Three Cross Plains High School basketball players were elected to 10-A All-District basketball squads by coaches of the league in meeting at Early Wednesday night of last week. Two Buffettes were selected to the 12-player feminine squad, and one Buffalo was chosen on the male 11-player team. Miss Terry Edington and Miss Anna Smith were Cross Plains representatives on the 10-A elite unit, and Rodney Renfro was the Bison named to the male squad. Miss Edington is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. (Hick) Edington. She was selected at a forward position. The junior is a repeat from last year's team. She was the Buffettes' leading scorer the past season. Miss Smith is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. R. Hargrove. She is a sophomore and was one of only two players under a junior to be named to the unit. She was named at a guard post. Renfro, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Renfro, was a unanimous choice to the 10-A unit. He shared that honor with five other players, all of whom were seniors. Renfro was a leading Buff scorer and ball handler throughout the season. The cage honor was his first, but was named to all-district football team last fall. Area friends have opened a "Bill Hunter and Son Fund" at the Citizens State Bank here, and persons wanting to contribute to the fund to help defray living expenses and medical bills, can mail or leave their contribution at the local bank. Hunter and his 12-year-old son, Ken, were cleaning or re-fueling a tractor Sunday afternoon, Feb. 27, when a flash fire enveloped them in flames. Ken was reported to have suffered second and third degree burns over 80 percent of his body, and his father sustained critical burns on his hands, arms, face and stomach. Sketchy reports received in Cross Plains Tuesday indicated that Bill Hunter, who has also been transferred to San Antonio at the burn center, indicated that

he is considered improved and physicians believe he will recover satisfactorily. Ken is reported to be only slightly improved, having overcome a serious complication last Saturday. The report indicated that he has had severe respiratory difficulties. It was pointed out that he is now thought to be "holding his own", but it is expected to be at least three more weeks before any significant recovery can be expected. The fund being raised in this area for the Hunter family totaled \$356.00 on Tuesday morning, according to officials of the Citizens State Bank where the money is being held. ## New Traffic Laws

This is one of a series of articles furnished by the Texas Department of Public Safety on the traffic laws passed by Texas' 62nd Legislature.

### CUTTING ACROSS CERTAIN PROPERTY PROHIBITED

No person driving a vehicle shall cross a sidewalk or drive through a driveway, parking lot, or business or residential entrance without bringing the vehicle to a complete stop. No person driving a vehicle shall cross, drive in or on such sidewalks, driveways, parking lots or entrances at an intersection for the purpose of making either a right or left turn from one street or highway to another street or highway.

### EMERGING FROM ALLEY, DRIVEWAY OR BUILDING

The driver of a vehicle within a business or residence district emerging from an alley, driveway or building shall stop such vehicle immediately prior to driving into a sidewalk area and shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian as may be necessary. Upon entering the roadway shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching on said roadway.

I think the idea of Mrs. Gale's (Mrs. Duane Gale, the former Marlene Freeman) in last week's paper (Review of February 23) about ex-students contributing was a marvelous idea. "We feel a closeness to Cross Plains schools, because our oldest daughter, Terri, is attending high school there now. All our children attended grade school there for the past two years." A "Snoopy" bank is being circulated at the local school system for donations. Superintendent Wayne Ford advised Monday that Snoopy held \$110.06 in deposit slips. Cash is not being put into the bank. The check from Mr. and Mrs. Woody had not been deposited at time of the report.

## Callahan County Shares In Highway Programs

Callahan County shared in a recent letting of contracts for maintaining and improving hard surface roads by the Texas Highway Commission. A total of \$1.7 million dollars was allocated for the various projects in the Abilene District. Callahan County received two paving projects, totaling just over 10 miles on major thoroughfares, and three seal coating projects on farm roads. A contract for \$459,605.50 was awarded H. L. Freeland, Inc. and George Amthor, Inc. of San Antonio for hot mix cold laid asphaltic concrete pavement on 26.7 miles of highways in the Abilene area. Approximately eight-tenths of a mile of that work will be done in Cross Plains. That project calls for the work to be done on State Highway 206 from its intersection with State Highway 36 northward eight-tenths of a mile. Major project is in western Callahan County and, according to District Highway engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene, is a part of the 1973-74 consolidated Highway Program for the two year period just authorized by the Highway Commission. An expenditure of \$476,500 has been approved for highway construction by the state commission for 9.6 miles of State Highway 36. The project runs from 6.8 miles southeast of Abilene to Highway 36 intersection with U. S. Highway 283, the Baird-Coleman road. Contracts for three seal coating projects have been let. The entire contract of 153.4 miles at a cost of \$336,608.40 was awarded to J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc. of Tye. The three Callahan County projects total about 20 miles. They are five-tenths of a mile on Spur 193 from Interstate 20 to Farm Road 604 in Clyde; eight and seven-tenths miles on Farm Road 18 from Clyde to Baird and nine and nine-tenths miles on Farm Road 2926 from Oplin to U. S. Highway 283 intersection.

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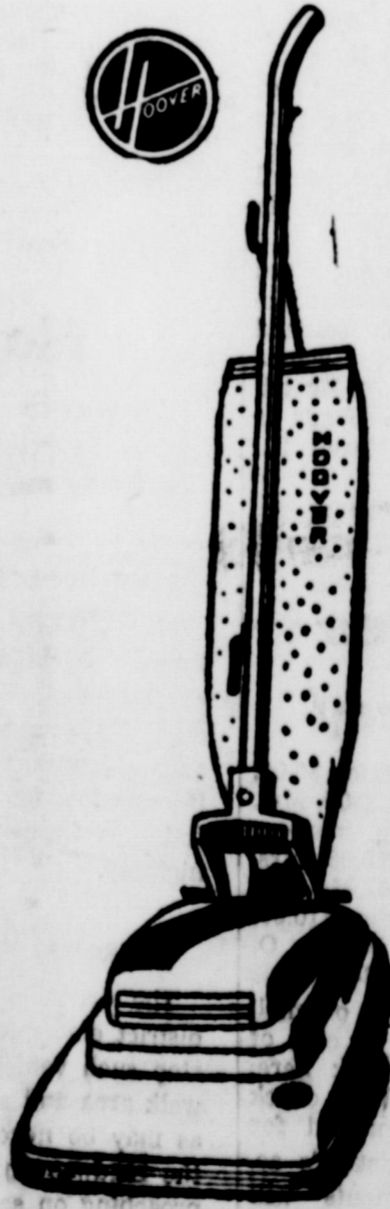

# HOME HINTS

Noise pollution. A pollution you can do something about right now — at least within your own home. We talked about it some last week. Let's look at it a little more.

Some household noise problems begin outside the home. Unwanted sound (a good definition of the word "noise") such as heavy traffic and neighborhood noise, carries indoors where it presents the same problems as noise that originates inside.

Generally, of course, outside noise is the hardest to eliminate. There's not much you can do to stop the traffic! You can, however, erect some sort of partition between your home and the street.

A tall, airtight fence placed close to the street makes a good sound baffle, as do trees and hedges. If the problem is at the front of the house such a barrier might give the impression that it's people you are trying to cut out of your life instead of noise, though.

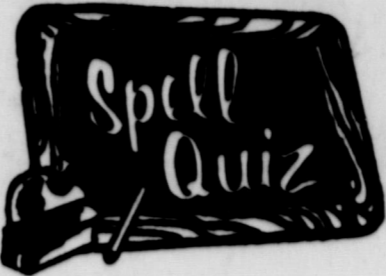
