Sketchy reports received in Cross Plains Tuesday indicated that Bill Hunter, who has also been transferred to San Antonio at the burn center, indicated that he is considered improved and physicians believe he will recover satisfactorily.

Ken is reported to be only slightly improved, having overcome a serious complication last Saturday. The report indicated that he has had severe respiratory difficulties. It was pointed out that he is now thought to be "holding his own", but it is expected to be at least three more weeks before any siginificant recovery can be expected.

The fund being raised in this area for the Hunter family totaled \$356.00 on Tuesday morning, according to officials of the Citizens State Bank where the money is being held.
