S. F. (Fos) Bond Celebrates 99th Birthday Thursday

Oldest citizen of Cross Plains, and possibly in Callahan County, passed his 99th birthday last Thursday. He is S. F. (Fos) Bond.

Fos, as he is respectfully and lovingly known to his countless friends in this area, was born in Holly Springs, Miss., on March 16, 1873. He came to Cross Plains when a lad of 11. Since then he has known the joy and contentment of success and the heartbreak of deep disappointment and failure. Through it all, though, he has kept his sparkling personality and witty humor.

Fos first saw Cross Plains on either Friday or Saturday, Nov. 14 or 15, 1884, as he puts it. It was at the end of a 200-mile cattle drive, and after he and his family had spent 17 days on the trail moving the herd numbering about 750 head.

He recalls, along with many other reminiscences, the drive came through Crafton in Wise County on Tuesday, Nov. 4, which after he inquired of his father, Epp Bond, was election day. By Saturday the drive had reached South Bend and the cattle crew camped at the Clear Fork of the Brazos joining the Brazos for some rest. While coming through Graham City the father had learned that Grover Cleveland had been elected President of the United States, the first Democrat to win the nation's top spot since the Civil War.

Settlers around South Bend came to the cattle camp and asked if the drovers had news of how the election turned out. Fos said that some were delighted and some were very concerned about the outcome. Upon reaching Cross Plains the family stayed and became an integral part of early Cross Plains history.

The house now occupied by Mr. Bond and his daughter, Pauline, at corner of East Ninth Street and Avenue C, was built by Epp Bond. He is pictured behind Fos in the above photo.

The 99th birth date was spent quietly by Fos and his daughter, with only the Review photographer and a few close friends breaking the everyday routine of his still active life.

New Traffic Laws

OVERTAKING AND PASSING SCHOOL BUS

The driver of a vehicle upon a highway INSIDE or OUTSIDE of a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle before reaching such school bus when there is in operation on said school bus flashing red lights, and said driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the flashing red lights are no longer on.

UNATTENDED MOTOR VEHICLE

No person driving or in charge of a motor vehicle shall permit it to stand unattended without first stopping the engine, locking the ignition and effectively setting the brake thereon and, when standing upon any grade, turning the front wheels to the curb or side of the highway.

Arthur Boyle Named Grammar School Head; Teachers Hired

Cross Plains schools will have one less teacher during the school year of 1972-73, according to an announcement by Superintendent Wayne Ford.

The loss will cut the local faculty to 18 classroom teachers. The school system presently has 19 instructors.

Ford said that in order for a school to have 19 classroom teachers, an average daily attendance of a minimum of 445 pupils is required. Average daily attendance at the local educational facility is currently running in the neighborhood of 435.

Board of Trustees of the local plant recently renewed contracts for 16 classroom teachers and named a new principal of the elementary school.

Arthur A. Boyle has been named principal of the elementary school for the next complete school term. He will assume duties effective July 1, 1972, and the contract runs through June 30, 1973.

Boyle, a native of Burkett, where he is presently residing, accepted a position as an elementary teacher in the local system three years ago. He has previously been associated with teaching and administration

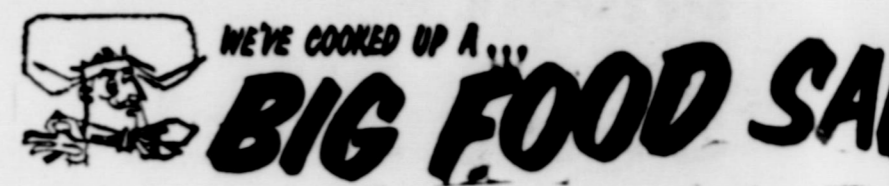

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

We promised a few more tips on the solution to noise pollution. Here they are:

Vibration noises can be reduced by placing rubber or cork pads under heavy appliances and by installing inserts in pipes and ducts. Also, acoustical tiles cemented to the wall around a washer, dryer, or dishwasher will greatly reduce annoying machinery noise.

Using rubber waste cans and rubber dustpans will eliminate clatter.

Heavy draperies and upholstered furniture absorb sound.

Flexible bends and joints in heating ducts will reduce structurally carried vibration noise.

Rubber hose inserts in water lines will stop noise from coming through the pipes. A simple pressure reducing valve may reduce the knock and hammer of a hot water heating system.

Nylon roller reduce the noise of a garage door being opened or closed.

A kitchen or bathroom ventilating fan can be mounted in the attic and connected to its exhaust grille by a fiberglass duct to lessen electrical motor noise.

To cut plumbing noises, replace the metal banding, hangers and clips on pipelines with resilient substitutes. Insulate the collars of supports to reduce the noisy expansion and contraction of pipes, and wrap

the pipes themselves in insulation, particularly when they are close to the house structure. Tightly seal the openings where pipes pass through walls with a cushioning material. Air chambers installed at outlets can stop "water hammer" knocks as the water is turned on and off.

Area rugs and cushion-backed vinyl soften floor noises, but thick-pile carpet and adequate underpadding gives the best floor sound control in an existing home. An exposed basement ceiling can, of course, be treated with insulation between the joints and/or acoustical ceiling tiles to cut first-floor underfoot noise. In new construction, insulation can be applied over the sub-floor and covered with protective plywood before the final flooring is applied. Here, too, carpet and padding noticeably lessen impact noise.
