This is one of a series of articles furnished by the Texas Department of Public Safety on the traffic laws passed by Texas' 62nd Legislature.

TURNING ON CURVE OR CREST OF GRADE PROHIBITED

No vehicle shall be turned so as to proceed in the opposite direction upon any curve, or upon the approach to or near the crest of a grade, where such vehicle cannot be seen by the driver of any other vehicle approaching from either direction within five hundred (500) feet.

USE OF MULTIPLE BEAM ROAD LIGHTING EQUIPMENT

Whenever the driver of a vehicle approaches an oncoming vehilce within five hundred (500) feet or whenever the driver of a vehicle approaches another vehicle from the rear, within three hundred (300) feet, such driver shall dim his head light:
