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## No Contract Awarded On New Elementary Building

No bid was awarded nor contract issued after Cross Plains Independent School District Board of Trustees opened the sealed bids for construction of a new elementary school here last Thursday afternoon.

The lowest bid was about \$27,000 higher than the board wishes to pay. No bids had been entirely rejected.

Supt. Wayne Ford said this week that several alternatives are now open to the board. Architect Don Hampton of Sweetwater is talking with the two lowest bidders for possible changes or replacements to bring the figures down to the \$190,000 to \$195,000 range.

Lowest bidder was Armstrong Construction Co. of Breckenridge which asked \$219,450 for the job, to be done in 240 calendar days.

Next lowest was G. Leonard Day Construction Co. of Rising Star which bid \$227,722, also to be finished in 240 calendar days.

Other three bids were: Burl Nash Contractor of Abilene, \$235,179, in 220 days; Rose & Son Construction, Inc. of Abilene, \$235,800, in 145 days; and H & G Construction Co. of Abilene, \$239,900, in 210 days.

Ford said that the trustees simply figured bids were for

the architect is working with the two lowest bidders to bring the price asked in line. He is due to report back to the board this week. It is expected that the board will have to make some concessions and alternatives were built in the original plans to compensate for this event.

If satisfactory price cuts are made, trustees expect to sign a work order and have work begun on the new building within 10 days after the signing.

It was pointed out by Ford that the school has about \$247,000 to invest in the new building. He explained, however,

far too much money. Therefore that a portion of that is being reserved to furnish the various rooms and facilities. "We do not wish to short furnishings," he stated.

Ford pointed out that the school will probably have to run the first semester of the past school year on the same basis of the latter part of the past year. Some classes were housed at the First Baptist Church.

A large turnout was present at the bid opening Thursday in the school cafeteria. An estimated 50 persons attended including contractors, sub-contractors and local residents.

## "Red Alert" Sounded On Screwworm Assault

A "red alert" is being sounded throughout the state as screwworms continue to assault livestock and other animals, says Greg Grengross, County Agricultural Agent, Callahan County has not recorded any cases to date, but it's most important that all animals be checked closely and regularly for infestations, Grengross said.

Weather conditions were favorable for heavy screwworm builds last winter in northern Mexico as well as in parts of the Southwest. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild winter in new quarters. This spring overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive screwworm invasion.

According to County Agricultural Agent, Greg Grengross, more than 2,300 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak, 200 million a week, treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, flesh-eating livestock pest. Grengross urges all livestock producers and owners of other animals (dog, cats) to follow certain precautions:

1. Carry out all approved preventive practices to help eliminate screwworms.
2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not.
3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall. Shearing, docking, castrating and dehorning only provide additional wounds for worm infestations. Studies show that almost 90 percent of all worm samples come from calf navels and man-made wounds.
4. Spray animals with an approved product before shipping them. This is a preventive measure against spreading the

5. Be cautious of livestock shipments coming from infested areas. If buying such animals, be sure to check them thoroughly for wormy wounds.

6. Care should be taken not to move infested livestock across state lines. Infestations resulting from this practice may bring about a quarantine and the regulated movement of livestock.

7. As soon as a wormy wound is found, send a worm sample to the Screwworm Laboratory, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. If the case is positive, sterile flies will be dropped as soon as possible to further protect animals in the area.

"Everyone must cooperate if the screwworm eradication program is to be effective", emphasizes Grengross. "This means farmers, ranchers, pet owners, auction managers and others who work with or own animals".

## Demo Run-Off Saturday; Special Ballot Tuesday

Two elections will face Cross Plains and Callahan County voters within four days.

Saturday, June 3, the Democratic Primary run-off is scheduled. Only one race is on the ballot which concerns only Callahan County, and that is in Commissioner's Precinct 1, which includes Baird, Clyde and Eula. That pits incumbent Irvin Corn against challenger Tommy Tucker.

There is no countywide race

in Callahan.

An expected moderate turnout is forecast at all seven county boxes, however, because of the hotly contested races for Governor between Dolph Briscoe and Mrs. Frances Farenthold, Lieutenant Governor between Bill Hobby and Wayne Connally, and U. S. Senate between Ralph Yarborough and Barefoot Sanders.

Polls will be open at the City Hall in Cross Plains from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., according to Alton E. Hornsby, precinct democratic chairman who will preside as judge.

