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Larry Prather, 31, Dies In Auto Crash

Larry Prather, 31-year-old Cross Plains area resident, was killed in a head-on automobile collision one mile west of Granbury early Tuesday morning.

Cross Plains City Marshal Chuck Thomas was notified of the accident soon after it occurred.

Report received here was that Prather was killed and one other person injured. The accident happened at 5:40 a.m. in Hood County on U. S. Highway 77.

Prather's body was taken to a Granbury funeral home, and was scheduled to arrive in Cross Plains late Tuesday. No other details were learned here Tuesday as the Review hurried to press other than Prather's auto and a truck collided.

His wife of Cross Plains, who survives, operates the Cross Plains Truck Stop Cafe here. Four small children also survive.

Funeral details had not been learned here Tuesday at noon.

Baird Junior Rodeo Postponed By VEE

Annual junior rodeo at Baird has been postponed until Sept. 13 through 15, according to Dick Vestal, Baird agriculture instructor and motivating force in the event. It was originally scheduled July 27 through 31.

Rapid spread of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) forced the postponement. Vestal said because there is so much money invested in prizes, about \$1,500, it was decided to try to have the rodeo at a later date.

Meeting will begin at the agriculture building on the Cross Plains High School campus at 9 a.m. A short program will be held on new chemicals registered for control of the lesser cornstalk borer with Cliff Hoelscher of Stephenville, area entomologist, in charge.

A tour of several peanut fields in this area to check for borer infestation will follow. Entire program is expected to last two to two and one-half hours.

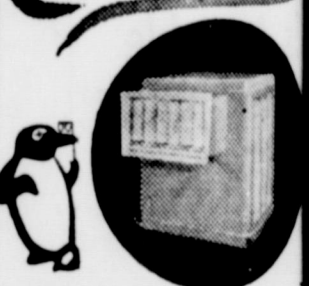

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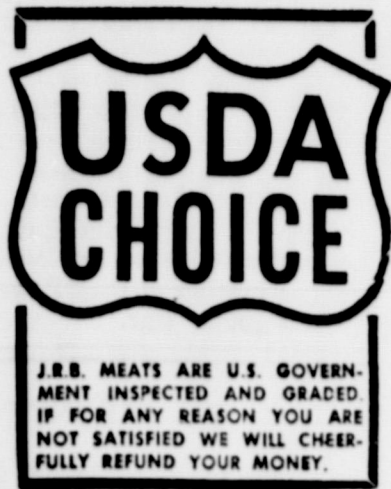

State Horses Under Premise Quarantine

All horses in Texas have been quarantined to premises because of rapid spread northward from Mexico and South America of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE).

Federal interstate regulations prohibits Texas horses from moving out of state, and Texas Animal Health Commission has issued a quarantine restricting equine animals to premises. This allows no movement in either former stated cases without individual identification and certificate showing each animal has been vaccinated with VEE TC-83 vaccine for at least 14 days.

Movement within the state to an inoculation point was allowed Tuesday.

The vaccine is being made available at no cost, but priority is given areas having death losses from the sleeping sickness disease, which also may affect humans. If movement is intended vaccine must be administered by a veterinarian or other person in authority to issue a certificate of vaccination.

The virus has caused postponement or cancellation of numerous rodeos and horse shows. Among them are the Baird Junior Rodeo and Brown County Junior Rodeo. Both reportedly have been re-scheduled.

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Beautiful drapability, exciting colors and bright new designs are the rewards to the home sewer who shops for acetate, triacetate or polyester crepe. These fabrics are excellent choices for elegant party dresses as well as other dresses and blouses.

Check hangtags and bolt ends for the care recommendations before buying crepe, and make a note of the instructions. If instructions are not visible, ask the saleslady to help you find them. Some crepes may be washable but others will retain best appearance if drycleaned. Acetate crepes should be drycleaned.

If slight shrinkage is expected to present a problem of fit or appearance, shrink fabric before cutting. If drycleaning is recommended for the finished garment, you can usually pre-shrink the fabric satisfactorily by pressing it with the grain with a steam iron or over a damp cloth. Be sure to use a low setting. It is recommended that crepes be pressed on the wrong side to avoid making the surface shiny ("glazing" it). When pressing on the right side, use a pressing cloth or tissue paper.

Pin pattern pieces carefully on the grain, without stretching the fabric. Use cotton-

covered polyester thread for sewing and loosen the tension on the machine. A sharp, fine needle (no. 9 or no. 11) is a must to avoid pulling threads of the fabric and creating a puckered look. The correct stitch length will be medium (12 - 15 per inch) to long (8 - 10 per inch). Use stay-stitching at armholes and other stress points.

As with all fabrics, be sure the lining, interlining, and tape you buy are compatible with the wear and care properties of your crepe.

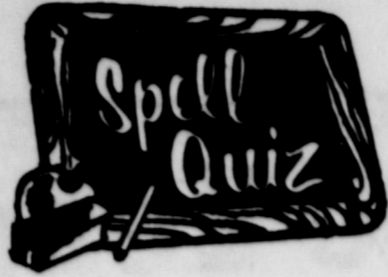
