Free Vaccination Clinic On Wednesday

A free vaccination clinic for children from age of 3 months thru high school is scheduled for 1:30-3:30 p.m. February 16 at the Cross Plains High School Auditorium.

The clinic is a cooperative effort of the State Department of Health, the school nurse, Mrs. J. L. Ault, R. N., and local Health Officer, Dr. Carl J. Sohns. Vaccinations to be given are Polio, Measles, Rubella, Diphtheria — Tetanus — Whooping Cough, Diphtheria-Tetanus and Smallpox.

Pre-school children are asked to come at 2:30 p.m.

Texas law now requires that all children entering school must show proof that they have been immunized for diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles and rubella (German Measles). Pre-school children must also be protected against pertussis (whooping cough). At the beginning of the school year 1972-73 all immunization records must be signed by a doctor validated by a clinic.

Ronald Pope Shows High At Fort Worth

Ronald Pope, senior at Cross Plains High School and son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pope, scored well in both the junior and open shows with his lambs at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth. He garnered a first place with his ram lamb in the junior show and took sixth and seventh places respectively with his two-toothed ewe and two-toothed ram.

Pope, who showed under the banner of Cross Plains FFA, captured 10 places in the open show. His ram lamb entry was judged third, and a pair of two-toothed rams placed third and sixth. He was second and third with rams in the four to six tooth classification. A couple of his two-toothed ewes finished fourth and fifth. His ewes with four to six teeth were selected as second and fourth places, and he garnered a third place with a pair of sheep.



Gen. Johnson Presents Capt. Thompson With Silver Star

Capt. Dick Thompson Is Awarded Silver Star

U. S. Air Force Capt. Richard G. Thompson, Jr., formerly of Cross Plains, has received the Silver Star — one of the highest U. S. decorations for gallantry in combat.

Capt. Thompson earned the medal as an OV-10B forward air controller in Vietnam in December, 1970.

Air Force officials said the captain, flying in support of allied ground forces, faced intense anti-aircraft fire to attack enemy locations at Ha Thanh, Vietnam. After expending his ammunition, he remained in the area to direct tactical air strikes which destroyed the enemy positions.

Capt. Thompson is now assigned as an instructor pilot at Vance AFB, Okla., where he was presented the medal recently by Maj. Gen. George M. Johnson Jr., commander of the Oklahoma City Air Materiel Area, headquartered at Tinker AFB, Okla.

A 1962 graduate of Hillcrest High School, Dalzell, S. C. Capt.

Thompson was commissioned upon graduation from the Air Force Academy in 1966. He has earned graduate credits at the University of Southern California.

Capt. Thompson's parents, Col. and Mrs. R. G. Thompson, are presently residing in Mohringer, Germany, where he is serving in the Air Force.

His wife, Barbara Anne, is the daughter of Frank P. Ross of Martinez, Calif.

He is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Thompson of this city.

Captain and Mrs. Thompson have two children, Ross and Tye.

School District Faces 2 Vote Ballot Wednesday

Voters of Cross Plains Independent School District will go to the polls next Wednesday, Feb. 16, to approve or veto the issuance of \$180,000 in bonds and a maintenance tax to pay for the indebtedness.

It was pointed out by Wayne Ford, local superintendent, and members of the board of trustees, that both propositions must pass to allow either to be put into effect.

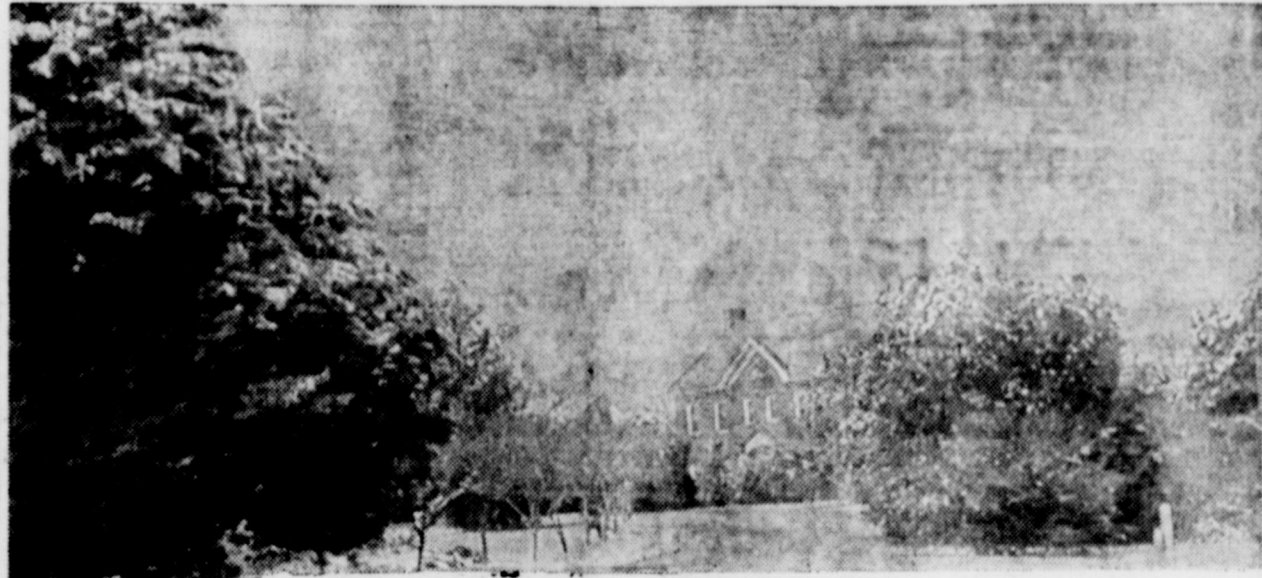
Plans call for rebuilding of the Cross Plains Elementary School building which was destroyed by fire three weeks ago. Also included in the program is improving of science laboratory facilities and homemaking department quarters. The new building, currently being designed by an architect, is reported to be modern in every way and of masonry construction.

