People who receive monthly disability benefits from social security are severely disabled. yet many are helped by rehabilitation. according to James Smith, field representative in Cross Plains.

"Social security disability benefts are paid to eligible people with severe, long - lasting physical or mental impairments," Smith said. Of these beneficiaries, one in 10 receives financial help for vocational rehabilitation from social security.

' Rehabilitation includes job training, physical therapy and similar services.

About 1.5 million disabled workers and 1.5 million dependents receive about \$3 billion a year in monthly disability benefits from social security. About \$24 million has been allocated by social security to help pay for rehabilitation services for selected disability cases this vear.

"Since the social security beneficiary rehabilitation program began in 1965," Smith said, "more than 7,100 people who had been receiving social security disability benefits had those benefits terminated because they were able to return to gainful work.'

Disabled workers with a good potential for rehabilitation are referred to state vocational rehabilitation agencies by social security, according to Smith.


