Post Office Plans Open House July 1

Inauguration of the new United States Postal Service on July 1, will be celebrated in every post office across the country. Postmaster Dick Brown has invited the public to visit the Cross Plains post office at that time.

Visitors will be given a souvenir envelope imprinted with the old and new insignia of the Postal Service. Commemorative stamps will also be placed on sale. There will be a photographic display of modern Postal Service jobs and functions.

Area Riding Clubs Head For Coleman

Cross Plains and Baird riding clubs will be among at least five such groups making trail rides to the Coleman Rodeo, which opens Wednesday night, July 7.

Local horsemen plan to leave here July 6 and ride to Echo Gin and spend the night. Callahan County Sheriff's posse riders will leave Baird on Tuesday also and ride to a campsite on the Bayou, along Highway 283.

Other area riding groups planning a trail ride to Coleman for opening day of the rodeo include Ballinger, Winters and Abilene. All will participate in the downtown street parade Wednesday afternoon and then ride in the grand entry at the rodeo on opening night.

As usual the rodeo will have five main events including saddle bronc, bareback bronc, calf roping, bull riding and steer wrestling, plus the popular girls barrel race. Specialty acts and bull fighting will be furnished this year by the Clark Brothers, Gene and Bobby, who, according to Rodeo Association president Weldon Davis, are tops in their field.

Many Stores Plan Holiday For July 5

Monday will be a holiday for many Cross Plains business houses, in observance of Independence Day — July 4 — which falls on Sunday.

Some, though, including several large supermarkets, will remain open as usual. Among the firms known to be planning a full holiday are:

Citizens State Bank, Higginbotham Brothers & Co., the City Hall, Post Office and West Texas Utilities Company, as well as probably others whose plans were not announced.

Service stations, restaurants and most business houses along the highway out of the downtown district will be open the entire day.

No public observance is planned for Cross Plains in celebration of Independence Day. Some local people were planning to attend the annual Cowboys Reunion at Stamford and others are going to Brady for the July 4th Jubilee. Lakes, golf courses and fishing spots will be sought out by others. Many, though, plan a quiet week end at home and some families will gather for yearly reunions.

Law enforcement officers will be working longer schedules over the holiday week end, checking traffic for strict observance of safety regulations in an effort to curtail personal injuries and property damage.

Financial Statement Not Required To Apply For Livestock Feed Help

Under the federal government's Livestock Feed Program, applicants will no longer be required to file a financial statement when applying for feed and hay transportation assistance. In view of the importance of prompt action on applications, and since the application form includes a certification of need signed by the applicant, the financial statement which required added time and work is being eliminated, said J. C. Earp, manager of the ASCS office in Abilene.

School In Alaska Named For Air Force Hero Known In Cross Plains

By some oversight in military protocol members of the family of Maj. Charlie A. Pennell, who was killed in an Alaskan plane crash nearly 13 years ago, only recently learned that a large school at Eielson Air Force Base bears the name Pennell School in his honor.

Maj. Pennell was the first husband of Mrs. R. C. (Dick) Brown, Jr. of Cross Plains. Their three children Brenda, Pattie, and Chuck, all attended school here. The daughters have graduated and married and the son will be a sophomore at CPHS next semester.

Maj. Pennell died in a holo-

caust, along with 12 other American servicemen, when a C-47 crashed at Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska, Sept. 9, 1958.

Mrs. Homer Robison of Grand Prairie, sister of Mrs. Brown, recently completed a research of facts surrounding the naming of Pennell School and was sent a portfolio of colored photographs of the building and campus. A letter from Congressman James M. Collins brought the explanation that Maj. Pennell was selected for the honor in keeping with Air Force policy of naming installations after outstanding personnel

who gave their lives in the line of duty. It was further explained that Maj. Pennell was deeply interested in schools, the welfare of children, and that he had two young daughters attending the institution which has since been renamed in his honor.

Maj. Pennell, who held a masters degree from Harvard, was a career officer and had completed 18 years of active duty.

Born at Trent, he went to school at Sweetwater until he was in the sixth grade. He then attended high school at San Antonio and Brownsville, graduating at the latter place. He

entered the Army in July 1940 and transferred to the AAF in October 1942. He received his wings as a navigator at Hondo Field Dec. 4, 1943 and from there went to Roswell, N. M. and to Great Bend, Kan., receiving B-29 training at the latter station. He went overseas Oct. 19, 1944.

He was a squadron navigator on a B-29, taking part in the first raid on Tokyo. Based on Siapan, he flew 30 combat missions before VJ Day.

Back in the states following World War II, he was assigned to March Field, and thereafter saw a progression of transfers

and promotions before arriving at Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska, where he was serving as project officer at the time of the fatal crash. He had his family with him there, quartered on the base.

Maj. Pennell's military decorations from a grateful nation included: Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with three bronze oak leaf clusters, American Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Air Force Longevity Service Award Ribbon with three bronze oak leaf clusters.

Pictures of Pennell School reveal it to be an ultra-modern, story and a half brick building, with a spacious snow-covered campus. Pine, spruce and other trees native to the Far North dot the landscape.

