## New Trucks Update Fire Fighting Forces

City of Cross Plains has updated fire fighting apparatus to comply with directives of the State Insurance Board and did it at about one-fourth of the initially estimated cost.

A pumper truck has been purchased from Johnston Truck & Supply of this city at a cost of \$4,250, but the firm accepted two vehicles in trade, cutting actual cash outlay for the 750-gallon pumper to \$3,450. The new truck, a 1957 Dodge, was originally a part of fire apparatus in Saint Louis, Mo., and was phased out in that city because of a faulty booster tank. The city and the Johnston concern are sharing costs of having a new 500-gallon tank built and installed.

State Insurance Board prohibits credit for any pumper over 30 years old. The board directed the city to replace the 1942 model truck by 1972. It and a smaller vehicle were traded in on the new truck. Initial estimated cost of a brand new truck, fully equipped, ran \$17,500. Sixteen years of service for credit remains in the newly purchased vehicle. It has

a 750 gallon-per-minute rating, and has been approved by the state, having passed all tests in Abilene recently.

Actual saving to the city runs in the neighborhood of \$10,000. Councilmen have agreed to purchase additional equipment for the fire fighting outfits, and estimated cost of it and three radios is approximately \$3,500. Most of the paraphernalia will be used on the pumper to make it better fit local requirements, although some will be utilized to compliment two booster trucks. Necessary equipment has been ordered, some of which has already been delivered, at a cost of \$1,553.10. Major items of expense in the additional equipment are 600 feet of hose, costing \$630, three nozzles, amounting to \$299, and hose reel and accessories, totaling \$310. Three newer model radios will be bought later for two way communication between the units and peace officers.

The fire department also has plans for building a booster truck, replacing a 1953 model, the original unit purchased from donations by city and area resi-

dents to combat rural fires. A two and one-half ton government surplus vehicle was recently bought for \$353.75 from company funds through Baird Civil Defense for that purpose.

Alton E. Hornsby, fire chief, stated that plans call for transferring tank and equipment from the truck being phased

out to the newly acquired vehicle. He added, however, that the old booster truck will not be taken out of service until the droughty conditions in this area have eased. "It will take some time to remove the tank and equipment and place them on the new vehicle," he pointed out.

## Interest Lags In 2 Elections For April

Little interest has yet developed in two elections scheduled in Cross Plains the first Saturday in April. The ballotings are to choose three school trustees and three city councilmen.

Although the referendums are to be conducted separately — because eligibility of voters differs — they are scheduled simultaneously in the City Hall.

Deadline for candidates to announce is March 3 in both instances. Prospective school trustees announce with Dr. Carl J. Schuss, school board secretary, and City Council hopefuls sign-up at the City Hall.

On the school board tenures of Vernon Phillips, Noah Johnson and Roy Neil Tatom are expiring.

City Councilmen whose ten-

ures are ending are Gerald Bowden, Jimmie Lee Payne and Oscar Koenig. Payne has signed a candidacy blank and will seek re-election. Thus far, though, neither Bowden nor Koenig has revealed intentions.

School trustees are chosen for three-year tenures, whereas terms of City Councilmen are two years.

Alton Hornsby will serve as judge of the school election, and Mrs. Zenovia Strickland was designated city election judge.

Holdover members of the school board are: Sobus, Lewis Fortune, Dick Koenig and Tommie Harris. Holdover members of the City Council are: Mayor Doyle Burchfield, and aldermen T. T. Nichols and Raymond DeBusk.

## Jim Gilmore One Of 15 To Author New Sports Book

Jim Gilmore of Houston, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Gilmore of Cross Plains, has been designated one of 15 authors to contribute to a new book to be published by Simon & Schuster of New York. The book will be titled *The Experts of the Shoot-*

ing Sports.

The volume will consist of chapters written by America's foremost hunting and shooting authorities, each author writing about a field in which he is pre-eminent.

Gilmore, who began his writing career on the Review and then went to the Abilene Reporter-News and Texas International Airways before becoming editor of Oil Ways a magazine published by Humble Oil Company, will write and illustrate a 5,000-word chapter on competitive bench rest shooting.

The book is scheduled for publication in September and will be published in hardback only.

Gilmore plans a book of his own at a later date dealing with interesting aspects of bench rest shooting.

## Citations Presented 7 Local Civic Leaders Last Thursday

Seven Cross Plains business and civic leaders received citations Thursday from Texas Industrial Commission and Gov. Preston Smith for having made a "significant contribution to Texas industrial development". The citations were presented by E. H. Sheffield of the commission staff in a meeting at Cross Plains Fire Station. It culminated nearly a year's work toward incorporating pertinent industrial location information on Cross Plains into the nation's most sophisticated computerized site location data bank.

