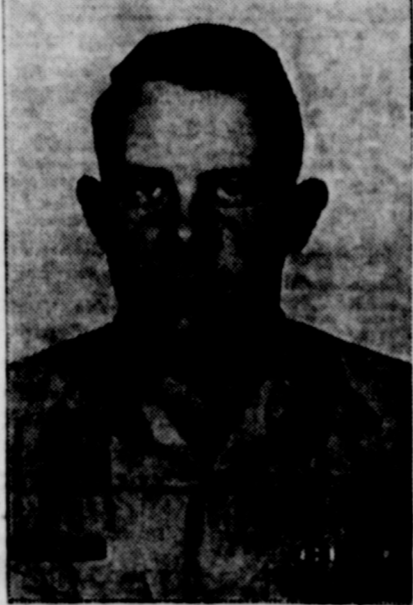

More than 23,000 Army, Air Force, Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard personnel took part in the largest joint operation to be conducted in the United States since the Vietnam buildup in 1965. The exercise, dubbed "Gallant Hand", was the first in a series of large-scale maneuvers planned by the U. S. Readiness Command.

School Calendar For 1972-73 Terms Told

Wayne Ford, superintendent of Cross Plains schools, has released the calendar for the 1972-73 school terms, as approved by the board of trustees.

As required by state statutes, Cross Plains students will attend 180 days of school which is broken down into six, six-week periods. Teachers will have an extra 10 days of work or in-service training.

Actual classes will begin on August 21, but instructors will begin five days of training on August 14. Other work days not associated with students in actual classroom activities will be Oct. 16, Jan. 2, 1973, Jan. 12 or 19 and May 18 and 21.

Regular classes will end for members of the senior class on May 15, 1973, but other students will attend classes through May 17.

Final examinations will be held on May 18, 1973.

Senior Vesper Service is scheduled for May 20 with graduation exercises slated on May 21.

Student holidays, as set up by the board are: Sept. 4, 1972, Labor Day; Oct. 16, 1972, teachers convention; Nov. 23 and 24, 1972, Thanksgiving; Dec. 23, 1972, through Jan. 2, 1973, Christmas and New Year's; Jan. 12 or 19, 1973, Callahan County Junior Livestock Show, and April 20 and 23, 1973, Easter.

The six, six-week periods are slated as follows: Aug. 21 through Sept. 28; Sept. 29 — Nov. 10; Nov. 13 — Dec. 22; Jan. 3 — Feb. 14, 1973; Feb. 15 — March 28, and March 29 — May 17.

Callahan And Eastland Trail Area Bond Sales

February sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Callahan County totaled \$3,846, according to County Bond Chairman Howard E. Farmer. Sales for the two month period were \$20,235, 16 per cent of the 1972 sales goal of \$130,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$19,273,003 compared to \$17,302,962 during February 1971 — an increase of 11 per cent. Sales for the first two months totaled \$38,638,596 for 19 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$202.3 million.

National sales during Feb. were \$573 million, 24.5 per cent above 1971 sales of \$431 million. The first two month sales totaled \$1,058 million, 22.9 per cent above a year earlier.

Coleman County leads Callahan, Comanche, Brown and Eastland counties in the percentage of its 1972 goal reached through February with 26

Robert I. Brown, Jr. reports February sales of \$10,922 and an aggregate of \$43,076. The per cent. Bond Chairman county's quota for this year is \$120,000.

Brown County ranks second with 21 per cent of the quota reached. Bond chairman M. L. Evans, Jr. reports February sales of \$26,296 and a total of \$67,968. The county's goal for the year is \$330,000.

Comanche County ranks third with 17 per cent of its goal reached through February. Jack W. Moore, bond chairman, reports February sales of \$19,629 and an aggregate of \$27,815. Goal for the county this year is \$160,000.

Callahan and Eastland counties are last, each with 16 per cent of the quota reached. Eastland County, which has no bond chairman, has a quota of \$300,000. Sales in February totaled \$23,405 for an aggregate of \$47,221.

