

Boat owners in Texas will

Legislature. Of immediate interest is the new law requesting children 12 or under riding in a Class 1 or Class A motorboat whle underway to wear life preservers of the sort prescribed by the regulations of the Commandant of the Coast Guard.

The only such approved life preserver is one U. S. Coast Guard approved.

If a boat is underway, and if the child does not have the life preserver, the oporator may be

The new law does not apply to canoes, rowboats of sailboats. but these boates after Sept. 1 are required to have an approved life - saving device on board for each person. These were heretofore exempted.

Also new is the requirement that aftr Jan. 1, 1972, all motorboates must be registered with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, regardless af length or horsepower.



Cottonwood Fund Hits \$4,800 Total