Voting next Wednesday will be held at City Hall with polls open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Alton E. Hornsby will preside as election judge, and Mrs. Zenovia Strickland will be assistant judge.

Local trustees believe that the \$180,000 in bonds being asked can be re-paid with an increase of only about 30 cents in the tax rate per \$100 valuation. School tax rate would total about \$1.80 on each \$100 rendered value, broken down as follows:

New Traffic Laws

TRANSPORTING DIRT, SAND, GRAVEL AND OTHER LOOSE MATERIALS

A. No person shall load or transport in a motor vehicle, commercial motor vehicle, truck tractor, trailer or semi-trailer any loose material on or over the public roads, streets or highways of this state in violation of any requirement of this section.

B. As used in this section, "loose material" means dirt, sand, gravel, wood chips or other material that is capable of blowing or spilling from a vehicle as a result of movement or exposure to air, wind currents or weather, but shall not include agricultural products in their natural state.

C. The bed carrying the load must be completely enclosed on both sides, front and rear so as to prevent escape of any part of the load.

D. The top of the load making contact with any sideboard or sidepanel must not be within six inches of the top of the part of the sideboards contacted, and the highest point of the load must not be above the top of the sideboards, or the load can be covered by a canvas or similar type covering firmly secured to prevent the load from blowing or spilling upon roadway.

2 Incumbents File For Trustee Posts

Two incumbent members of the board of trustees for Cross Plains School District have filed for re-election, according to Dr. Carl J. Sohns, secretary of the board.

Filing for another three-year term were R. D. (Dick) Koenig and Lewis Fortune.

Farm Bureau Launches Membership Campaign

The Callahan County Farm Bureau will have a membership drive February 14-18 according to W. C. Vines of Albany, membership chairman.

The local organization now has 545 member-families and will be out to increase this number. The drive is part of a statewide membership drive to enroll 3,000 new members in Farm Bureau.

During the week of February

\$1.23 for local maintenance, 27 cents for retirement of existing bonded indebtedness and 30 cents for retiring the new issues.

It was further explained by George Buescher, Jr. of Abilene, bondsman for the local district, that the 57 cents applied to retirement of the bonds would bring in approximately the amount of revenue, \$29,370, needed to meet yearly payments of old and new indebtedness based on a 95 per cent tax payment each year. It was pointed out that 27 cents is currently being applied to outstanding bonds, and the increase of 30 cents will cover the new bonds. All bonds, old and new, are scheduled to be retired in 1989. New bonds, if approved, will be repaid in 17 years.

Buescher explained that based on present valuations the average assessed 30 cents increase will hold true for life of bonds, but could decrease if valuation of school district increases.

It was also pointed that litigation involving issuance and selling of school bonds has been settled and bonds may be issued and sold now.

An example of the increased cost of the 30 cent levy, if approved, follows. A house with an actual cash value of \$2,000 is on tax rolls at \$360 value. The additional bond tax would increase the total \$1.08 per year.

It was pointed out that many school districts, an estimated 60 per cent, are now assessing the maintenance or bond tax, since most operate on the \$1.50 limit on assessed valuations of property. Almost every school required to do building since the maintenance tax measure came into effect several years ago, has had to levy the additional tax to retire bonds.

A settlement was reached with insurance company on the destroyed building. The amount paid was \$68,671.09. Maximum which could have been paid was \$70,000. That amount will be used in construction and furnishing of the new building if approved.

