CITY VOTERS OKAY SALES TAX

117 Votes Polled On Proposition; Wins By 90 To 27 Verdict

A smaller than expected number of Cross Plains voters approved a one per cent city sales and use tax by a three-to-one margin in balloting in the City Hall Tuesday.

Zenovia Strickland, election judge, reported the final tally of 117 ballot cast only a couple of minutes after the polls closed at 7 p.m.

She listed the vote as follows: 90 for and 27 against.

City Council met to canvass the votes Tuesday night.

All election results and other legal data must now be forwarded to and approved by the State Comptroller before July 1 to allow collection of the added one per cent, only on goods now taxed by the state, can begin

when the council planned. That is the last quarter of the year, October through December.

Payment will not be received by the city until after April 1, 1973, expected to gross between \$10,000 and \$12,000 annually.

Land Prices, Taxes To Rise-A&M Prof

buyers and sellers can look for higher prices, and increasing land value in the years to come.

The economist was one of the lead-off speakers for A&M's first annual Rural Estate Short Courses held June 12-14, designed to point out the rapid changes taking place in farm and ranch lands.

Schmedemann said rural real estate loans are shifting from a land base to a man base. That is, lending agencies are taking a closer look at the person applying for a loan. Appraisal methods also are changing rapidly.

Increased land demand, he emphasized, will probably build to even greater pressure if three and four-day work weeks become widespread. The result would be more leisure time and commuting, as people flock to the country and buy and live on small acreages.

Dr. A. B. Wooten, director of the short course-sponsoring Texas Real Estate Research Center at A&M, said that up until recent times, land owners could do just about anything they wanted with their property. But now, non-land owners are pushing for more influence on how land is used.

He said there are two land use control bills currently before Congress, which if passed, will have much to do with how land owners utilize their property.

Rural real estate is in a peculiar situation these days, Wooten said. Before World War II, land prices fluctuated according to good and poor crop years. But since the war, zooming land prices are affected very little by agricultural conditions.

Dr. Ivan W. Schmedemann of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Economics Department said rural land also will experience greater recreational use, and more large tracts will be cut up for developmental purposes.

A reading of 96 degrees was registered in Cross Plains Monday afternoon. It was the hottest day thus far this year. Last year at least two days of 100 degrees were registered in June.

Local Man Files For \$274,789 In Damage

A Cross Plains stock farmer filed a \$274,789 damage suit Friday in U.S. District Court in Abilene against a California resident seeking compensation for losses and injuries resulting from a Nov. 17 traffic accident in Palo Pinto County in which his wife was killed.

Frank P. Spencer, 72, and his wife Helen, 63, were traveling east on U. S. 80 about 24 miles west of Weatherford when the car in which they were traveling was in head-on collision with a vehicle driven by Harry Pierce of North Hollywood, Calif.

Both Spencer and his wife were injured, and Mrs. Spencer died Feb. 19.

The plaintiff is seeking \$36,039 for past and future medical expenses; \$50,000 for pain and suffering for both him and his wife; \$15,000 for future pain and suffering for himself; \$49,500 for loss of service, advice, council and contributions of his wife; and \$74,250 for loss of earning capacity.

Rain Falls But Total Still Below Normal

Rain showers fell in this area last Thursday morning, dumping much needed moisture, but the total received thus far this year is still far below the average for the first half year.

Official gauge maintained by F. C. Newton measured 1.54 inches last week. That, added to 44 of an inch which fell on June 11, make an aggregate of 1.98 inches have been received here this year. Normal for a year is 24.54 inches.

Amounts varied greatly over the area last week. Rowden got just .70 of an inch while the Sabanno and Pioneer areas gauged about 1.50 inches.

Although the average is short of average, agricultural prospects were brightened considerably by the moisture. Feed and peanut crops already up are growing rapidly, and later crops are now being planted. Farmers in most of the local area believe that there is sufficient moisture to bring the crops up.

Acre - Crop Querries Due Texas Farmers

In early July, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin, according to Greg Grengross, Calhoun County Agriculture Agent of Baird.

This information will be the basis for determining harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented, Grengross says. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, he pointed out.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State officials alone do not provide adequate information of Texas' most basic industry, agriculture, he local agent explains.

