Final Rites for Charlie Caver (Slim) Holdridge, 72-year-old retired Cross Plains merchant, were held at 2:30 p.m. Friday in Higginbotham Funeral Chapel.

The longtime local variety store operator, died at 12:20 p.m. Thursday in Coleman Over-all-Morris Memorial Hospital. He had been a patient there five days after becoming ill at his home here.

Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery. The Rev. Loyd Coker of Rising Star and Rev. C. J. McAfee of Waco, both former pastors of the First United Methodist Church of this city officiated.

Born Dec. 16, 1899, in Alabama, he had been a resident of Cross Plains since 1935. He married Martha Ann McClellan at De Leon on March 11, 1920.

He was a volunteer fireman in Cross Plains for many years and was active in civic affairs until recent years. He owned and operated the Holdridge Variety Store on Main Street here and retired about nine years ago.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Charles Mack of Coleman; one grandson, Timmy; six brothers, Marvin, W. C. Lee and Fred Holdridge, all of De Leon; Coy Holdridge of Dallas and Paul Holdridge of Waxahachie; one sister, Mrs. Eva Coley of De Leon.

## Bufs Win Pair; Regain Lead In LL Flag Race

Western Auto Bufs reclaimed first place in Cross Plains Little League standings with two victories last week. The unit vaulted past the Beadles and Cats from third place during the week.

Bufs opened the week's action on Tuesday of last week by whipping the Higginbotham-Citizens State Bank Cats 10-7, and then in the second game on Thursday out-slugged the West Texas Utilities Kilowatts 16-12 to capture the top position.

Cats and the JRB Super market Beadles remained deadlocked, but are now in the runner-up position after sharing the lead following the sixth week of play.

After absorbing the loss at the hands of the Bufs on Tuesday, the Cats rebounded to nip the Beadles 10-9 in the curtain raiser on Thursday. Beadles clipped the Kilowatts 14-10 in last week.

Bufs started the triumphant week by tallying four runs in the first inning on the Cats while the latter could manage just two. After a score-less second frame, the victors increased the edge by one, 7-4 in the third. Both scored three times in the fourth for the 10-7 final and neither team could tally in the last two frames. Bufs Steve Baugh and Tom Kitchensboth had triples for the long hits of the contest.

Beadles started rough scoring seven runs in the first frame, and owned a 10-1 advantage going into the fourth. Kilos

rallied for eight runs in the top of the fourth, slicing the deficit to 10-8, until the last of the frame when the winners pushed four runs home. Kilos scored two in the fifth for the 14-10 score. Joe Hale hit a triple for the Beadles although Glenn Nicjerson had a perfect three-for-three at the plate for the team. Glenn Wooten hit two doubles to pace the Kilos.

Cats withstood a Beadles rally for a 10-9 victory in the opener Thursday. Cats enjoyed a 10-5 margin after four innings. Four Beadles tallied on six hits in the fifth. Neither could score in the sixth. Jerry Lunceford had a perfect night at the plate for the Cats, getting two doubles and three singles in five appearances. John Schafer has two doubles in three at bats for Beadles, and Ricky Thomas had a double and two singles in four plate appearances.

Bufs scored five times in the initial frame of the week's finale in beating the Kilowatts 16-12. Kilowatts knotted the count at 5-5 after two innings, but Bufs rallied for six runs in the third and a trio in the fourth. Greg Pancake hit a triple for the Bufs in the third, and Troy Watson has a triple and a double for the Kilos in three at bats.

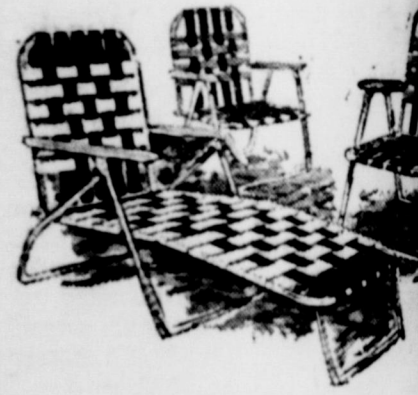

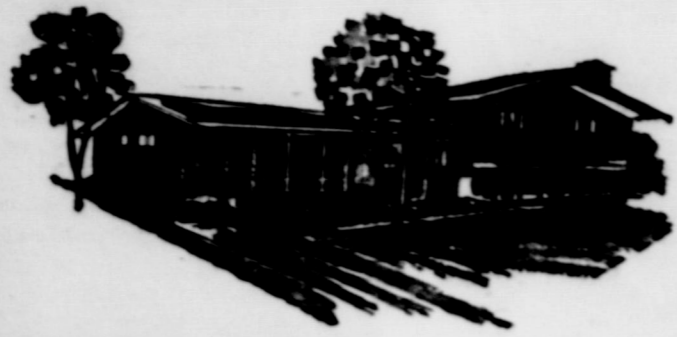
