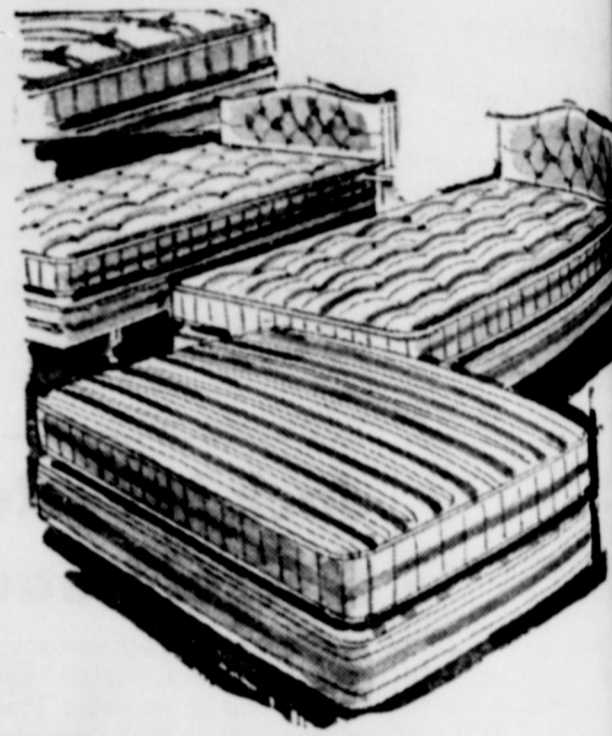

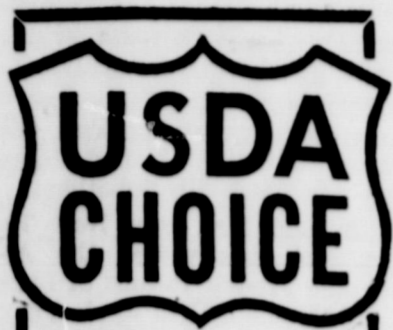

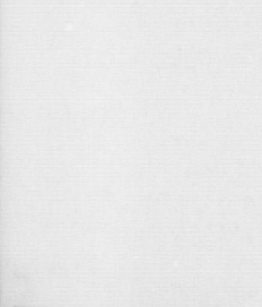

## HOME AND FAMILY HINTS FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

By Barbara Williams

Hurray for today's easy care fabrics! We are so spoiled to them that we avoid "wash-starch-and-iron" fabrics like the plague. However, the home sewer may occasionally find herself cursing the wonder fabrics. Why? Because they do create some sewing problems that were heretofore unknown.



In an attempt to help this frustrated lady, we will turn our attention to some sewing tips for a few weeks. If you are not one of the 41 million women or 10 million teen-age girls who make all or part of their wardrobes each year we hope you will bear with us while we discuss our problems!

You can achieve good results with permanent press fabric if you follow a few rules. Polyester/cotton is most popular. Remember, however, that you do not have the same high-temperature pressing equipment as the commercial apparels manufacturer, so you should not attempt complicated garments with these fabrics.

Choose patterns which have straight lines with a minimum number of seams and details. Avoid frills and fullness. Fullness at the sleeves cap, for example, will not ease or press into a flat seam as it would with other fabrics.

Do not attempt pleats, as these fabrics are highly resistant to creasing.

Use cotton-covered polyester or polyester thread.

Preshrink zipper, tape and interfacings, if used.

Relax the tension on your sewing machine just a little to prevent seams from puckering when your new garment is laundered. These puckers WILL NOT press out. This is the most common problem with permanent press garments.

Guide the fabric through the machine very gently, without forcing or pulling it. Forcing and pulling will have the same effect of puckering seams that a too-tight tension on the machine would. 10-12 stitches per inch will prove to be your best stitch

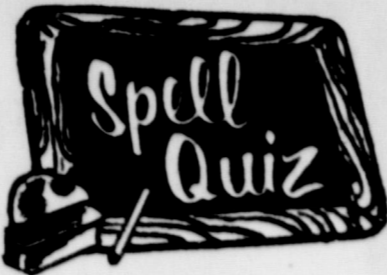
