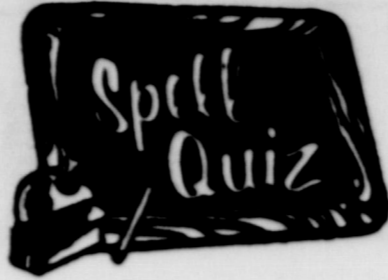
Mr. Morris was dead on arrival at a Coleman hospital at 9:45 a.m. Monday.
