Board Awards \$213,325 Contract On New School

Construction of a new elementary school building in Cross Plains will cost \$213,325.55, according to a contract signed by trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District Monday night.

The school's directorate met Wednesday of last week and authorized a contract to be awarded to Armstrong Construction Co., Inc. of Breckenridge to begin building the new

structure.

According to Wayne Ford, local superintendent, the contractor has 240 calendar days to finish the project. It was noted, however, the board wishes to complete construction before end of the first semester of the 1972-73 school year. Ford received a letter from the contractor, Nathan B. Armstrong, stating, "We will do everything in our power to see that the

building is finished by December 1."

Armstrong is to begin construction on or before June 12.

Ford noted that final figure of \$213,325.55 is higher than was hoped. Wednesday of last week trustees approved plans as worker out by the architect and contractor to cut cost from original low bid of \$219,450. It was pointed out that alternatives and options were discussed.

Board members decided to keep part of the optional facilities, thus making the final figure about \$18,000 more than first anticipated.

It was explained that although the bid is higher than anticipated, the board is pretty well pleased with the bid.

Ford pointed out that the \$213,325.55 figure still leaves the school an adequate amount of money to furnish classrooms,

Wheat Harvest Is Quick; Nears End

A better than expected harvest of wheat in the Cross Plains area is almost completed, opines local buyers.

Two Cross Plains buyers estimated over three million pounds were handled here. The 50,000 bushels were thought to have averaged about \$1.40 per bushel, an estimated payroll of about \$70,000.

Both Cross Plains buyers reported yields and grades much better than expected 30 to 60 days ago.

Oats are of poor quality this year and are late with green heads hindering harvesting and grades.

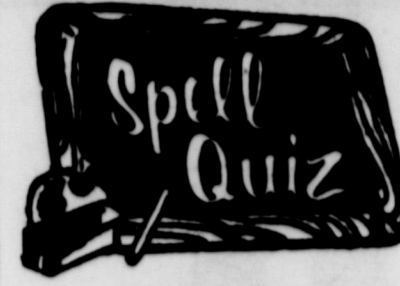
