## Projection Indicates Area Population Drop

Projections indicate that there will be less people in Callahan County and all adjoining counties in the next 20 years.

The Population Research Center of the University of Texas at Austin has released new population projections indicating that previously released information had over-estimated growth of Texas.

The figures come in two sets: one based on a slightly increasing fertility rate and one based on a slightly decreasing fertility rate.

The figures are based on the 1970 census data, and compared to the 1965 projections by the UT-Austin Bureau of Business Research, they show less people for the state than had been expected.

Both sets of preliminary figures show heavy loss of population by 1990 in Coleman and

Eastland counties, and moderate losses in Callahan, Brown and Comanche counties.

It was noted that the figures released should be used with caution, and it was also pointed out that revised projections will be out in a few months.

Indications are that the fertility rate in the state is increasing although not as fast as had been anticipated. It apparently is not so in this and the other counties mentioned, although a gain in population is forecast for the entire state through 1990.

Figures for Callahan, Brown, Coleman, Comanche and Eastland counties, with the rate of decline based on decreasing fertility in parentheses, follow:

Callahan — 1975 — 8,200 (7,900); 1980 — 8,000 (7,500); 1985 — 7,800 (7,100); 1990 — 7,600 (6,800).

Brown — 1975 — 25,800 (25,000); 1980 — 25,500 (23,900); 1985 — 25,000 (22,800); 1990 — 24,500 (21,800).

Coleman — 1975 — 9,100 (8,800); 1980 — 7,900 (7,300); 1985 — 6,400 (5,900); 1990 — 5,100 (4,500).

Comanche — 1975 — 11,600 (11,300); 1980 — 11,200 (10,500); 1985 — 10,700 (9,500); 1990 — 10,300 (9,100).

Eastland — 1975 — 17,400 (17,000); 1980 — 14,800 (14,000); 1985 — 12,100 (11,200); 1990 — 11,400 (10,000).

## 16 Teams In Local Cage Tournament

Sixteen varsity teams from eight schools will participate in the annual Cross Plains High School invitational basketball tournament scheduled to unfold in Buffalo Gymnasium Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Boys and girls squads from Albany, Bangs, May, Putnam, Rising Star, Santa Anna, Talpa-

Centennial and host Cross Plains will vie for three team awards, championship, runnerup and consolation victor, in each division. Trophies will also be given selected players of all-tournament teams, six girls and five boys.

Only defending champion back is Albany Lions who won

the male division last year. Eula girls, last year's tournament queens, did not choose to return to defend their title.

Local school officials would not forecast a favorite in either division, saying that the best-balanced tourney in years is expected.

Host squads will play the last two games of the first day's competition. Buffettes will take on the defending champion, May, with a 7 p.m. tipoff slated. Buffaloes will follow immediately, at 8:30, with the May male contingent.

Local Head Coach Mack McConal noted that play will begin at 1 p.m. Thursday and Friday, earlier than normal, to allow an earlier finish each night. An hour and a half has been allowed for each game. Six games are on tap each of the first two days, and eight contests are carded Saturday. Four clashes Saturday morning beginning at 9 o'clock will end second round eliminations. Finals, starting with the girls consolation title, will begin at 4:30 p.m. the last day. Boys consolation will follow at 6 p.m. Girls championship game is scheduled for a 7:30 p.m. start, and boys championship game is slated for an 9 p.m. tipoff.

First round matches will be held Thursday with conclusion coming in first games Friday.

Talpa-Centennial and Putnam girls will be initial contest, at 1 p.m., followed by male squads of the two schools. At 4 o'clock Bangs and Rising Star girls collide, immediately after which male units of the same two schools will battle. Cross Plains girls and May sextet tangle at 7 p.m., and the Buff-May Tigers clash will follow at 8:30.

Albany and Santa Anna girls open action Friday at 1 p.m., and the two schools' boys teams complete first round play at 2:30. Second round bouts will begin with girls at 4 p.m. Friday and continue through early session Saturday.

## CHAMPIONS OF LAST 18 TOURNAMENTS

Eula girls have won more titles than any other team in Cross Plains High School's annual basketball tournament since 1953. Cross Plains boys claim the same honor in the male division. Eula sextets have captured seven championships, and Cross Plains Buffaloes have emerged victorious four times in the last 17 meets. ## Social Security Also Helps The Disabled

People who receive monthly disability benefits from social security are severely disabled, yet many are helped by rehabilitation, according to James Smith, field representative in Cross Plains.

"Social security disability benefits are paid to eligible people with severe, long-lasting physical or mental impairments," Smith said. "Still, one in five receives rehabilitation services paid for by state, federal, local or private agencies. Of these beneficiaries, one in 10 receives financial help for vocational rehabilitation from social security."

Rehabilitation includes job training, physical therapy and similar services.

About 1.5 million disabled workers and 1.5 million dependents receive about \$3 billion a year in monthly disability benefits from social security. About \$24 million has been allocated by social security to help pay for rehabilitation services for selected disability cases this year.

"Since the social security beneficiary rehabilitation program began in 1965," Smith said, "more than 7,100 people who had been receiving social security disability benefits had those benefits terminated because they were able to return to gainful work."

Disabled workers with a good potential for rehabilitation are referred to state vocational rehabilitation agencies by social security, according to Smith.

## Local Girls To Take National Examination

Cross Plains High School senior girls will be among more than 600,000 in nearly 15,000 schools across the country who will participate in a 50 minute written knowledge and attitude examination Tuesday (Dec. 7). Scores in the test will provide the first basis for judging which will eventually award a total of \$111,000 in college scholarships in the 18th annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Sponsored by General Mills, the Search is the only national scholarship program exclusively for high school senior girls.

Following grading of the examination, a Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named for the high school here. She will receive a specially designed award charm, and will remain in the running for the state and national honors.

Next spring, the 51 state winners, each accompanied by a faculty adviser, will join for an expense paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C. On the basis of personal observation and interviews, the 1972 Betty Crocker all-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and three runners-up will be announced at the conclusion of the tour. They will receive increases in their scholarships to \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

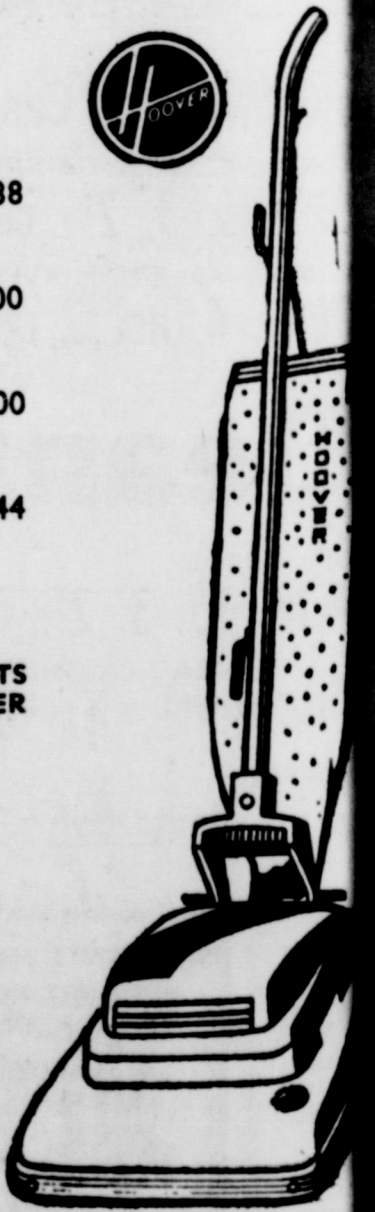