Called "Insta-Site", the commission's computer program has already received two distinguished awards itself from the Southern Industrial Development Council, a professional society covering 16 Southern states.

Participation of local leaders in gathering information for

"Insta-Site", means that information on Cross Plains industrial assets will be instantly available to all industrial firms considering new plant sites in Texas.

Sheffield presented Joe Hanke, Jr., who served as the commission's local coordinator for the project, a massive 88-page print-out containing 1,444 items of information on the Cross Plains area. Local award recipients collected data for 393 items of information on the printout and the balance were collected from the community by the commission staff.

As soon as the local group has reviewed the information and suggested any changes necessary, a computerized Community Analysis Report will be available that shows how Cross Plains compares with other cities of similar size on the factors that industrialists look for in locating new plants.

"The next phase in the development of the computer program is to match Cross Plains plant location resources with a profile of the location requirements of all types of expanding industries," Sheffield said.

"This will enable us at the commission to help you concentrate your industrial development program on companies you have the best chance of attracting to Cross Plains," Sheffield continued.

Statewide, more than 14,000 business and civic leaders in 390 Texas cities will receive the special citations for their part in making the new program possible.

## Chili Supper Adds To Rising Kirkham Fund

Roy Cox, spokesman for the lodge, said that 75 pounds of meat and 20 pounds of beans were used in preparation of the food.

"That, though, was not enough," he said, "we ran out."

There was no fixed charge for the chili; diners were invited to pay whatever they pleased. There is, therefore, no definite way of knowing how many persons were served, Cox pointed out.

Speaking for all members of the local fraternal order, practically all of whom worked in the undertaking, Cox expressed thanks to merchants and indi-

viduals who contributed ingredients and foodstuffs to the benefit undertaking.

"We're grateful to every one who had a part, either as a worker, donor or diner," Cox said. "It's wonderful to live and work among such friendly, cooperative people."

All proceeds from coffee sales last Thursday at the Ranch House Cafe, operated by Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Tension, went to the Kirkham fund. They amounted to \$45.20.

Persons who wish to have a part in helping the Kirkham family are reminded that they may leave contributions at the Citizens State Bank. Thus far about \$2,200 has been deposited to the fund there. That sum, though, is estimated to likely be no more than 20 or 25 percent of the expenses incurred in Mrs. Jay Kirkham's extended illness.

## Girl Scout Troop Trains For Annual Cookie Sale

Dates for 18th Annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale of the Heart of Texas Council have been set for Feb. 17-24. Price of cookies to customers is the same as it was 18 years ago — 50 cents per package or two for \$1.

Mrs. Charles Dillard is serving as community cookie chairman for Cross Plains and will issue cookies to troop cookie chairmen on Wednesday morning, Feb. 17. They, in turn, will issue cookies to girls in the troop. Scout leaders have completed special training for the sale and are now training girls.

Goal this year for Cross Plains Girl Scouts has been set at 1,728 packages or 144 cases. The total Council goal is 7,500 cases.

Profits of the annual cookie sale go to develop and maintain the Council-owned resident camp at Lake Brownwood. Troops retain five cents for each package sold by troop members. 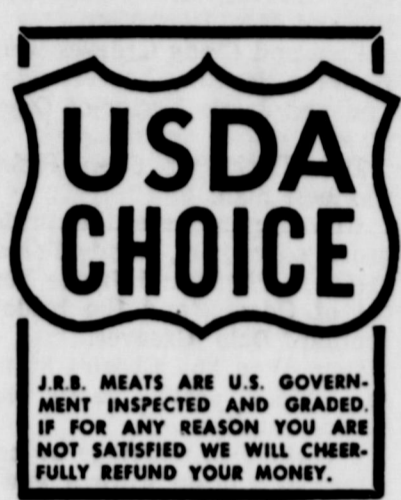

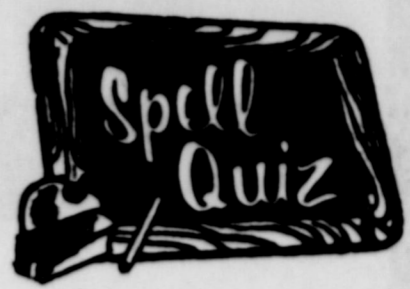
# Light Snow Falls Over Area Sunday