Voters have been warned by Texas Secretary of State Bob Bullock to "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6".

It was noted that reports from several county clerks indicated that some Republicans are being tempted to switch and vote in the Democratic run-off. Bullock said, "We want the public to know that this action violates Article 240 of the Texas Election Code and is punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$500."

On Tuesday, June 6, a special election will be held to fill the unexpired term for State Senator from District 24.

County officials report that just one name will appear on the ballot. That is Bill Tippen of Abilene.

The election became necessary when Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford resigned under charges of nepotism. Callahan County will move to the 30th Senatorial District in January 1973 which is represented by Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon.

Polls will be in the City Hall in Cross Plains and will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

## Coleman Tops 5-County Area Saving Bond Sales

During April there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$15,831, according to Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales for the first four months of 1972 totaled \$51,086, 39 per cent of the 1972 goal of \$130,000.

Coleman County leads Callahan, Comanche, Brown and Eastland counties in the percentage of its 1972 goal reached through April with 46 per cent. Robert L. Brown Jr., bond chairman, reports April sales of \$4,231 and an aggregate of \$55,460. Goal for the county this year is \$120,000.

Brown County ranks second with 44 per cent of its goal reached. H. L. Evans Jr., bond chairman, reports April sales

of \$37,241 and a total of \$146,040. The county's goal for this year is \$330,000.

Callahan County ranks third with 38 per cent of the quota reached this year. Howard E. Farmer, bond chairman, reports April sales of \$15,831, and a total of \$51,086. Goal for the county this year is \$130,000.

Eastland and Comanche counties last with Eastland leading with 27 per cent and Comanche with 25 per cent of their goals reached. Eastland County with no bond chairman has a quota of 300,000. Sales in April totaled \$23,042 for an aggregate \$80,467. Comanche bond chairman, Jack W. Moore, reports April sales of \$4,868 and an aggregate of \$40,454. 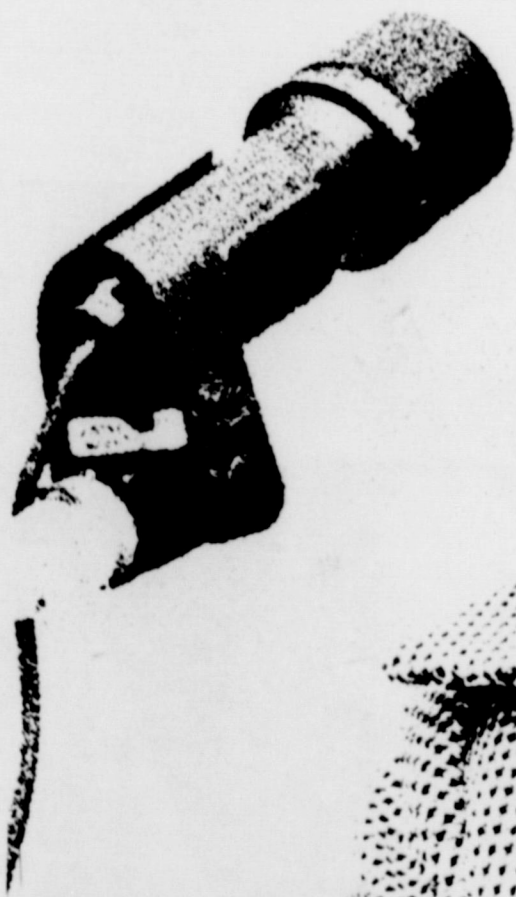

### Farmer Crop Data Urgently Needed

During the last half of May, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, at Austin.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry — agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

### Cornstalk Borer Is Again Plaging Area

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, has announced that the Department's light trapping program for the lesser cornstalk borer, Texas' most serious peanut insect pest, has captured the first moth for the 1972 season in the Central Texas area.

First moths were caught by one of the De Leon Peanut Research Lab's traps on March 13. Last year's first catch was confirmed on March 26. White reports that the moth of the lesser cornstalk borer has appeared approximately 15 days earlier each year for the past four years.

Commissioner White urged

farmers to be on the lookout for moths and larvae in fields as soon as peanuts and other crops are planted. It was noted that last year only a few areas in the five-county area failed to develop damaging infestations of the borer. Early treatment usually gave good control on irrigated peanuts it was explained.

Moths and larvae may be sent to the De Leon Research Lab, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444, for positive identification with a new method.