This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Screworm Cases Break Record; Flies Are Dropped

A record-breaking 1,563 screworm cases were confirmed in Texas for the week ending Saturday, May 27. This compares to 780 cases the previous week and 600 two weeks earlier.

According to officials of the Mission Screworm Eradication Program, the outbreak spread to 16 new counties during the past week, upping the infestation area to 109 Texas counties. Newest counties hit by the flesh-eating livestock pest include Concho, Lampasas, Nolan, Stonewall, Howard, Jack, Knox, Comanche, Runnels, Brown, Coke, Grimes, San Saba, Wilbarger, Young and Reeves.

Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., eradication program director, said Arizona also recorded nine new cases, pushing the tally for the week to 1,574 cases in the United States. Large numbers of the new cases also were reported in many portions of Mexico near the U. S. border. Texas has recorded 4,382 cases this year.

"All areas where cases are confirmed are being treated with sterile flies," points out Meadows. This involves "hot-spotting" or dropping about 100,000 sterial flies at each location. In addition, 1,600 flies are dropped per square mile each week in the southern part of the state that has heavy infestations. Certain other areas receive sterile fly drops at the rate of 500 to 800 per square mile each week. When cases are confirmed in scattered western and northern counties,

routine fly drops are made along rivers and streams in addition to the "hot-spotting."

Meadows urges all producers to check their animals frequently, collect any worm samples from wounds and treat the wounds with a recommended product. Worm samples should be sent to the Screworm Laboratory, Box 696, Mission, Texas for identification.

The program director also cautioned producers to delay such operations as docking, branding, dehorning and castrating. "These operations leave a wound and that's an open invitation for the screworm fly to lay her eggs. Almost 90 percent of all confirmed screworm cases come from man-made wounds and from the navels of young calves," he added.

Joe Antilley, chairman of the State Soil and Water Conservation Board and well-known conservationist, Saturday reported finding evidences of sterile screworm fly drops in Callahan County near the Admiral Community.

The crates in which flies are dropped were discovered by Wendell Smith on his farm, 10 miles southeast of Baird. Smith said the drop was made around noon Friday.

Other evidences of fly drops were found north and east of Admiral. Antilley explained that a criss-cross pattern of bombardment insures that a two-to-five-square mile area is covered by a drop. Because of this,

Local Post Office Part Of Mail Service Change

The newest innovation of the United States Postal Service — Area Mail processing — is to be installed at the Stephenville, Texas Post Office within the next two weeks.

This was announced today by Carl C. Ulsaker, Regional Postmaster General, Southern Postal Region, which covers the Southern United States from Texas to Florida.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency and economy through full utilization of Stephenville's modern post office," Ulsaker said.

The electric cancelling machine is available at the Stephenville Post Office to move the increased mail volume from the associated offices.

The Stephenville Post Office, Ulsaker pointed out, "is a Sectional Center Facility, and the new system will revolve entirely around that capacity and that function."

"The program will take effect June 24," he said.

The innovation will go into effect in the Cross Plains Post Office on Wednesday, June 28, according to Mrs. Verna Mae Ramsey, officer in charge of the local postal station.

Area Mail processing is a plan whereby virtually all mail originating within a Sectional Center area, including any or all of the associate offices of the Sectional Center Facility, will be consolidated at the SCF for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch.

All mail deposited in street letter boxes or the out-of-town letter drops at the associate offices will be transferred to the SCF for processing and will bear the postmark designated for the SCF area.

The Stephenville SCF postmark will read, "U. S. Postal Service, TX 764," along with the date and AM-PM designation. The city postmark of Stephenville and each individual associate office will not be changed.

Mail deposited in a designated drop unit at a post office or a letter box labeled "For Local Cancellation Only" will be postmarked at the local office of origin with the name of that office. Each postmaster will have deposit boxes and letter drop units designated for this purpose. All metered mail will bear the postmark of the office of origin.

It was emphasized by Ulsaker that no office will lose its local postmark.

He asked specifically that customers no longer use the word "City" as an address in place of the name of the city of designation. "Obviously," he said, "in this new system, a letter with just 'City' could lose its identity."

Post offices affected by this program in the Stephenville area are: Albany, Cisco, Comanche, Cross Plains, De Leon, Dublin, Eastland, Gorman, Hico, Ranger and Rising Star.

