## Locker Remodeling Project Progresses

Another phase of an extensive remodeling and improvement project at Cross Plains Frozen Food Locker plant is underway.

Presently under construction is a completely modern slaughter house, located immediately behind the facility on corner of Ave. D and East 9th Street. The tile structure will also incorporate a smoke house for curing meats. That part of the revamping of the plant's new facility is expected to be completed in four to six weeks, according to the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Hutchins.

Gerald Bowden, local contractor, is doing the work.

Hutchins also plans to connect the two buildings in the near future, and he said that additional re-working of the interior of the present meat processing and frozen food building is planned. A recent fire at the plant delayed improvements.

## Reduced Rail Hay Rates Due Callahan

Congressman Omar Burleson today announced that an Interstate Commerce Commission Drought Order would permit railroads to ship hay at reduced rates into the following counties: Armstrong, Briscoe, Callahan, Concho, Deaf Smith, Falls, Hood, Limestone, McLennan, Moore, Parker, Potter, Randall, Runnels, Sutton, Tarrant and Williamson.

The Congressman explained the order was made by reason of drought conditions existing in these areas for reduced rates for those persons designated as being in distress and in need of relief by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, or by such state agents or agencies as may be designated by the Agriculture Department, to assist in relieving the distress caused by the drought.

## Begin Improvements At Rising Star School

Improvements and remodeling of the high school building at Rising Star have begun by a contractor of that city. A contract not to exceed \$65,000 stipulates that work is to be done in 60 days, ready for 1971-72 school term opening.

Contract for the new gymnasium, replacing the old rock structure condemned and now destroyed, is expected to be let in a very short while. The award has been delayed because of a hold-up in completion of specifications, according to Supt. Victor Childers.

Gymnasium will have three classrooms and team dressing rooms and showers. It will be equipped for auditorium use.

Floor plan of the old high school building will show little change. The building will contain lowered ceilings, new windows, air-conditioning, new lockers, carpeting, and other modern decorative features.

Purpose of the seminar is to give the students a better understanding of the American system and way of life. Emphasis will be placed on the economic, moral and social aspects of the American society. Instruction will consist of lectures, films and panel discussions.

## Extended Holidays Pass Quietly Here

The long Independence Day week end passed quietly in the Cross Plains area.

Helping to keep activities at a minimum were excessively hot temperatures. Many area thermometers soared past the 100 degree mark on both Sunday and Monday. Official readings here were 100 each day.

Although local law officers worked longer hours than normal, no emergencies nor major crimes were reported. Department of Public Safety Patrolman H. D. Welch, City Marshal Chuck Thomas and Deputy Sheriff J. H. Cox all reported a quiet holiday.

Thomas said that it was one

of the quietest he could recall since entering the peace officer profession. He said only one arrest was made within the corporate limits for intoxication. He added that cooperation of people concerning the ban on exploding fireworks in the city was appreciated.

Cross Plains volunteer firemen answered only one call during the holiday period. That was a minor grass fire in the west part of town about 11 p.m. Saturday.

Only fatal traffic accident learned of here during the three-day period occurred about two miles west of Baird on Interstate Highway 20 about 5 a.m. Saturday.

Ronnie Binson Cryer, 23, of El Paso was killed when the truck in which he was riding jackknifed off the road. Sidney Mark Cates, also of El Paso, driver of the vehicle, was injured in the mishap.

Many Cross Plains area residents attended celebrations in surrounding cities, and some attended family reunions or other diversions. Most, however, spent peaceful hours at home or visited with friends and relatives who returned for the holidays.

## State Gives School Here Immunization Directives

Cross Plains school officials have received regulations from Texas Department of Health regarding compulsory immunization for children attending public schools.

The law provides all students entering Texas elementary or secondary schools or institutions of higher learning must be immunized against six diseases. Evidence of immunizations must be presented, as follows: Polio - 3 doses required with last dose since age 4.

Diphtheria-Tetanus - 3 doses required with last dose since age 4 or within 10 years.

