2 Men Pay Fines On Area DWI Charges

Patrolman Don Gosnell, stationed in Cross Plains, filed charges recently for driving while intoxicated in this area, and cases were heard in County Court at Baird Monday.

A. E. Dyer, Jr., county judge, levied a \$350 fine, \$52 court costs, and assessed a three-day jail term against Ronald Holmans, 23, of Cross Plains.

Ronald Allen, 22, of Gustine was fined \$150, \$52 costs and assessed 10 days in jail, which was probated for a year.

Holmans has two previous offenses for DWI, but Allen was a first time offender.

Allen was taken into custody early Sunday morning when the vehicle he was driving was in collision with a chartered bus near Cross Plains at 3:30 a.m. There were no injuries, but Allen's auto was heavily damaged, and the bus was dispatched to pick up the group from Beaumont.

Sales Tax Election Faces City Voters On Tuesday

An expected large number of Cross Plains voters will mark ballots for or against a city sales and use tax of one per cent on Tuesday, June 20.

The election was called by the City Council a month ago, and since then feelings of those for and against have become warmer.

Polls will open in the City Hall from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., and the presiding judge will be Zenovia Strickland, assisted by Katie Kilgore.

Ballots will be simple. Voters will place an "X" in the square beside the proposition they desire. Ballots will read FOR adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city, and "AGAINST" adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sale and use tax within the city.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield and members of the City Council have indicated that they think the added one per cent tax on the dollar, is the fairest way of

raising added revenue the city needs. Opponents say that a program of specific cases where the money is needed should first be outlined by the governing body.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield said last week that the city government must look ahead to have reserves to finance coming projects instead of asking for bond elections or another alternative of advancing property taxes. It is thought that property taxes can remain stable with the added revenue.

He pointed out that at least two large projects will face the city soon. One is that of rebuilding the city's sewer farm. He pointed out that the system now used is no longer approved by the state. He added that the city will also be forced by the state to go into a landfill method of disposing of trash instead of the "dump ground" facilities used here for many years.

He pointed out that the city will have to buy land for the

latter and have a huge excavation dug. He also explained that the system of treating sewage will be expensive with new structure and equipment which will call for engineers and outlays for actual building and installation of machinery.

Burchfield added that no part of the revenue, if forthcoming, has yet been earmarked.

If passed Cross Plains consumers will pay an added one per cent, a penny on the dollar more for all goods now taxed by the state, and only those goods. Food and medicines are not included. Collections of that extra penny would not begin by local merchants until the last quarter of the year, October through December, and only then if all requirements are met and approved by the State Comptroller before July 1. One calendar quarter must elapse before collections start. Local business firms would not pay the added one per cent to the state until January 1973.

The mayor said if the proposal passes, it is hoped that all facets of the requirements will be forwarded to the comptroller by end of next week.

First payment to the city by the state would not come until after April 1, 1973. Payments run a quarter of year behind collections. The city would gross an estimated \$10,000 to \$12,000 per year from the tax, grounds or for construction of by the city from other area towns of similar size of Cross Plains which have the sales and use tax.

Burchfield explained that he and the council feel that the sales tax would be the most fair and equal to all concerned.

He pointed out that transients would help pay for local municipal services and area people who use the city dump would also help maintain the grounds or for construction of a new one.

THIS WE BELIEVE

(An Editorial)

The proposed one per cent sales tax for the City of Cross Plains is the fairest tax that can be levied to meet the needs of our city.

Since it doesn't include food and other necessities, it does not work a hardship on large families and retired people, but it does tax those people who pass through our city and use all of the facilities provided by city tax monies.

A tax on sales which excludes food and drugs is certainly a reasonable and small charge for the varied services rendered by our municipality.

Certainly, it is worth something to have business fire protection in the area and police protection for the traveling public, along with all the multiple services afforded by the routine services of the city.

