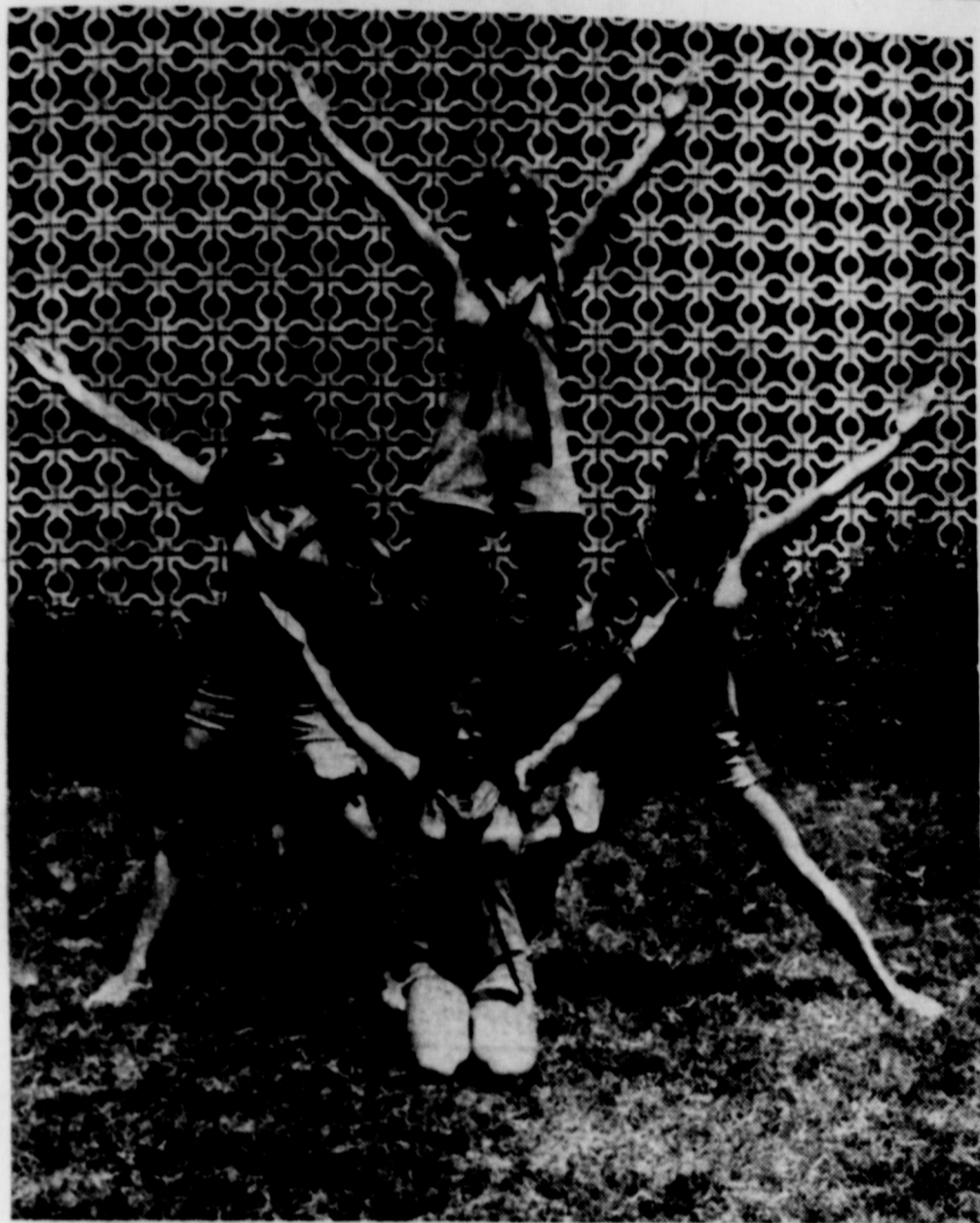

Buffs Win L. L. Pennant

Buffs captured the championship of Cross Plains Little League in season-ending play last week.