The boy who went off to war 31 years ago this month is now a legendary Air Force hero, his name enshrined near his last post of duty. His survivors known in Cross Plains, and his mother, Mrs. Ella Pennell, of Sweetwater, may well be proud of the illustrious record he established in service of his country. Pennell School stands as mute testimony.

McGowen, clerks at the store, got the license number of the get-away car and immediately notified City Marshal Charlie Taylor.

July 8, 1938: Fred Tunnell is completing his first year as head of the local bank. Oldest settler of Callahan County is J. S. Hart, Baird rancher, who came to this area in the late 1860's. One-piece suits with front panels, such as the perky daisy print suits at Higginbothams, create a smooth, long torso look. Figures needing very little control can wear the one-piece suit with no front panel like our intriguing solid black suit with fully slit sides joined by white plastic loops.

The boyleg, of which we have several styles, gives slight figures extra coverage or heavier silhouettes camouflage. Swimsuits with overblouses are comfortable as well as camouflaging. (See the nautical suit with white top and blue trunks.)

Two-piece suits are also ideal for the short torso, or try a Junior size if you have this problem. Low backs emphasize the natural full length of the

Straight-across bandeau tops and wide built-up shoulder straps will support and flatter the full bosom. All-over print designs (How about a flowered version in green and gold or shades of red?) camouflage. Bra top treatments in the form of stand-away cuffs, folds, shirring, ruffling, or anything in the design of the bra that suggests fullness is flattering to the small bosom. Here again we have a selection in both one- and two-piece suits.

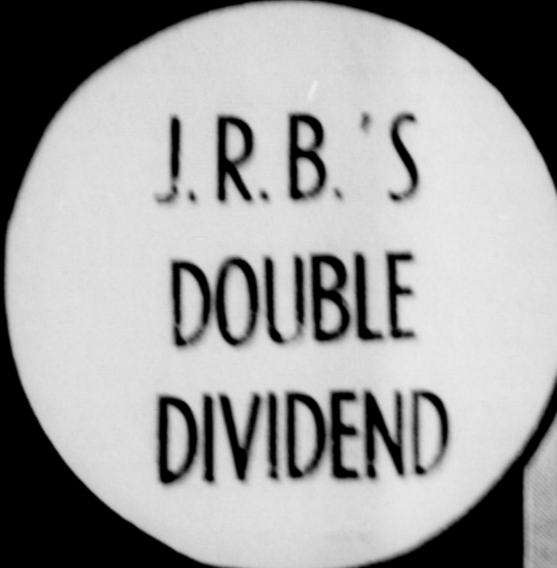

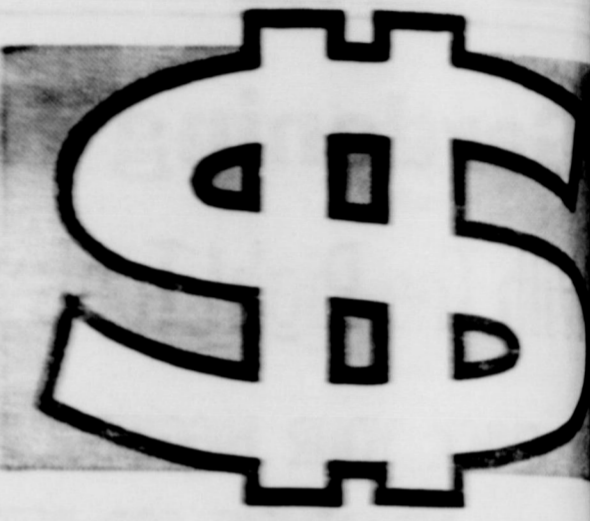

Law Change Affects Local Boat Owners

Boat owners in Texas will benefit of actions by the 62nd Legislature.

Of immediate interest is the new law requesting children 12 or under riding in a Class 1 or Class A motorboat while underway to wear life preservers of the sort prescribed by the regulations of the Commandant of the Coast Guard.

The only such approved life preserver is one U. S. Coast Guard approved.

If a boat is underway, and if the child does not have the life preserver, the operator may be ticketed.

The new law does not apply to canoes, rowboats or sailboats, but these boats after Sept. 1, are required to have an approved life-saving device on board for each person. These were heretofore exempted.

Also new is the requirement that after Jan. 1, 1972, all motorboats must be registered with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, regardless of length or horsepower.

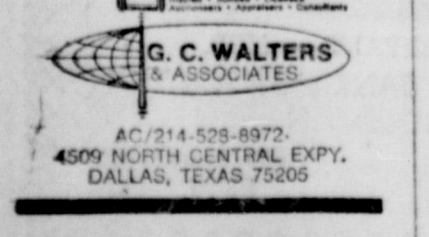

Cottonwood Fund Hits \$4,800 Total

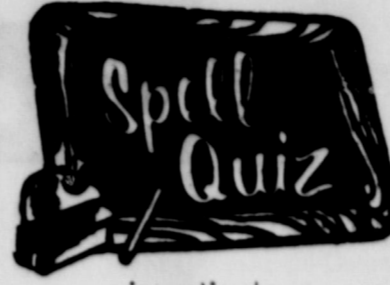
