Farmers Must File SS Report In January

Farmers have until January 31 to report Social Security taxes withheld from their employees' wages during 1971. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said:

The reports should be filed on Form 943, Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees.

Campbell said that any farmer who pays an employee cash wages of \$150 or more a year must withhold Social Security taxes. These taxes must also be withheld on wages under \$150 for any person hired 20 days or more a year.

First Of 7.5 Million Tag Renewals Mailed

If you own one or more of the more than seven-and-a-half million motor vehicles in Texas, some important mail is coming your way.

The first of 7.5 million renewal applications from the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department were dispatched from the post office's facilities in Dallas on Friday, December 31.

Owners of motor vehicles should be receiving the renewal applications — for obtaining 1972 Texas license plates — early in January.

The actual motor vehicle registration "season" at county tax offices does not begin until February 1.

However, vehicle owners may go ahead and order their license plates by mail immediately.

All that is required is to send the entire renewal application, the registration fee and \$1 for each vehicle to be registered to the local county tax office. License plates will be returned by mail after registration begins formally on February 1.

Vehicle owners should allow at least 30 days for processing and delivery. The application should be sent to the local county tax office — not to the Texas Highway Department.

License plates can be obtained in person at county tax offices and designated sub-stations.

New Traffic Laws

This is one of a series of articles furnished by the Texas Department of Public Safety on the traffic laws passed by Texas' 62nd Legislature.

TURNING ON CURVE OR CREST OF GRADE PROHIBITED

No vehicle shall be turned so as to proceed in the opposite direction upon any curve, or upon the approach to or near the crest of a grade, where such vehicle cannot be seen by the driver of any other vehicle approaching from either direction within five hundred (500) feet.

USE OF MULTIPLE BEAM ROAD LIGHTING EQUIPMENT

Whenever the driver of a vehicle approaches an oncoming vehicle within five hundred (500) feet or whenever the driver of a vehicle approaches another vehicle from the rear, within three hundred (300) feet, such driver shall dim his head light.

Local Basketballers Begin District 10-A Competition

Both varsity basketball teams of Cross Plains High School were scheduled to open District 10-A competition Tuesday night at 7 p.m. at Dublin.

Buffettes are defending champion, having beaten Dublin in a playoff game for the title last year.

In last outing local boys dropped two decisions to host Cisco, while Buffettes claimed a relatively easy triumph.

Cross Plains girls broke an 11-tie after first quarter and took a 25-17 lead at halftime, going on to win 45-30. Terry Edington tallied 36 points for the Buffettes, 22 of which came at the free throw line out of 30 shots. Susan Hollan added five and Sherry Ingram has four.

Buffaloes stayed close for first eight minutes, trailing 14-13, but fell behind 31-15 at intermission. Cisco then coasted to a 64-36 verdict. Ricky Kirkham netted 12 for the Herd, and Larry Tatom added seven.

Buffets played without starter Donnie Dillard who is still in a cast after severely injuring his ankle in the Rising Star tournament about three weeks ago.

Buffalo B team owned an 8-4 lead in first quarter, but fell behind 24-14 at intermission, and Cisco eventually won 35-24. Jerry Lewis was high point for locals with nine points.

Politics Begin Buzz Start Of New Year

Politics will probably play an important role in 1972, as offices are at stake from the President of the United States to city councilmen.

A citizen may have a voice in any of the several elections

coming up this year, however, only if he bothers to register. It does not cost money, only a little time. Registrations may be made through the tax assessor-collector's office in Baird in Callahan County before February 1.

Qualified voters in Cross Plains will elect a Mayor and two aldermen. Terms of Mayor Doyle Burchfield and Aldermen T. T. Nichols and Raymond DeBusk are expiring. Aldermen all named to two-year terms.

Two places will also be filled on the board of trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District. Tenures of Lewis Fortune and Dick Koenig are expiring. Trustees are elected for three-year terms.

In Callahan County several officials will stand for re-election, or vacancies will be filled.

Terms of tax assessor-collector, county attorney, sheriff and commissioners of precincts 1 and 3 are expiring. Other constable and justice offices will be filled also, as well as party offices.

State Representatives and Congressman Omar Burleson will also have to stand for re-election or relinquish office.

One of the hottest state-wide races is expected to be for governor. At least three candidates have already announced.

A referendum is also reportedly scheduled for several revisions to the state constitution.

All-in-all it appears that 1972 will be a politically busy year.

Coleman County Remains Savings Bonds Leader

Sales of Series E and H United States Saving Bonds for the first eleven months of 1971 totaled \$102,755 in Callahan County. Of this amount \$11,503 were purchased during the month of November according to Howard E. Farmer of Baird, chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee.

During November, Texans purchased \$16,759,888 in Saving Bonds. This represents a 12.3 per cent increase over the same period last year. Cumulative sales for eleven months of 1971 amounted to \$184,622,944 which is 101 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.9 million.

Over the five county area, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Brown and Eastland, Coleman County continued to far outdistance all others in percentage of the 1971 goal sold. Robert

Land Bank Slates Lower Interest Rate

Leslie Bryant, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman, announced today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7%.

"This reduction will be effective January 1, 1972 on all variable rate loans and affects more than 177 million dollars in volume to more than 5,000 farmers and ranchers", Bryant stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the third time in the past year that the billing rate has been reduced. "Continued improvement in the money market has made this reduction possible and is in line with the Bank's policy of providing farmers and ranchers of Texas credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices", Bryant further stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans throughout Texas. The Bank has over 573 million dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The local Association makes and services loans in Coleman and Callahan Counties. Officers and directors of the Association are, Johnnie I. Henderson of Burkett, President, R. O. Nichols of Baird, Vice President, and W. R. Hickman, Jr., Ralph M. Edens, and Hadden Payne round out the five man Board.
