She plans to attend Cisco Junior College and major in data processing.

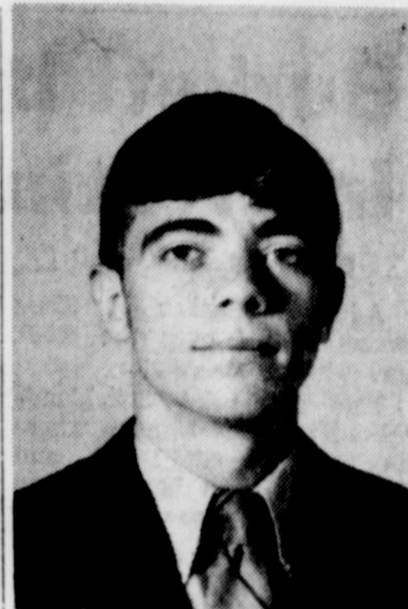


Debra Sue Tyler

Hanna Seeks Federal Aid To Farmers And Ranchers

State Representative Joe C. Hanna, of this legislative district, is part of a five-man delegation now in the nation's capitol to emphasize severity of drought conditions to federal agencies.

Other House members who will present photographs and give the farmers' and ranchers' views will be Representatives, Oscar Carrillo, Sr., John Poerner, Tom Holmes, and Honore Ligarde.

The House committee, according to Rep. Hanna, will urge modification of the pauper's oath. Many ranchers and farmers are desperately needing feed for their stock, but are unwilling to sign the degrading pauper's oath now required to qualify for feed at reduced costs, he said.

The Texas Representatives will also encourage the administration to provide long term loans at low interest rates to farmers and ranchers who must have this assistance in order to survive and to continue to be productive in the future.

The Texas delegation will return to this state Thursday, Hanna said.

Callahan Swine Inspections Set

All swine in Callahan County must be inspected by the Texas Animal Health Commission before moving from farm to farm or to market, according to Gregory Gergross, county agent.

This restriction has been put into effect to isolate all hog cholera cases. The new restriction will include feeder and breeding stock plus all slaughter hogs moved to market.

Gergross points out that inspectors prefer to work this area on Friday and Saturdays, however, they will be available any time needed. The inspectors, home addresses and telephone numbers are as follows: Leroy Williams, Burkett, 915 784-5807; Ed Compton, Albany, 915 762-3233; Tye Brown, Coleman, 915 625-2905; Sam West, Hamby, 915 548-4744.

Feeder pig permits will be good for seven days and slaughter hog permits will be good for four days from date of issue. All hogs inspected for movement will be identified with marks on ear tags by the inspector.

Gergross said all swine producers wishing to move hogs are asked to call his office in the Courthouse. Producers' names will be put on a list for inspection.

Constitutional Amendment Election Faces Texas Voters May 18

will go to the polls Tuesday in this election, to ballot on proposed changes to the constitution.

Cross Plains voting will be at the City Hall from 7 p.m. with Mrs. Bill Gilgore serving as presiding officer.

In the order in which they will appear on the ballot, a brief resumé is offered here of the four proposed amendments.

Number one would establish a state Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the legislature, state officers and legislative officials and to investigate vio-

lations; to recommend compensation for members of the legislature and the lieutenant-governor; and to recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process.

Number two provides that the legislature may propose amendments to the Constitution in called as well as regu-

lar sessions.

Number three would remove limitations on the total state appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy blind, and the needy disabled, and sets a limitation on total state appropriations during a fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent chil-

dren and the caretakers of such children.

Amendment number four would authorize issuance of \$100 million in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes; provides for improvement and continuance of the

water resources program, and establishes an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6 per cent.

A facsimile copy of the ballot to be used in the May 18 election will be published in next week's edition of the Review for convenience of voters who wish to study it before balloting.

NEW OILER FINALED IN CROSS CUT FIELD

A Cross Cut Sand well was completed in the regular field five miles southeast of Cros Cut.

The oiler is Pitcock Inc. of Graham No. 1-A Chambers, spotting 330 feet from the south and 700 feet from the east lines of Rushing Survey.

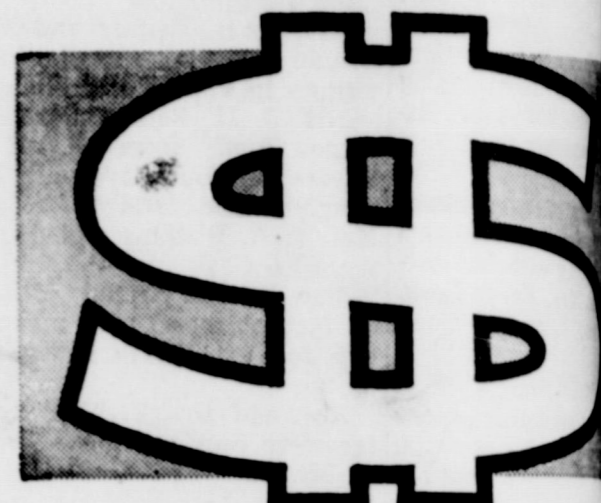

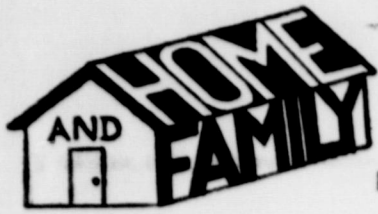

Purchase of U.S. savings bonds accelerated in Callahan and Comanche Counties during March and the two are now tied for leadership among area counties.

Callahan County chairman Howard E. Farmer of Baird reported March sales amounted to \$25,236, bringing the total thus far this year to \$42,832, which represents 33 per cent of the annual assignment of \$130,000.

Comanche County, where Jack W. Moore serves as chairman, had \$7,135 worth of sales during March. That brought 1971 total to \$53,367, which is 33 per cent of the year's quota of \$166,000.

Brown County sales during March, reports chairman H. L. Evans, were \$16,633 which brought the cumulative purchases for the year to \$77,682, for 24 per cent of the 1971 objective.

Eastland County, which has no sales chairman, purchased \$21,885 worth of bonds in March. That brought the county's aggregate for 1971 to \$67,439, or 22 per cent of the 1971 quota of \$300,000.

Coleman County chairman Robert I. Bowen had \$8,129 worth of purchases in March, bringing his 1971 total to \$25,717. That amounts to 21 per cent of the county's assessment of \$120,000.

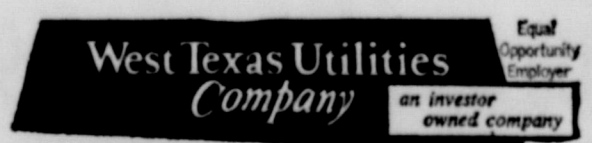

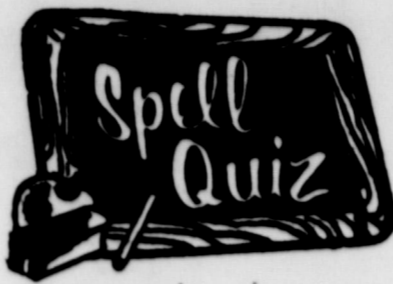