The two propositions which shall be voted upon by marking an "X" in a box at left of the words "For or "Against" will be a proposition okaying a levy and collecting of a Maintenance Tax not to exceed \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, and a proposition giving the board of trustees authority to issue bonds up to the amount of \$180,000 for construction and improvement of the local schools.

It was recently pointed out by Vernon Phillips, school board president, that the exact cost of construction and improvements is not yet known, but he emphasized that if less than \$180,000 is needed only the required amount of bonds will be issued.

TODD McCOWEN IS SAID TO BE IMPROVED

Sen. Jack Hightower Asking Re-Election

Senator Jack Hightower has filed for re-election to the Texas Senate from the 30th District, and has authorized the Review to make the following official announcement of his candidacy.

Callahan County was made a part of the district represented by the Senator from Vernon by the re-districting recently announced by the state government.

Sen. Hightower's statement to voters follows.

Now in the mail are formal requests for a place on the ballot for the Democratic primary by Jack Hightower as a candidate for re-election to the State Senate from the 30th Senatorial District.

Sen. Hightower has been an announced candidate for some

time, but formal filing with the County Democratic Committees was delayed due to the litigation involving Senatorial district boundaries and the question of filing fees. Some of the legal questions having been resolved, it is now known which counties are included in the new 30th Senatorial District.

Senator Hightower is in his eighth year of service in the Senate. He also served one term in the Texas House of Representatives and was District Attorney of the 46th Judicial District seven years prior to his election to the Senate.

A legislative leader, Senator Hightower is Chairman of the Senate Administration Committee and has played a vital role in the improvement of the legislative process in Texas. In addition to his membership on the major Senate committees in the last regular session of the legislature, he served as President Pro Tempore of the Senate. On April 3, 1971, while serving as Acting Governor, the people of the 30th Senatorial District honored Senator Hightower and his family at "Governor-for-a-Day" events at Austin.

Senator Hightower, 45, is a native of Memphis, Hall County, Texas. He and his wife, the former Colleen Ward of Tulsa, Texas, have three daughters, Ann, 19, a student at Baylor University; Amy, 15, and Allison, 12.

S.S. Can Answer Medicare Queries

Some people may be confused by advertising which seems to suggest that some private health insurance plans have an official connection with Medicare, according to James Smith Field Representative of the social security office in Abilene.

"Some advertising may, at first glance, suggest that a private company has access to Medicare records," Smith said. "Some may use envelopes similar to the envelopes used to send out monthly social security checks. The names of some of the private health insurance companies may resemble a Government bureau."

The facts are, Smith said: "Medicare records are confidential by law. Private insurance companies do not have access to Medicare records. Even if the company is a Medicare carrier or intermediary, its authorized employees are restricted in their use of Medicare records."

"People who have questions about private health insurance advertising that involves Medicare should get in touch with James Smith who visits Cross Plains regularly. See the current schedule at the Post Office here."

It's A Fact

IT'S A FACT

Farmers can use the optional method of reporting farm income even if they incur a loss, if they gross at least \$600 from their farming operations. By using such optional method of reporting, the self-employed farmer can insure enough social security work credits for future retirement, survivor's or disability benefits, as well as Medicare benefits.

IT'S A FACT

There is a special rule to help Medicare beneficiaries in meeting the \$50 deductible. If you have Medicare expenses in the last months of a year which can be counted toward your \$50 deductible for that year, they will also be counted toward the \$50 annual deductible for the year. This is called the carry-over rule. So, even if you have not met the \$50 deductible before October, be sure to send in all the bills for covered services you received in Oct., Nov., or December. The carry-over will be credited to your deductible for both years.

IT'S A FACT

You should apply for Medicare three months before age 62. However, if you are receiving monthly social security checks, an enrollment card will be mailed to you about two months before age 65. In that case, you do not have to see the social security representative to apply for Medicare; just return the card.

IT'S A FACT

Farm workers must be paid \$150 or more by an employer during the year, or perform agricultural service for the employer on at least 20 days in a calendar year for their wages to be covered by social security.

IT'S A FACT

A woman worker age 62 or over may receive monthly retirement social security payments based on her own work even though her husband is still working and earning too much to receive his retirement payment.

IT'S A FACT

The medical insurance part of Medicare will help to pay for the rental or purchase of durable medical equipment, such as a wheelchair, when prescribed by a doctor.

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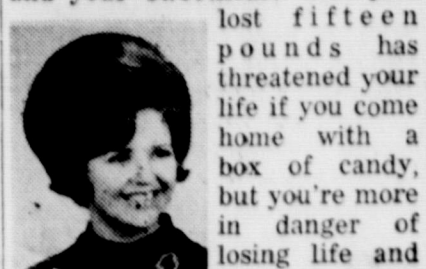

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
