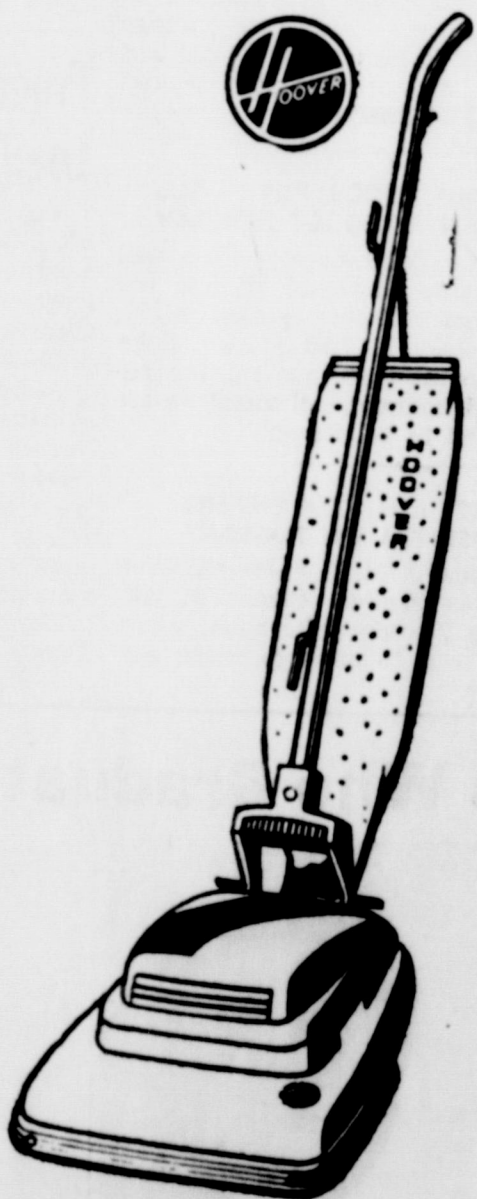

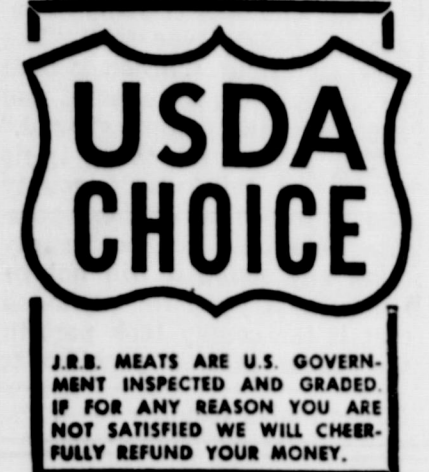

# Dump Ground Problems Plague North Part Of

Unlawful dumping of trash is causing a problem in the northern portion of Callahan County. Residents of that area who live outside the incorporated cities of Baird and Clyde have no legal place to unload their litter.

Trash is being dumped in ditches along county roads, posing a health hazard. Warnings are issued that violators, if caught, will be prosecuted, however, County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. points out that it is very difficult to build a case against anyone for illegal dumping.

"Unless you see someone doing it, how are you going to know who stashed the trash?" he asked.

Although Clyde has a dump ground and trucks pick up refuse in all parts of the town, there is still a problem with some kinds of trash. City vehicles accept only household garbage and the dump ground gates are closed to all others. The trucks take tree limbs when sawed to three-foot lengths but will not haul away brick, stones or scrap building materials.

Residents of Baird have service of city trucks. They may haul litter of any kind to the city dump ground themselves, but must go by the City Hall to get a key for the gate.

Clyde and Baird are trying to solve their trash problems, but if they cannot do it soon, the county may have to take some action, county officials say. That could mean an increase in taxes.

This problem didn't come up suddenly, Emmet Eager, former Clyde mayor, said. It is something that has been building up for a long time. Eager said that for many years Clyde had a city dump ground on a county road about three miles east of town. The dump was operated by the city and was open to the public and there was no problem with trash dumping.

As Clyde grew over the years, however, many homes were built in the area of the dump ground and some commercial operations were started there also. The dump ground became a source of irritation to the people living and doing business in the area.

It also became a health hazard and in the early part of 1968 the Texas Department of Health condemned the Clyde dump ground. It had to be shut down and covered up. This left

Clyde with no place to dump trash, so it turned to Baird for help with the problem.

James C. Asbury, Baird city secretary, said Baird has 160 acres of land halfway between Clyde and Baird, that it has used as a dump for 35 years. In June of 1968 Clyde and Baird entered into an agreement whereby Clyde could use the Baird dump ground. Clyde would pay 66 per cent of the cost of operation of the dump ground and it would be open to the public without restrictions. The agreement could be ended by either party at any time.

During 1970, the amount of trash the dump ground was receiving became unmanageable, Asbury said. Some sort of control had to be enacted, so the agreement with Clyde was ended and the gates locked.

Again Clyde was left with no place to put its trash.

Clyde bought 20 acres of land north of town for a dump. People in the area objected, and the Texas Department of Health was brought into the matter again. The land was said to be unusable as a dump ground. It would create a health

hazard, authorities said, so the land was sold.

