# PTO To Pay \$650 For School Wiring

Cross Plains Parent-Teacher Organization has contracted services of Hornsby Electric Co. to wire the local elementary school building for 12 air-conditioning units. Cost will be about \$650.

Six air conditioners have already been purchased and installed, but problems arose when the units were installed. The present wiring system in the building was not adequate to operate the additional electrical load and there was a danger of fire. Also there was a danger of possible electrocution of children from an electrical system not properly grounded, the Review was told.

Members of the PTO finance committee indicated that they would use any funds beyond the wiring costs to add more air-conditioners. They also indicated that the PTO will have at least one more fund raising activity this year to help finance the project.

The school maintenance staff installed the units in the windows last summer. They are now in the process of installing a permanent water system to the air-conditioners. They will be ready for operation April 1. Supt. Wayne Ford expressed appreciation for the PTO's financing of the electrical costs.

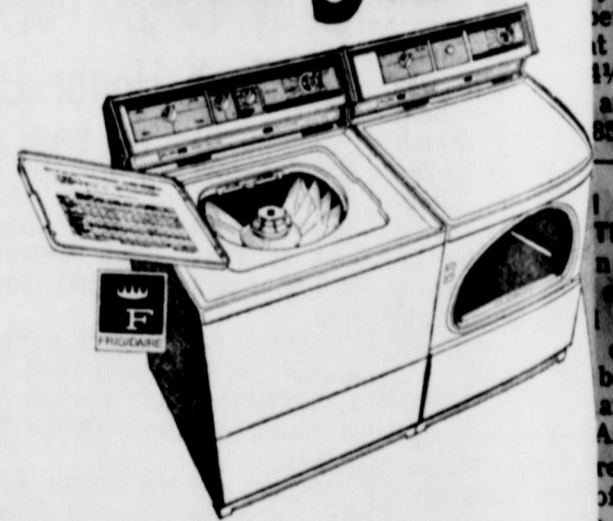

**March 31 Important For Elderly People**  
 People who are age 65 or older on March 31 could be eligible for a special security district enrollment. That date is the end of the current enrollment period for Part "B" of Medicare doctor bill insurance, which people know it provides many benefits. People who had previously refused to enroll with Medicare have the opportunity to do so. Anyone who is eligible to and does so on or before March 31 will have the medical insurance coverage effective July 1971. This is the last opportunity for people born after Oct. 1, 1923, to enroll. If they do not enroll now, they will never be able to obtain this valuable coverage.

People who wish to enroll or want additional information have only to write or call the Abilene Social Security Office located at the Federal Building in Room 2321. The telephone number is 677-5262. An application to enroll for Medicare or whatever information you need will be quickly provided, the Review was told.

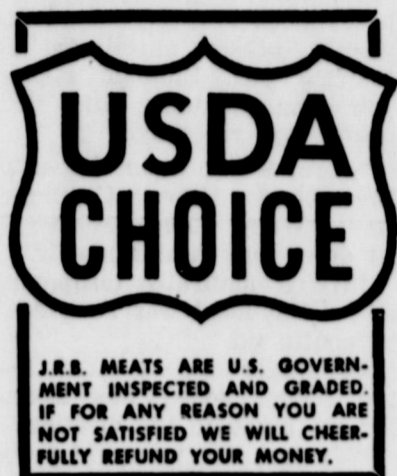
**Oil Well Finaled In Cross Cut Sector**

It is pumping from a 4 1/2 inch casing at 1.851 psi and the hole is bottomed 854 feet.

### Appropriations To Precede Spending

By Rep. Joe C. Hanna

Something new is going on in the legislature this year: a tax bill is to be passed first, before appropriations.

In the past, the tax bill has been one of the last to be presented in the sessions. It was decided it might save the state some money if the tax bill came first, and then let the appropriations committee decide which agency gets what from the money produced from that tax bill, or what ever is available.

We believe it is better to spend within some framework, than not to have any guide when deciding on new and additional services and functions for the state to perform.

Friday, the 12th, was the close of the 60-day period for true introduction of bills.

Two observations are paramount of the legislative systems:

(1) That almost without exception, bills introduced are never exactly what one would like to vote on. Each contains parts that are not to the best interest of the particular member's district. We must make the decision: "does the proposed law contain more good than bad?" With 150 men voting, this is understandable, for each would prepare a different approach to any given subject.

(2) That committees in studying the bills referred to them are thorough and conscientious. Most of these committees have 21 members and when a subject is presented before them, they can ask all the questions needed to understand the intent of the bill and who it will help or hurt. The person or persons presenting the proposal feels that he is on the witness stand being questioned by not one, but 20 district attorneys. This committee work does more to keep down unwanted legislation, by amending objectionable parts of bills, than any other part of the process of making laws.

This shows the interest by the public in the space program. I was able to greet a number of people of our area who brought their children to Austin to see this interesting and educational exhibit.

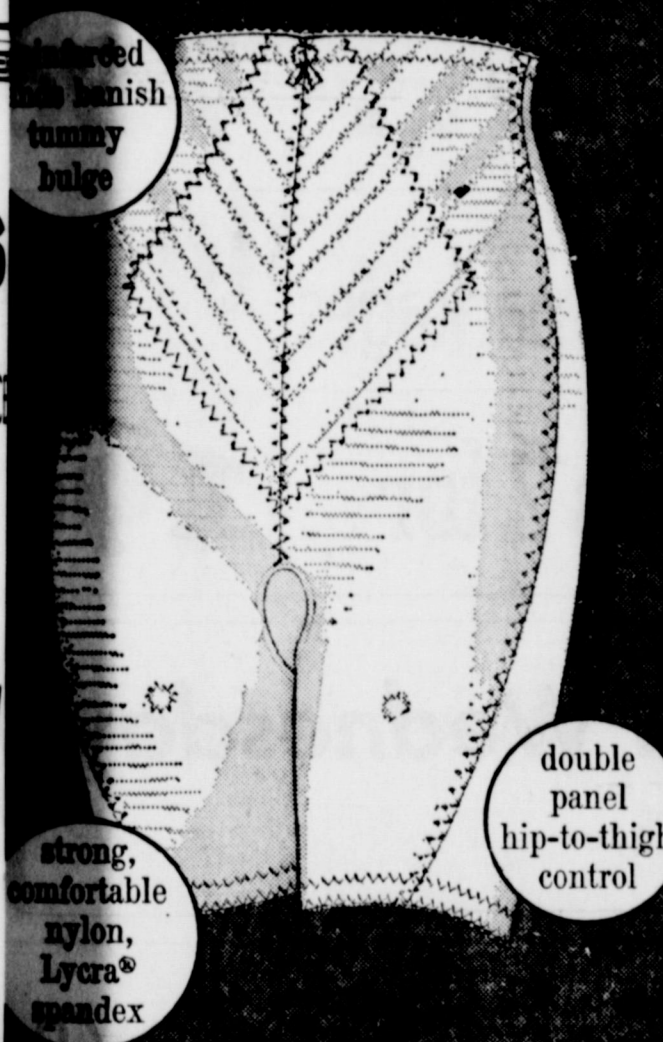