Social Security Aids Elderly Independence

As more and more people 65 and over have received social security checks during the past 20 years, fewer and fewer of them have to make their homes with relatives.

Of the 12 million people 65 and over in 1952, two million monthly social security checks and at least a million lived with relatives, according to R. R. Tukey, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

"Today, there are more than 20 million people 65 and over," he said. "Sixteen million get social security checks and just over five million live with relatives."

Social security is believed to have contributed to the live-alone trend, according to Tukey.

"A recent study by the Social Security Administration shows that most people 65 and over prefer to live on their own if they have enough income," he said. "Social security payments have become the largest single share of their income — now about 34 per cent."

Since 1952, the average monthly social security check paid to a retired worker has increased from \$50 to \$131. The number of people who get social security retirement benefits has increased from 2 million to nearly 17 million.

Some of the people getting retirement checks are under 65, including wives, dependent husbands, and retired workers who begin collecting reduced benefits at 62, 63 or 64.

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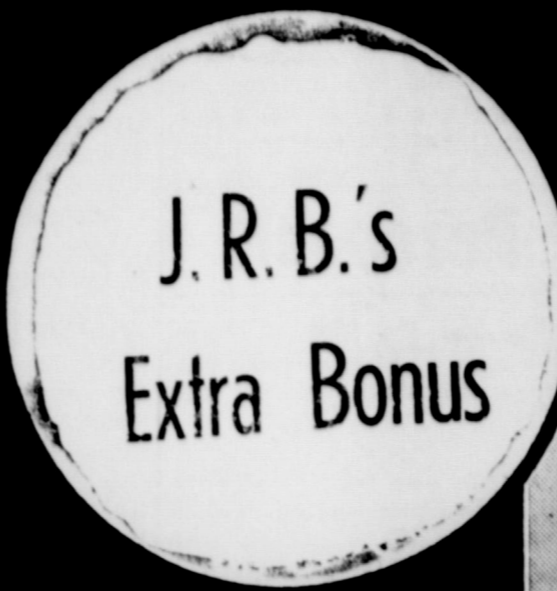

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

Separate yolk and whites of hard cooked eggs. Force yolks through a sieve. Mix the whites into 1 recipe of medium white sauce. Toast and butter 2 slices of bread. Spread the white sauce over the toast and sprinkle yolks over the top. Garnish and serve.

And to go with some of the other eggs you just "happen

to have on hand" after Easter Sunday, fix an extra special bread. My Mom has a favorite that just hits the spot. The name? Easter Lilies. Most appropo, don't you think?! The reason they are named this is that the dough is shaped to resemble an Easter lily and a filling in the center makes the stem area of the flower. Mom always mixes her own delicious roll dough, but you could easily shape prepared doughs such as the refrigerated crescent dinner rolls into the trumpet shape that is the Easter lily. Here's the recipe for the filling and you can take it from there. Be sure to put a simple icing on the rolls while they're still hot for extra goodness.

EASTER LILY ROLLS
FILLING: 2 Tablespoons sugar; 1/2 cup raisins; 1/4 cup chopped nuts; 1 tablespoon flour; 1/4 cup boiling water. Mix sugar and flour. Add raisins and water. Simmer 10 minutes to thicken. Add nuts. Cool.

