Wells In Callahan Ordered Plugged

The largest number of wells involved in a single Railroad Commission plugging order came to light Friday when the commission ordered the proper plugging of 66 wells in Callahan County.

The order followed a public hearing Sept. 22. The commission found that 66 wells were not properly plugged on Joe Hurley's P. G. Hatchett Lease in the Callahan County regular field.

The commission order found that Hurley was the responsible person, and ordered him to plug the wells in accordance with commission rules to prevent water pollution.

Hurley was given 30 days in which to plug the wells. If it is not done, the matter will be turned over to Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin for legal action.

New Exemptions For Farmers And Ranchers Effective January 1

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has reminded Texas farmers and ranchers of revised driver qualifications regulations that were in effect in 1971.

New exemptions were made for farmers and ranchers by the U. S. Department of Transportation after many complaints were filed against restrictive farm driver qualification regulations last year.

The new regulations which became effective January 1 include:

1. Farm vehicle drivers operating trucks weighing 10,000 pounds or less are totally exempt from the driver qualification rules.

2. Farm vehicle drivers operating straight trucks weighing in excess of 10,000 pounds within 150 miles of their farms are totally exempt from the rules.

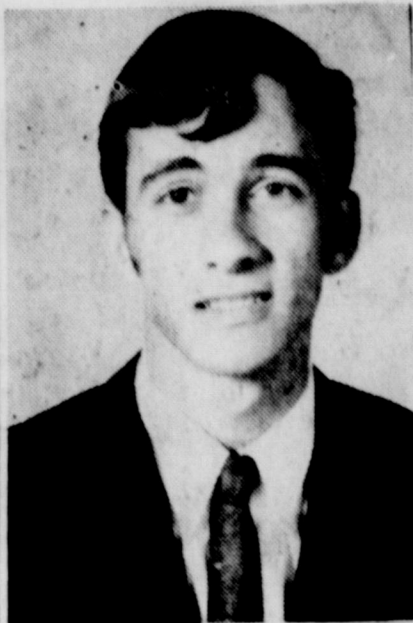

3,000 Votes Register In C

Approximately 3,000 persons have registered for the upcoming elections in Callahan County in 1972. Albert Lovell Tax Assessor-Collector of Callahan County expects new record to be set for registered voters in 1972. He expects some 4500 to register to vote.

The previous record was set in 1968 with 4,230 registered voters. In 1941 — 3,771 registered to vote which was a record for an off year.

Each person who registers to vote in Callahan County for 1972 was mailed a renewal notice in October and if they wish to register for the upcoming elections these must be signed and returned to the tax office. If a person did not register in 1971 and wishes to do so for 1972 he may do this by going to the tax office or write for an application to register by mail.

Also this year 18 year-olds may register to vote. The 1972 voting year begins March 1, 1972, and in order to be entitled to vote on that date a person must register or file his application by not later than January 31, 1972.

This year for the first time the voter registration certificates are for permanent use, the only requirement is for the voter to vote in a primary or general at least once in a three year period beginning March 1, 1972. This will renew his registration for the succeeding three years. If a voter does not vote within this three year period his registration is canceled.

Beginning on February 1 after the close of the registration period provided for, the registration shall be conducted at all times the tax office is open for business. A registration on

Household workers have been covered by the Social Security Act since 1951, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security's Abilene district manager. A domestic workers have been for work in a private household are covered by the law if they amount to \$50 or more from one employer in a three - month quarter.

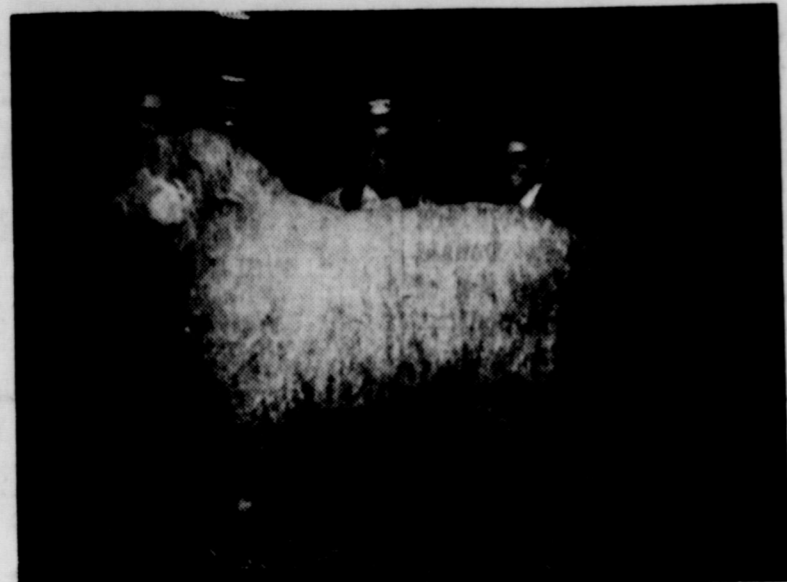
