Grand Jury Indicts McCowen, 2 More

Three persons were indicted by a 42nd District Court grand jury at Baird Monday.

Two indictments were returned against Charles Vincent McCowen of Cross Plains. "Murder with a motor vehicle" charges were found against McCowen in the death of Darlene McCowen and Jasper Lewis Cearley, according to Beatrice

Deal, county-district clerk, in a two-car automobile accident on January 8, 1972, at a county road intersection with Farm Road 880, near Cottonwood.

One indictment, reading in part "through accident and mistake", was returned by the grand jury in each fatality.

The fatally injured were McCowen's wife and her brother. Other true bills returned

were against T. A. Bird, no address given, for "driving while intoxicated", and a charge of "homicide by vehicle" was returned against Milton Eugene Broyles, no address given, in the death of Kathryn Gibson, no address listed, in an accident on Oct. 6, 1971. Site and date of the mishap was not immediately available from county officials.

Putnam Superintendent Heads Small Schools

In a meeting at Cisco Junior College on Wednesday morning of last week, R. W. Reynolds, superintendent of the Putnam Schools, was elected to serve as chairman of a newly organized district of the Texas Small Schools Project.

Superintendents from Gorman, Carbon and Moran were also present along with Dale Carmichael from the Texas Education Agency and Bob Maniss of the Region XIV Education Service Center.

All schools represented are members of the Region XIV

Small School Project which has been meeting at Rule. The new district was organized as a convenience to the schools in the southeast part of Region XIV.

The Putnam School was one of the 17 original pilot schools of the Texas Small Schools Project which was organized in 1960 to help the small schools of Texas keep pace with modern trends in education.

Reynolds is a firm believer in the project, and he feels that without it, many small schools still operating would not exist today.

Little Interest Seen In Primary, Voting May 6

Interest in upcoming primary elections may be less than normal this election year.

Only one county-wide office is being contested in the Democratic Primary election, scheduled for Saturday, May 6. That is the contest for nomination for Sheriff of Callahan County between incumbent Grayson Miller of Baird and newcomer to county-wide politics Billy C. McMillan of Cross Plains.

Although the sheriff's race

is the only one which is contested which will concern all Callahanians, a heated contest is expected in Commissioner's Precinct 1, Baird. Pitted are incumbent Ivrin Corn, and three others. They are Tommy Tucker, Ralph McAdams and Cecil Mings.

On the local scene Justice of the Peace post of Precinct 6 is to be filled. McMillan, who is seeking the office of county sheriff, resigned that place recently. L. P. (Pender) Mitchell, who was appointed by county officials to fill the job until the general election in November, is the only candidate for the job.

Two other county officials drew no opposition in bids for re-election. They are Albert Lovell, tax assessor-collector, and Jame Paul Shanks, county attorney.

Other precinct and Democratic Party officers seeking re-election without opponents are: Glen Curtis, constable of Precinct 1, Baird; James Snyder, Democratic Chairman of Precinct 1, Baird; Hugh W. Ross, County Democratic Chairman; R. B. Cunningham, Constable Precinct 8, Putnam; Lee Savell, Justice of the Peace of Precinct 5, Clyde; F. P. (Jiggs) Shackelford, County Commissioner of Precinct 3, Putnam.

New Patrolman Due Here On March 1

Vaccinate For VEE Horsemen Urged

Horseowners throughout Texas are urged to "get the jump" on VEE, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, that deadly sleeping sickness of horses. All horses that were not vaccinated last year should be vaccinated as soon as possible.

It was less than a year ago that the disease swept into the state from Mexico, killing hundreds of horses in its path.

The 1972 campaign against VEE calls for vaccination of all equidae (horses, mules and donkeys) not vaccinated last year, points out Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In addition to Texas, the vaccination campaign will include the Gulf Coast states and states adjoining Mexico. All these states have been designated "high risk" states by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Armstrong lists four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now — (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently moved into the state; (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive; (3) foals vaccinated under six months of age; (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Service believe that VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. So, it's important to vaccinate now before mosquitoes which transmit the disease emerge in the warm months ahead, emphasizes Armstrong.

