New Traffic Laws

WINDSHIELDS MUST BE UNOBSTRUCTED

No person shall drive a motor vehicle with any sign, poster or other nontransparent material upon the front windshield, side wings or side or rear windows of such vehicle which materially obstructs, obscures, or impairs the driver's clear veiw of the highway or any intersecting highway.

PRESUMPTIVE LIMITS OF BLOOD ALCOHOL

Evidence of the amount of alcohol in a person's blood at the time of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, as shown by chemical analysis of his blood, breath, urine or any other bodily substance shall be admissable in court and if there was at that time 0.10 percent or more by weight of alcohol in the person's blood, it shall be presumed that the person was under the influence of intoxicating liquor.
