





2 Counties Tie In **Buying Of Bonds**

Purchase of U.S. savings bonds accelerated in Callahan and Comanche Counties during March and the two are now tied for leadership among area

Callahan County chairman Howard E. Farmer of Baird reported March sales amounted to \$25,236, bringing the total thus far this year to \$42,832, which represents 33 per cent of the annual assignment of \$130,000.







Passage of bills is getting harder and slower, but not any less interest or less debates in the committees and on the floor of the House.

Liquor by the drink was debated for 48 hours with some 36 amendment attempts to change the bill - not but one was attached. Members of the House were well advised of the wishes of the people of their districts by the vote they had been given on the issue. 
