City Sales Tax Election Scheduled Here June 20

Voters of the City of Cross Plains will okay or veto adoption of a one per cent sales tax within the corporate limits of the city on Tuesday, June 20.

City Council has called for the election on that date, citing that if approved the date will allow earliest possible collection of the levy.

The Texas 60th Legislature authorized the governing body of any city to call an election for adoption of the one per cent

sales tax for use within the township.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield said that the tax will be applicable only to the items now taxed by the state, adding that it would cost local residents and transients only one cent on the dollar more.

Burchfield added that with the added revenue it was believed that local real and personal property tax rate could remain at present level.

City government had no definite figure of expected return on the tax, but the mayor opined that between \$10,000 and \$12,000 would come to the city. Burchfield said that collections from other area cities of similar size of Cross Plains, all of which have the city tax, run in that neighborhood.

It was pointed out that if the tax is approved, one calendar quarter must elapse before collections begin. That would mean

local merchants would not begin collecting the added one per cent until the last quarter of the year, October through December. Payments would be made to the state as usual in January.

City would not be paid by the State Comptroller for initial quarter collections until after April 1, 1973.

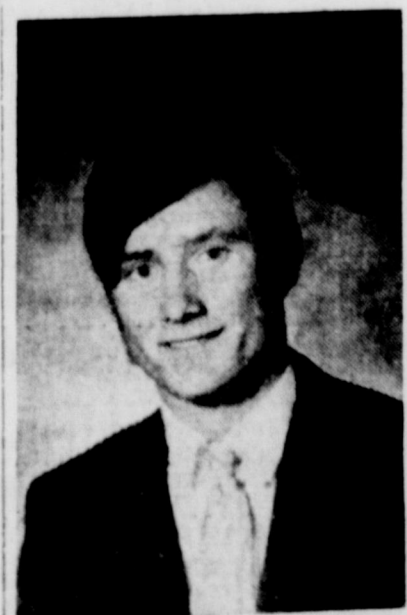

It is hereby found and determined that the Cross Plains Review is a newspaper published within the City of Cross Plains, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.

Section 7. That Ordinance No. 57, as an emergency measure, be read only once to the governing body, due to the time element involved.

It was reported today by Charles Wohlstetter, chairman. Consolidated net income was \$10,498,000, which compares with \$9,779,000.

Revenues and sales in the three months ended March 31 were \$108,798,000, a gain of 8 per cent over last year's volume of \$101,133,000.

All 1971 figures have been restated to include companies subsequently acquired on a pooling of interests basis and to reflect retroactive prior years' Federal income tax adjustments.

Net income from telephone operations rose 10 per cent to \$9,697,000 from 8,805,000. Operating revenues were up 14 per cent to 75,110,000 from \$65,951,000, with toll revenue again accounting for more than half the total. Earnings and revenues from telephone operations have increased without interruption ever since establishment of the Continental System in 1961.