The regular schedule was played Tuesday and Thursday, and additional two games were slated for Friday. The latter two contests were rained out earlier in the season.

Buffs claimed the crown with three victories during the busy week. The victors began with a hard-fought 19-10 win over the Beadels Tuesday of last week, which actually gave the team the title. On Thursday the Buffs out-slugged the Cats 16-12 to cinch the pennant, and in the make-up game Friday, Buffs nipped the Kilowatts 11-10.

Beadels claimed second place in the final standings, notching two triumphs after the week's

opening loss to the champions. On Thursday Beadels coasted by the Kilowatts 20-3, and on Friday the runners-up accepted a forfeit from the Cats when an inadequate number of the latter team was on hand to play the re-scheduled contest.

Cats kept title hopes alive on Tuesday by blasting the Kilowatts 17-6, but then fell victim to the Buffs and had to forfeit to the Beadels.

Kilowatts soomed to an early lead in the season finale Friday, but Buffs finally overcame the six-run deficit to win 11-10.

Two home runs were clouted during the week's extended action. Joe Hale of the Beadels hit another round tripper. It came in the fourth inning of Thursday's opener when the Beadels whipped the Kilowatts 20-3. Greg Pancake poled a circuit blast in the fifth inning when his Buffs came from behind to nip the Kilowatts 11-10 on Friday.

Coleman County Still Savings Bonds Leader

Coleman County continues to lead Callahan, Brown and Eastland Counties in the percentage of the 1972 goal attained in sales of United States Series E and H Savings Bonds.

Residents of the leading county purchased \$61,940 in bonds during the first five months of this year. That is 52 per cent of the quota of \$120,000 assigned. Robert I. Bowen, Jr., county bond chairman, reported May sales of \$6,480.

Brown County has netted 48

per cent of its \$330,000 goal, according to H. L. Evans, Jr., bond chairman. During May the sales in that county totaled \$13,726 which made a five month aggregate of \$159,766.

May sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds amounted to \$3,618 in Callahan County reported Howard E. Farmer of Baird, county bond chairman. Sale for the five-month period totaled \$54,704 for 42 per cent of the 1972 goal of \$130,000.

Eastland County, which has no bond chairman, had reached 39 per cent of its \$300,000 quota with aggregate sales through the first five months of 1972 at \$118,478. Purchases amounting to \$38,011 were reported in May.

Sales for the state of Texas during May were \$17,314,314 — a five per cent increase over May 1971 when sales were \$16,476,145. January through May sales totaled \$91,572,743 with 45 per cent of the \$202.3 million 1972 goal achieved.

Memorial Gifts Swell Pioneer Cemetery Fund

Coffers of the Pioneer Cemetery Association were swelled during the month of June by \$150. Mrs. Ethel Brown, secretary-treasurer of the organization, reported that 10 donations were received, all memorial gifts.

She also reported that another \$75 contribution had been omitted from the last report. Eighty-five dollars, in six gifts, were deposited to the Endowment Fund being raised by the association to provide perpetual care for the Pioneer burial plot. The \$75 gift also went into the fund. The other \$65, received from four donors, went into the regular maintenance fund, according to Mrs. Brown.

The treasurer asks that all persons who wish to help with either the regular or the endowment fund to address gifts to her at Route 1, Rising Star, or mail to the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains. She asks that the contributions be clearly marked to the fund the gift is being made so another mistake will

be avoided. The \$75 contribution to the perpetual care fund, acknowledgement of which was delayed because of the error, came from Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Tollerson.

No Word Received Here On Sales Tax

Mayor Doyle Burchfield reported Friday that no word had been received from the State Comptroller's office in Austin on the sale and use tax voted by Cross Plains residents on June 20.

"I believe that if everything had not been okay, we would have heard by now," Burchfield said.

The one per cent tax will go into effect here on October 1, if all facets of the election and procedure are okayed by the State Comptroller.

Local city councilmen estimate the income from the tax to Cross Plains would approximate \$10,000 to \$12,000.

