communications Commission approved requested increases by American Telephone and Telegraph.

New rates are designed to give the customer a discount by using Direct Distance Dialing. In communities not yet equipped for DDD, the same lower rate has been made available on certain station-to-station calls. To take advantage of the discount rates, caller must give operator area code, number being called, have charges billed to calling number and require no additional operator assistance.

Discount station-to-station rates on out-of-state calls placed before 5 p.m., up to 675 miles, are increased between 2 and 10 cents for initial three minutes. There is no increase in rates for discount station-to-station calls to distances greater than 675 miles or on those made after 5 p.m. and week ends. Discount station-to-station rates placed after 5 p.m. and to lesser distances have been lowered as much as 10 per cent.

Customer savings of 20 to 37 per cent on this type call after 5 p.m. and up to 50 per cent after 11 p.m. and week ends.

Major increases involve calls requiring operator handling. Hikes on this type call range up to 15 cents on distances over 30 miles and 5 to 10 cents less than 30 miles.

Person-to-person calls, at any distance, will increase between 20 and 30 cents for initial three minute period.

Bids Received On 2 Area Road Jobs

Texas Highway Department received a bid of \$657,117, submitted by Strain Bros., Inc., of San Angelo for paving State Highway 36 from U. S. 283 — a point four miles west of Rowden — to 10 miles south-east and from Cross Plains to the Eastland County line.

Also a bid of \$495,987 was submitted by J. H. Strain and Son Inc., of Tye, for 150 miles of seal coating on Interstate 20 from 2 miles east of Baird, Callahan County, to .3 miles east of Mexia.

Higher Goals Established For Agricultural Production In This Area

Cash receipts from all agricultural products in Callahan County should be more than \$6,500,000 by the end of 1976, says Greg Gerngross, county agricultural agent.

This will be an increase of 20 per cent over the current cash receipt total of \$5,250,000, according to projections from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This goal is part of a state-wide "3.76 in '76" program begun earlier this year

by the extension service, and is a concentrated effort to have \$3.76 billion in cash receipts before the end of 1976. This would be one billion dollars more than the cash receipts of \$2.75 billion reported in the 1968-69 crop year, which serves as a base for the 1976 projections.

Callahan County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. has issued a resolution designating this week, Jan. 25-29, as "3.76 in '76" week in this county to coincide with

a proclamation issued by Gov. Preston Smith for the special week in Texas.

Guidelines for production and marketing of peanuts, small grain and beef cattle are available in the county agricultural agent's office in the courthouse at Baird.

The 3.76 program was announced in January 1970 by Dr. John E. Hutchinson, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, after two months of intensive study by groups of

specialist who determined long range projections on the agricultural commodity groups produced in the state. The figures that resulted from the studies were predicted cash receipts, not including government subsidies to producers.

After the initial announcement in January, the individual counties were asked to submit their own projections for the end of 1976. Agricultural producers and businessmen were consulted, and the combined

opinions were reported to the extension service state office.

After these estimates were gathered and combined, it was found that the county totals varied only four per cent from the original projections by the extension specialists, according to Dr. W. E. Black, agricultural economist at Texas A & M University.

Dr. Black says that the 3.76 program should be beneficial to Texas agriculture because it gives the industry "something

to hang its hat on".

"Too often the people tend to look at next year," he asserts, "if you look down the road, you know what it takes to get there."

Texas currently accounts for more than five per cent of the nation's agricultural income, but to meet the 3.76 in '76 goal, Texas must increase its rate of growth to 10 per cent of the projected national increase in cash receipts, according to Dr. Hutchinson.



The two sextets played on about even terms in the third period, but Dublin again gained the upper hand in the last canto.