It is our hope that every qualified voter of the City of Cross Plains will take time out next Tuesday, June 20, and vote FOR the proposed city sales tax.

No Promise Made On Atwell FM Road

A delegation of Atwell community residents and two county officials got no commitment from Texas Highway Commission concerning construction of a farm to market road in that sector recently.

Atwell citizens Roy Tatom, Roy Neil Tatom, Bill Pope and Nathan Foster and County Commissioner Duke Mitchell and County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. met with the commission. They reported that the commission said it had no money at present and must wait for the Texas Legislature to make appropriations.

The proposed hard surface road would run about six miles, just over five in Callahan County and almost one in Eastland. It would begin at Farm Road 880, the Cottonwood-Putnam road, and connect with Farm Road 569, the Pioneer-Nimrod highway.

It was pointed out that the project would also have to be approved and planned by J. C. (Jake) Roberts, resident highway engineer at Abilene who serves 13 area counties.

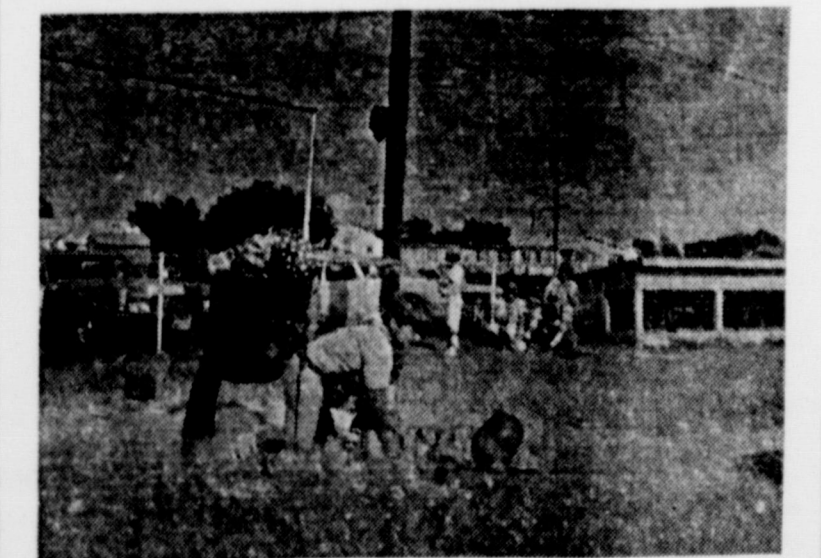
blasted his 10th homer in 11 games leading off the big rally. Beadels insured the win with two runs in the sixth.

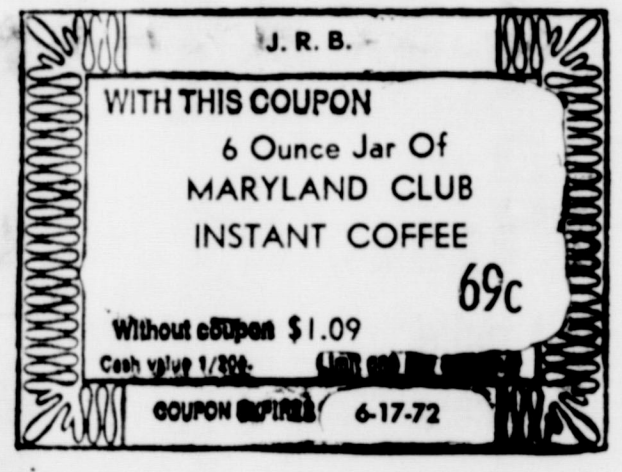

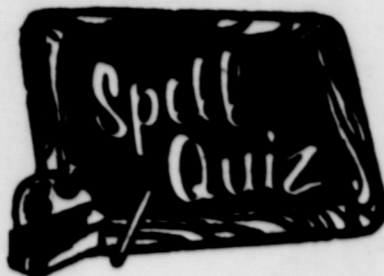
