Light Rains In Area Net Varying Totals

Showers have been dumping widely varying amounts of rain in the Cross Plains area for the past several days. Since Wednesday, showers in the afternoon and morning have covered all points of the surrounding countryside, but amounts measured have varied widely.

The Sabanno community has gauged from 2 to almost 2.50 inches of rain while at Atwell just over an inch has been measured. Cottonwood received almost 1.50 inches. The Rowden area got an aggregate of 1.10 inches. Cross Cut got the heaviest amount of about 2 inches. In Burkett only about 1.25 inches were recorded, but the southwest more than 3 inches were reported.

Cross Plains measured .97 of an inch in the several showers,

heaviest of which fell Monday morning, totaling .40 of an inch. Only .18 of an inch was gauged by F. C. Newton, official weather observer, in a shower Thursday, and the same amount fell here Friday. Saturday's rain measured .19 of an inch. The light shower Tuesday morning netted .02 of an inch.

With .10 of an inch recorded early this month, July's rain amounts to 1.07, bringing the total for the year to 8.10 inches, far below the normal amount of

24.54 inches. Newton's records show the following rain totals by months: January .08, February .87, March .00, April .82, May 3.75, June 1.41 and July 1.07.

Although the rains were beneficial to peanut and cotton crops, doubt was held that it would help sorghums. Pastures were also greatly helped, but not much water ran from the showers, and many stock ponds in the area are dry or getting dangerously low.

VEE Fails To Postpone Bob Estes Open Rodeo

One rodeo in this section of Texas has not been canceled by the horse sleeping sickness (VEE) rampaging in the state. It is one being produced by Bobby Estes at his rodeo school arena between Clyde and Baird.

It is billed as an open competition rodeo, for amateurs and professionals, and will be staged each Saturday night at 8:15 beginning Aug. 7 and continuing through September. The arena is located on Farm Road 18, old Highway 90. Admission is \$1 with children under 12 being admitted free.

Estes, who has 21 years experience in producing rodeos covering 18 states and three foreign countries, said that he had ample stock on location, where the school is held for aspiring young cowboys, to not be affected by the embargo on moving horses for fear of spreading VEE.

Six events are slated for the show including bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, cowgirls barrel and flag racing and Brahma bull riding.

Judges for the event will be Bill Barton and L. E. Weeks of Abilene, former professional rodeo contestants each with more than 20 years experience in the field.

Cars may be parked around the arena and portable bleachers are expected to arrive for first performance.

The Estes stock includes a bucking mare, Bonnie Parker, which has unseated every rider, and a bull, Poncho Villa, bought in Mexico, rated by the producer as mean a bull as he has ever seen.

City Dads Pondering Drilling More Wells

Cross Plains City Council members are pondering the feasibility of drilling more water wells in an effort to assure no shortage of water here.

The possibility of the drilling was brought up at a recent council meeting, but no definite action was taken.

Twenty-six wells currently supply the city with water, and according to Mayor Doyle Burchfield, the supply has been meeting demand, and he added that as far as he knows the wells are still holding up under the heavy drain from near-record consumption.

Last week daily pumpings averaged about 235,000 gallons, although usage was eased by light showers latter part of the week.

Lakewood Partner Golf Tourney Set

A second partnership golf tournament has been carded at Lakewood Recreation Center. It is scheduled to be held Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 21 and 22.

The event will be similar to the one held in June with a few exceptions.

Entry fee will be \$30 per team, and gift certificates will be awarded first through third places in each flight, as in the first event. Again qualifying rounds, which will be used to flight participants for another 18 holes on Sunday, may be played at convenience on Saturday. Shotgun start at 8 a.m. Sunday will start play for lower flights, and identical procedure will be followed at 1:30 p.m. for championship and other top flights.

Major difference in the upcoming tourney and the first one is that no limit will be placed on number of teams which will be allowed to participate. A later entry deadline has also been set. Players will be accepted until 10 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 21.

As before all entrants will be eligible to use all facilities of the club which include swimming, fishing, picnicking and miniature golf.

"Smokey Gaines is chairman of the committee in charge of the tournament.

It has been pointed out that a permanent date for the annual partnership event has been established. It will be held the second week end in April beginning next year.

Callahan Museum Given Early-Day Foot Warmer

A foot warmer used by the first rural route mail carrier in this county will be donated to the Callahan County Museum, housed in the basement of the courthouse at Baird.

It was used by the late M. C. (Mose) Baum of Cross Plains during his early years as rural mail carrier. He began work for the post office on June 1, 1911, and first used a horse and buggy to cover his route. Later he used the warmer in days before automobiles had heaters.