Judge Dyer pointed out that any action the county might take would be up to the Commissioners Court, but he suggested two possible ways in which the county might take part in the problem.

"If Clyde can find a permanent dump ground site, then the county might subsidize both the Baird and Clyde dump grounds and make them open to all Callahan County residents," Judge Dyer said. "The other possible solution would be for the county to build and operate a county dump ground."

The judge said there is no money in this year's county budget for either of these possible solutions. If the county takes any action it will not be before next year. He explained that if the county took part in the dump ground problem it

## HOME AND FAMILY HINTS FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Garnish the dress up a meal like Easter finery does a girl. Try one of these for a dress up Spring ham.

Spread a green onion top to create a branch pattern and put "petals" of halved grapes, halved preserved Kumquats, thin radish rounds, or maraschino-cherry halves at the tip and along the sides of the "branches".

Make a basket pattern with wedges of orange slices and fill it with candy-coated almonds or jelly beans. Make a handle for the basket with thin strips of orange peel braided together. Use maraschino cherry centers in snipped marshmallow petals to fill your basket with flowers.

A sliced peach sunburst glitters invitingly atop a half ham. Place slices, overlapping, in a ring and center with a ruffle of almonds, pointed ends down, and a maraschino cherry.

Carrot daisies look so spring-like growing around a rolled boneless ham. To fix them, cut thin slices of raw carrot for petals and green pepper for leaves and stems.

Orange slices, flat and twisted, make an eye-catching garnish for ham steak. Group three slices for a base and top each with another slice that has been slit just to the center and overlapped. Hold all in place with a short wooden pick in the center of each finished off with a perky cherry.

For a flavor plus and professional finish, cover your ham

choice with a glaze for the last 30 to 50 minutes of baking. You might like this one: Mix 1 can (six ounces) thawed frozen concentrated orange juice, 1 cup honey, and 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce. This amount makes enough for a 10 to 14 pound ham.

To keep any of the above garnishes fresh-looking, add them after the meat comes from the oven; glaze will be sticky enough to hold them in place.

By the way, all the equipment you need for preparing and serving that ham is available from Higginbothams — from oven to electric knife!

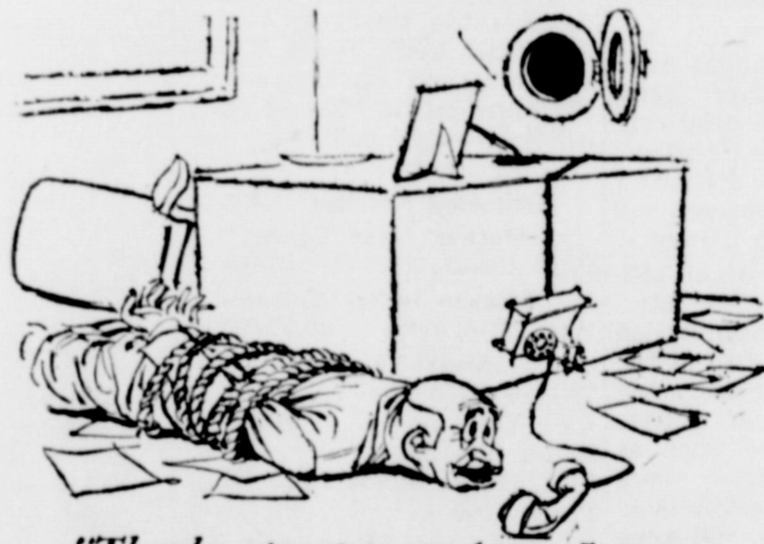

# Hanna Tells Of Changes Due State's Penal Code

By Joe C. Hanna

Subcommittees of the Senate and House studying the proposed new Texas Penal Code have come up with some changes that may make the code more palatable to Texans.

They have recommended restoring the jury sentencing option of the present law, have added a habitual misdemeanor category so that a defendant with two or more prior convictions on a jailable misdemeanor could be sentenced up to six years, and have increased the penalties for trafficking in dangerous drugs, forcible rape and sexual abuse, some theft and robbery, distributing obscene materials to minors and flogging a child.

The subcommittee recommended restoring the traveler's defense of present law, and excluding rifles and shotguns, whether loaded or not, from the proposed code's unlawful weapon possession offense.

Peace officers would be justified in drawing their pistols to make an arrest for a suspected violent crime, another recommendation of the committee, and anyone would be justified in using deadly force to protect their property reasonably.

These are some important changes which were badly needed, and hopefully there will be additional changes.

We had another bomb scare last week. A call was received saying a bomb was set to go off, and this threat was emphasized later when a second caller stated there were two bombs, one in the west wing and another in the east wing.

The building was closed for two and one-half hours while a search was conducted. Fortunately no bomb was found, but it would be difficult to estimate the cost to the state of such acts. This is the second such threat this session. None of these calls can be ignored, particularly since the National Capitol suffered its explosion.

The Speaker of the House appointed the General Investigating Committee, Wednesday. All of the members have served several terms, and Menton Murray of Harlingen, the chairman of the committee, has served the longest of any House member.

This committee will determine the proper action from the evidence produced by the several agencies appointed to investigate the Sharpstown transaction. Due to the very busy schedule that the House will follow in the 54 days left of this session, there will probably be no report until after the session is over.
