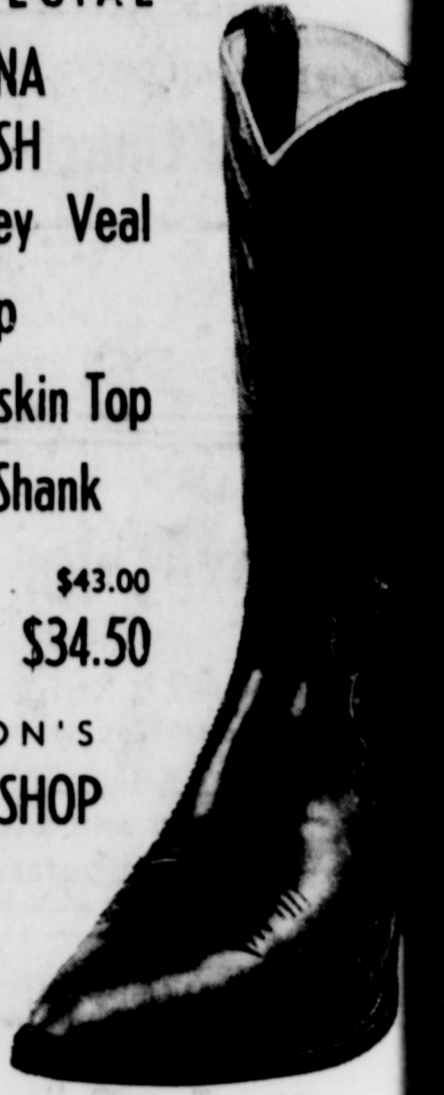

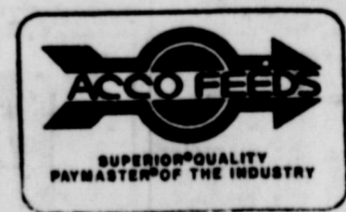

Eastland County, which has no bond chairman, has reached only 55 per cent of its \$300,000 goal. Sales in October totaled \$9,150 for an aggregate of \$166,312.

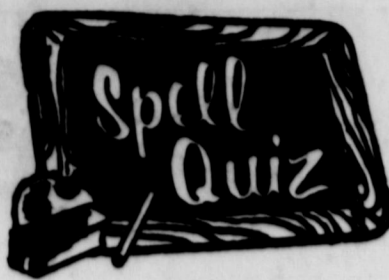
