# REV. REYNOLDS CALLED PASTOR BAPTIST CH'RCH Tribute Paid To The Early Settlers Of West Texas. Notwithstanding a fierce sandstorm

tion well which is going to prove a valuable adjunct to his crop production this year.

The well is 16 inches in diameter and was sunk to a depth of 94 feet, water being first encountered at the 15 foot carries being perforated for water admittance.

He has installed in the well a No. 12 Peeriess 2-stage centrifugal pump, capable of handling 1.400 gallons of water per minute, which is now being propelled by an Alice Chalmers farm tractor. However, he expects soon to install a stationary engine to handle the pump.