This year the vaccination program will be conducted at the horse owner's expense. Commercial vaccine is available and must be administered by a veterinarian.

Vaccination will provide immunity for more than a year and possibly longer, notes Armstrong. If there is some doubt as to whether horses were vaccinated last year, it is best to

vaccinate again, he added. Texas is still under federal quarantine for VEE. Thus horses must have been vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the state for other areas, explains the veterinarian. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo or other means.

About 92 per cent of Texas' estimated horse population of 625,000 head were vaccinated in 1971. Almost 800 Texas veterinarians participated in the vaccination campaign. More than 2.8 million horses were vaccinated in 19 states and the District of Columbia last year.

By appearance, VEE is not distinguishable from Eastern and Western forms of encephalitis. Symptoms range from fever, loss of appetite and depression to stupor, weakness, staggering, blindness and death. More than 60 per cent of infected horses die, according to the veterinarian.

Armstrong encourages all horse owners to report any sickness in horses suspected of being encephalitis to local veterinarians.

A surveillance program is underway to check for possible infection in a variety of wild and domestic animals in the critical Gulf Coast and Mexican border states.

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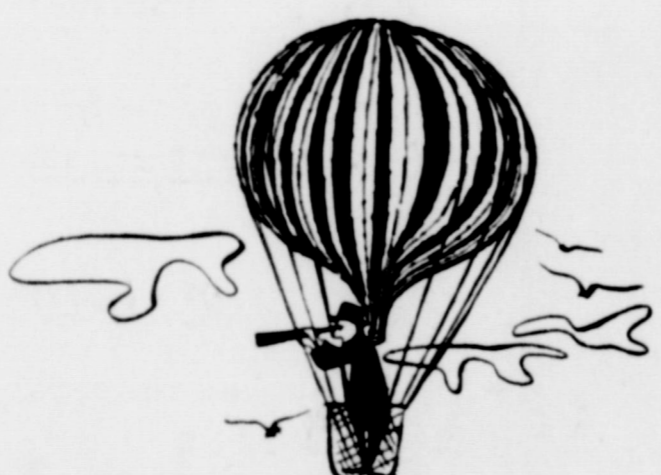

Near 4,000 Qualify To Vote In County

Albert Lovell, county tax assessor-collector whose office in Baird handles voter registrations, reported Monday that as of February 1 a total of 3,969 Callahanians had qualified to vote. He added that not too many more had been registered since that time, although registrations may now be made at any time. 4,771 Area Children Getting S.S. Checks

About 4 million children receive social security checks every month, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

These children are eligible for payments because a parent, either mother or father, with enough work under social security has retired, become disabled, or died, Tuley said.

The largest number, over 2.7 million, receive payments because a parent has died. Nearly 1 million collect benefits as dependents of a disabled parent. And, over 1/2 million get checks as children of retired workers, the district manager said.

"Eligible children can get benefits until they're 18. And, if they continue in school full time and are single, they can get monthly checks until they are 22," Tuley said. "Today, there are over 1/2 million 'student' beneficiaries between 18 and 22."

In the 15-county Abilene District there are 4771 children getting monthly social security checks. Seven hundred seventy one of these are 18 to 22 years of age, Tuley said.

New Traffic Laws

This is one of a series of articles furnished by the Texas Department of Public Safety on the traffic laws passed by Texas' 62nd Legislature.

HOMICIDE BY VEHICLE

Whoever shall unlawfully and unintentionally (with a conscious disregard for the rights of others) cause the death of another person while engaged in the violation of any State law or municipal ordinance applying to the operation or use of a vehicle shall be guilty of homicide when such violation is the cause of said death.

Any person convicted of homicide by vehicle shall be fined not less than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) nor more than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000), or shall be imprisoned in the county jail not less than three (3) months nor more than one (1) year, or may be so fined and so imprisoned.