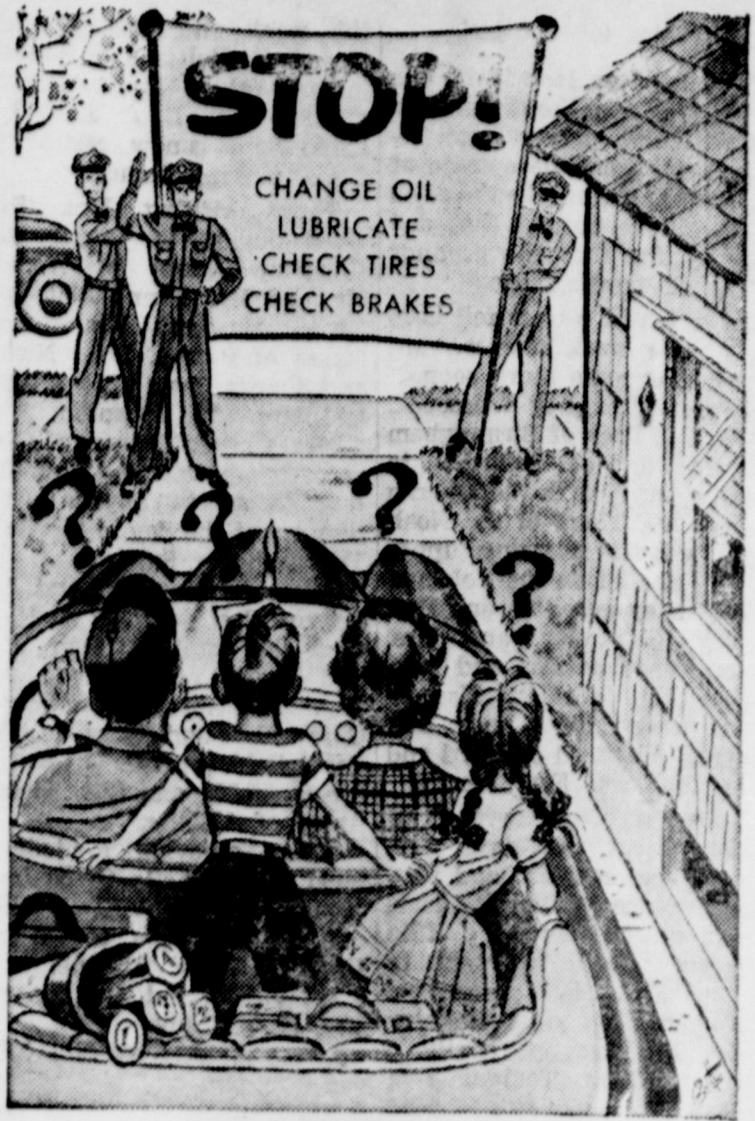

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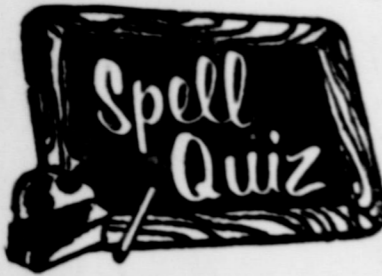
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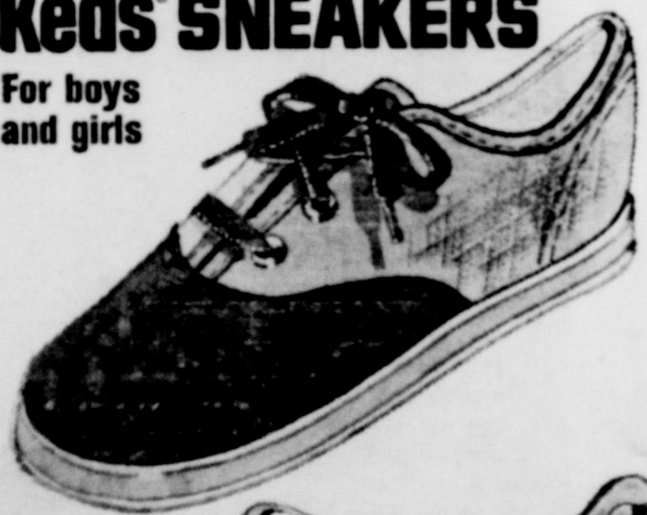
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