Measles - 1 dose or history of illness through age 12. No vaccination required for students age 13 and above.

Rubella - 1 dose through age 12. No vaccination required for age 13 or above.

Smallpox - 1 dose required within 10 years.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received and date received will be acceptable during the 1971-72 school year.

Further information will be published as it is received by the school district.

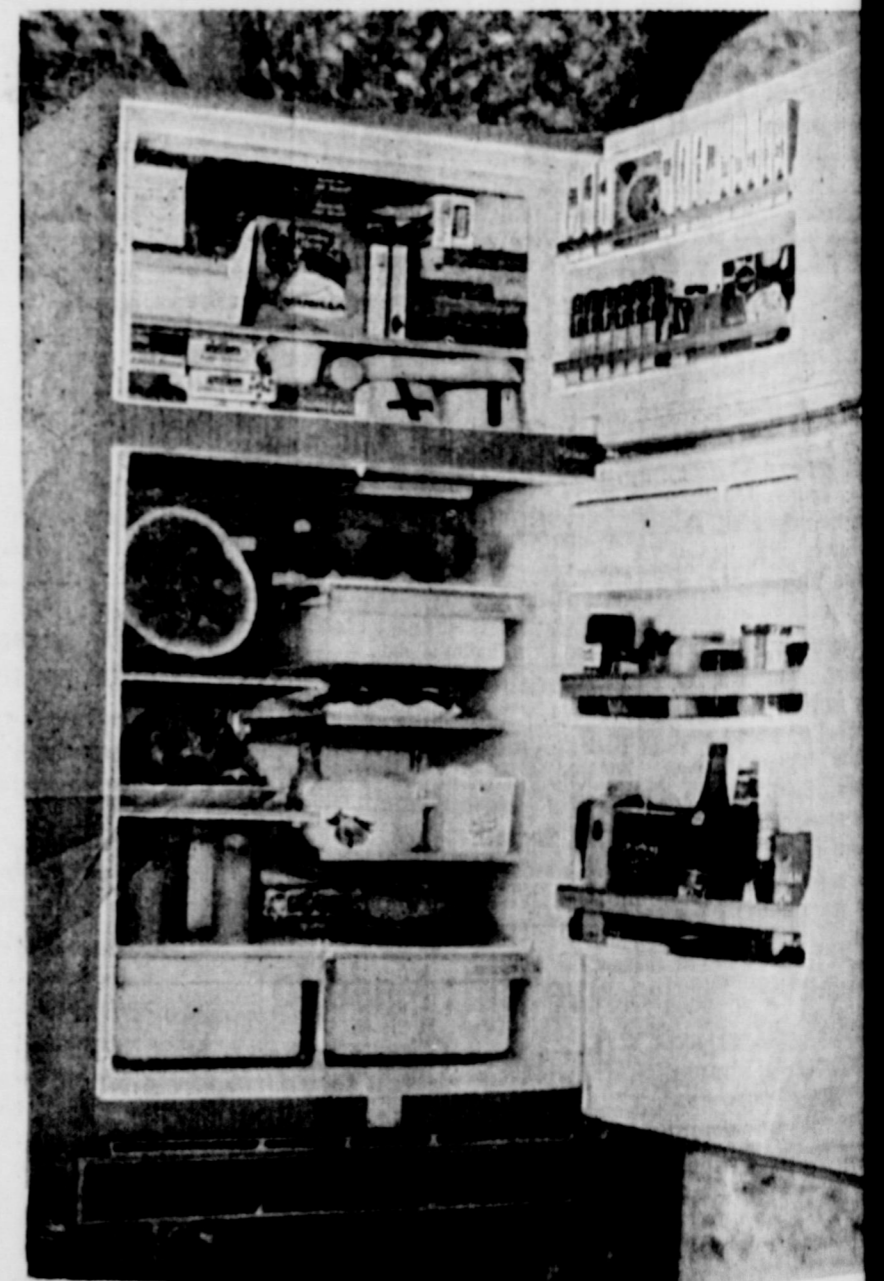

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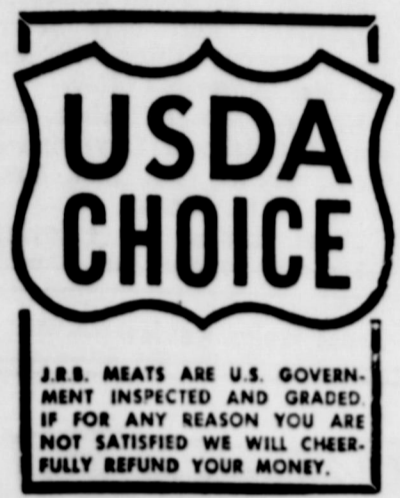

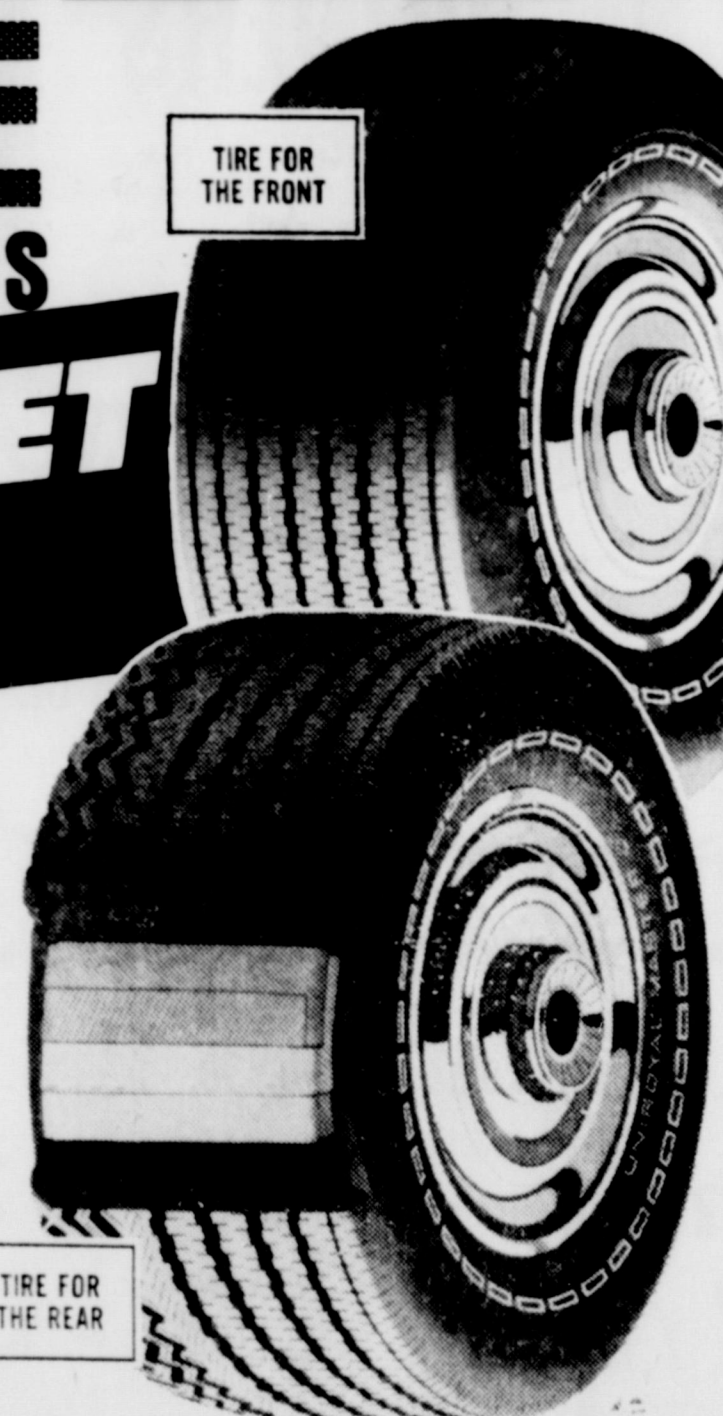