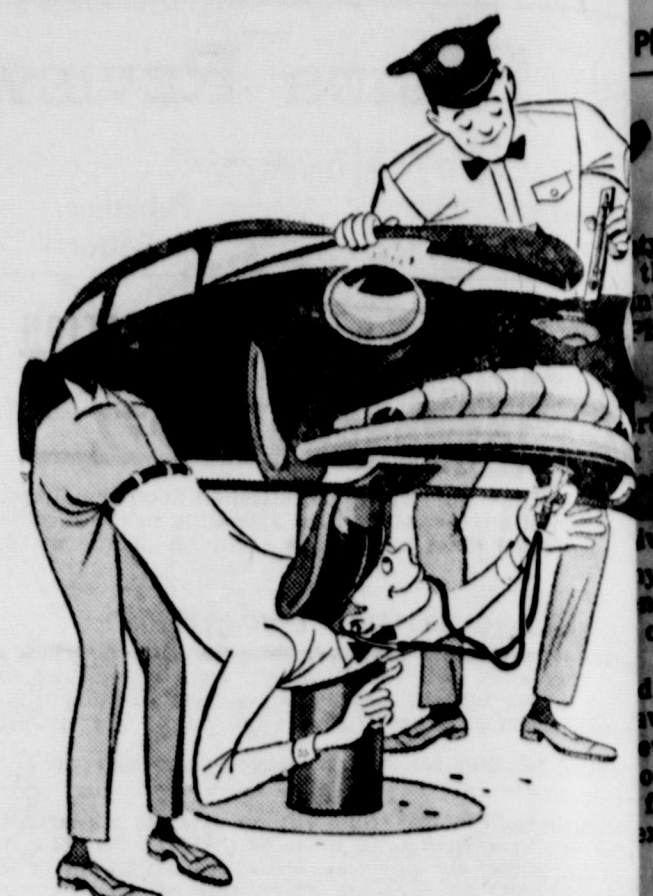

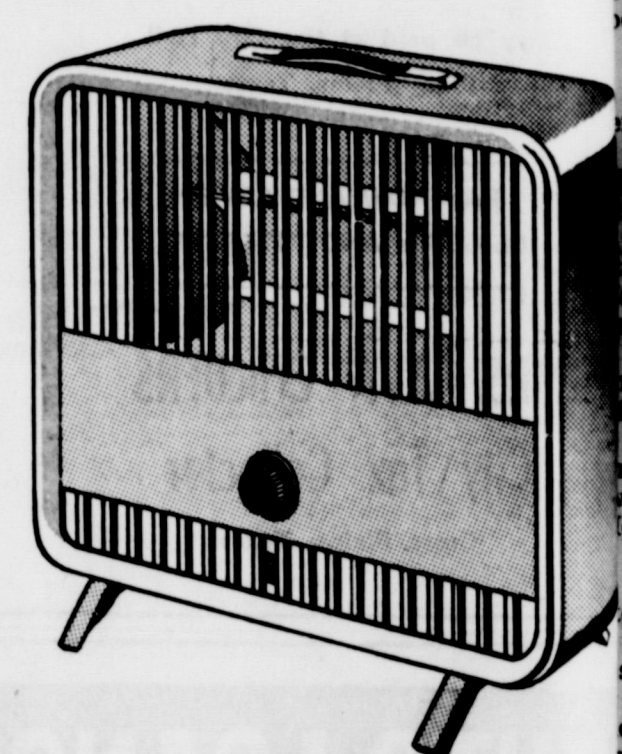

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Joe Hanna Writes Homefolk As Legislature Begins Term

This is my first article written since I have been in Austin, and I hope to have time to write such a report every two or three weeks.

Both the Senate and the House of Representatives were sworn in Jan. 12. For the 31 new members of the House, this is especially important — each member assumes his office officially, and literally gets his office, and maybe last but not least, he is on the payroll.

The new members by now actually know each other pretty well. This was accomplished by having several pre-legislative briefings and conferences just for them. Getting to know the other 119 members will take some time.

One of the most powerful offices in the State Government is the Speaker of the House. The first order of business after the swearing in of the Legislators is the election of the Speaker. Gus F. Mutscher from Brenham was elected unanimously for the second time. One reason this office is important is the fact that all committee members are selected by the Speaker.

These committee assignments were announced on the 21st. Each member awaits with great interest the committees to which he is assigned — I am well pleased with the ones that I received. They are all of importance to the 53rd District as well as to the state as a whole.

My committees are Livestock, Counties, Oil and Gas, Highway and Roads, and Higher Education. The next few days will be devoted to holding organizational meetings, and in receiving their assigned docket of bills for hearing, which will really swing into high gear the work of the members. There are over 1,500 bills to be considered at this time, and it is estimated that the final total will exceed 3,000.

I invite any resident of the 53rd District to use our office in matters pertaining to state government and dealing with state agencies. Anyone being in Austin, I would like to have you drop by the office which is G59 in the Capital. Any correspondence to me can be addressed House of Representatives, Austin, Texas 78767.

If these articles are to have any real meaning, I feel that I should comment on all facts and factors concerning the legislative scene. I have in mind at this time the insurance stock transactions of some of our public office holders.

Actually, all that I know of the affair is what the press has been printing. I would assume and hope that a complete and detailed investigation should be made of the whole affair. This casts a bad image not only on those involved, but on all of our state officials.

We have enough hard and difficult decisions to make without adding such problems as these to this legislature.

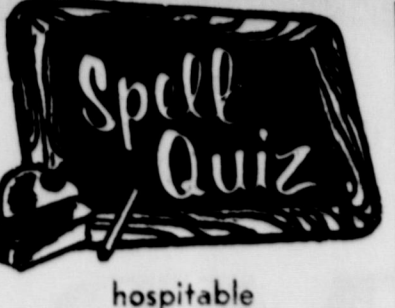