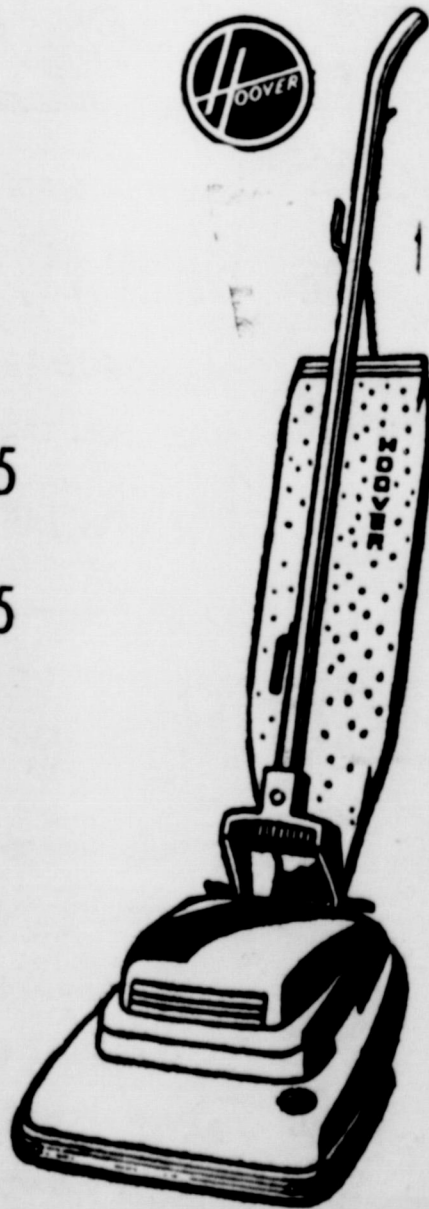

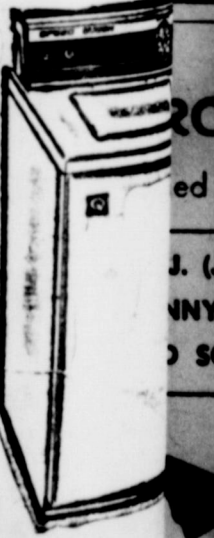
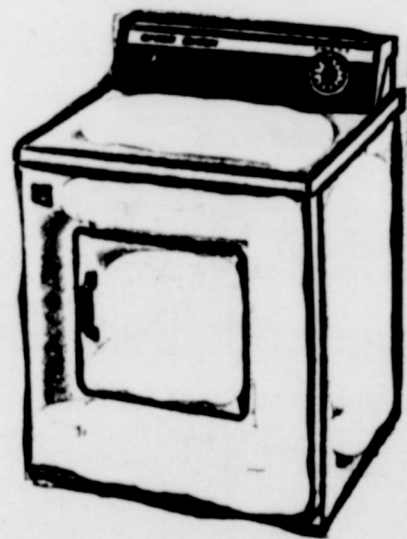

CTO Gets Governor's Okay Of Big Grant

Governor Preston Smith has announced his approval of a community action grant of \$119,250 in federal funds to Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. in Coleman for operation of the agency's programs.
 The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective May 1, 1972, through April 30, 1973. Program accounts and the amount of federal funds allotted each are: administration, \$48,278; and general community programming, \$70,972.
 Through general community programming the agency will utilize neighborhood centers to implement job placement as only one Texas Employment Commission office is located in the agency's six-county area of service, Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch, Runnels counties. Efforts will also be made to entice industry to the area; 140 person will be trained as nurse aids; 150 youths will receive leadership training and be involved in community improvements projects and elderly persons will be involved in projects designed for their special interests. Approximately 400 persons will be trained in the proper use of food commodities, 700 involved in gardening and canning projects and 100 will receive food on an emergency basis.

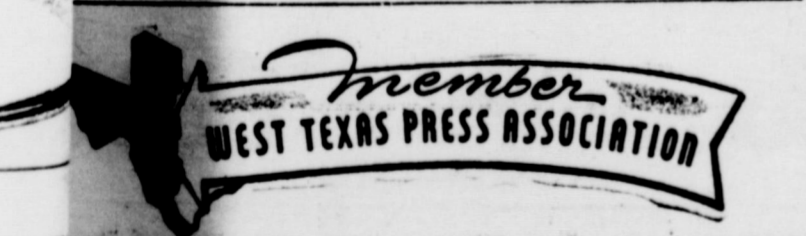