Mrs. Irene Baum Scoggins, wife of the late Mr. Baum who lives in Lorenzo, discovered the foot warmer when she was moving things stored here to Lorenzo.

The contraption resembles a small automobile muffler wrap-

ped in heavy asbestos. Handles are at each end, and a sliding door at one end enabled a hot brick to be placed inside.

The late Mr. Baum carried the mail on Route 1 out of Cross Plains, going west to Burnt Branch, then northwest, until Route 2 was established May 1, 1914. This route left here, circling by Dressy, Burkett, Cross Cut and back to Cross Plains. In September 1939 Mr. Baum traded routes with O. M. Bailey, now retired and making his home here, and moved his family to McAdoo. He retired June 30, 1953, after 42 years with the postal department. He and Mrs. Baum moved back to Cross Plains in August 1961 where they remained until his death April 23, 1966.

Clyde All-Stars Bop Locals

Clyde All-Stars whipped host Cross Plains All-Stars Saturday 5-0 for the area Little League championship. The westside Callahan County team will participate in the district tournament at Albany to be held this week, July 28, 29 and 30.

The local contest was rained out Friday night, when it was regularly scheduled, and officials agreed to play Saturday.

Rain began shortly before infield practice was to begin at 7:10 p.m.

Clyde correctly called a flip of the coin and was designated as home team.

The visitors tallied four of their five runs on homers. Cross Plains managed base runners in all but one inning, but could not score.

Tony Wyatt, Cross Plains first baseman, singled in the first after two were out, but next batter flew out to first.

Clyde got on the scoreboard in the last of the first when winning pitcher Deryl Shelnut poled a two-strike pitch over the fence.

Lloyd Corley led off the Cross Plains second with a base on balls, moving to third. He was stranded there as the next three batters went out in order. Wayne Pierce got to third for Clyde in last of the frame after one out, but losing pitcher Jimmy Crawford whiffed the next two hitters.

After two outs Wyatt again singled for Cross Plains in the third, but was left there. The big blow of the contest was delivered by Clyde's clean-up hitter, shortstop Charles Key, in the last of the inning as he blasted a three-run round-tripper, scoring Buddy Moore, who had walked after one out, and Shelnut, who had singled.

In the fourth locals got two base runners after one was away on a routine infield out. Corley was safe on an error and advanced to third. Steve Baugh

walked after the second out. Next batter was struck out to end the inning. Clyde tallied its final run in the bottom of the fourth when Rodney Holloway doubled with one out and came home on errors when Kelley Young got aboard safely on miscues.

Cross Plains was retired in order in the fifth, and although Clyde's Eddie Hyer singled in last half of the frame after one out, he died on base.

Local all-stars rallied again in the sixth after two outs. Corley walked and moved to third as Brad Waggoner also earned a free pass. Clyde's ace hurler, Shelnut, then struck out the last batter as the count went full.

Both pitchers went the distance. Shelnut surrendered just two singles, both to Wyatt, and fielding errors cost him one additional base runner. He issued five free passes, four bases on balls and one hit batsman. He struck out eight batters.

Although Crawford was the loser he turned in a creditable performance. He allowed six hits. He hit a batter, but issued just one walk. He fanned 11 Clyde batters, twice striking out the side.

It was not known here Tuesday whom Clyde would meet or at what time game would begin at Albany this week.

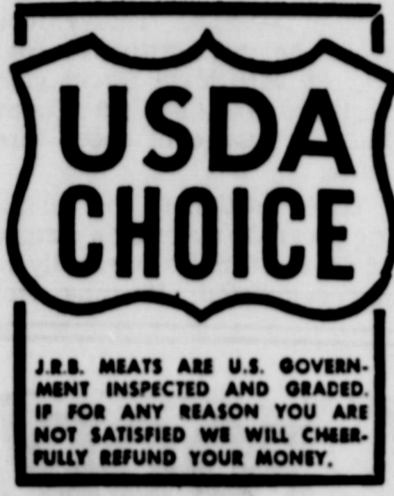

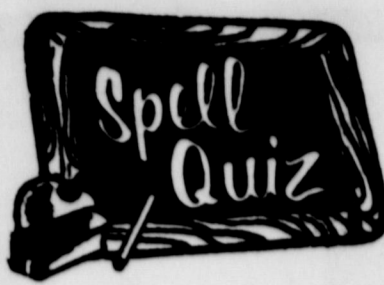
