## **Arthur Boyle Named Grammar** School Head; Teachers Hired

Cross Plains schools will have one less teacher during the school year of 1972-73, according to an announcement by Superintendent Wayne Ford. The loss will cut the local

faculty to 18 classroom teachers. The school system presently has 19 instructors. Ford said that in order for a

school to have 19 classroom teachers, an average daily attendance of a minimum of 445 pupils is required. Average daily attendance at the local educational facility is currently running in the neighborhood

Board of Trustees of the local plant recently renewed contracts for 16 classroom teachers and named a new principal of the elementary school.

Authur A. Boyle has been named principal of the elementary school for the next complete school term. He will assume duties effective July 1. 1972, and the contract runs through June 30, 1973.