Payments for the first quarter of 1972 were made to area towns last week. Monies received by cities of similar size of Cross Plains were revealed as follows: Baird \$2,121, Bangs \$1,623, Clyde \$2,446, Early \$2,509, Gorman \$2,556 and Rising Star \$2,589.

Breathalyzer Installed At Local J. P. Office

A new breathalyzer, the very latest instrument to measure the alcoholic content in a human being, has been installed in the office of Pender Mitchell, Justice of the Peace here. The instrument was installed by the county at a cost nearing \$800, according to A. E. Dyer, Jr., Callahan County Judge, for the convenience of local law enforcement officers.

The action was approved by the Commissioners Court, according to Dyer.

Recently-enacted legislation requires applicants for a Texas driver's license to give implied consent to a breathalyzer or blood test in the event an arresting officer suspects the driver to be operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol. Local Department of Public Safety Patrolman Don Gosnell said that a 0.10 per cent reading on the instrument is presumed by the state to be drunk.

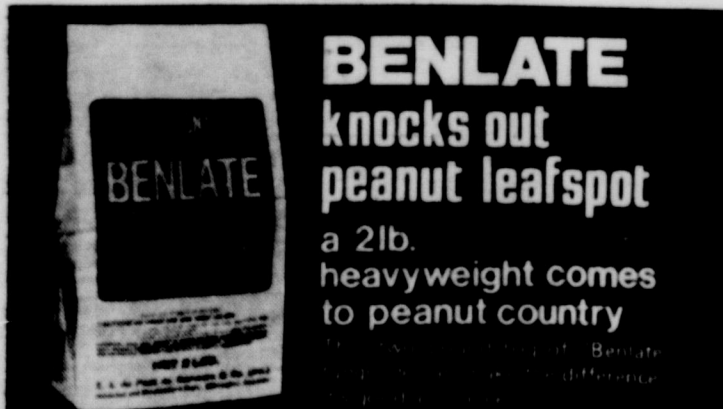

It was our first time to see their newly arrived baby daughter, who is a beautiful baby. We were told her name, but since correct spelling is not available, you will have to hear that later. Farmers Needed Crop Report From

In early July, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, in Austin, according to J. C. Earp, Jr., County Executive Director.

This information will be the basis for determining harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry - agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

SET-ASIDE ACREAGE CHECK ADVISABLE

It has been noted that some fields have grown up in weeds. It is advisable to check your set-aside acreage and take appropriate action to control any undesirable vegetation reports J. C. Earp, Jr. County Executive Director.

The average productivity for all annual set-aside acres on the farm must be at least equal in productivity to other cropland on the farm normally planted to crops for which payments are to be made. No grazing of set-aside acres is permitted between April 30 and October 1.

HOME HINTS

AND FAMILY FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

By Barbara Williams

Higginbothams sell refrigerators. You use them. And often you probably wonder if a particular food has been in the refrigerator a little too long to be truly safe for your family.

No one can tell you exactly how long a food will last in the refrigerator because there are too many unknowns involved.



You do not know, for example, how long the food has been in the store before purchase; nor do you know exactly what conditions it was kept under before it reached the shelf. We can, however, give approximate limits on storing food in the refrigerator. The times are for food properly handled before purchase and stored afterward in an average refrigerator in good repair. Remember not to overload your refrigerator for maximum cooling efficiency and do get leftovers into the refrigerator promptly; don't wait for them to cool completely.

VERY PERISHABLE foods include the following: Fresh fish and shellfish, wrapped loosely (24 hours), cooked fish and shellfish, covered or wrapped (1 to 2 days), canned fish and shellfish, opened and covered (1 to 2 days), loosely wrapped poultry (1 to 2 days), ground meat, wrapped loosely (24 hours), soups, gravies, covered (1 to 2 days), variety meats (1 to 2 days), poultry stuffing, removed from the roasted bird, covered or wrapped (1 to 2 days), meat, poultry, fish and salads, covered (24 hours), casseroles, stews (1 to 2 days), custards, custard sauces, cream-filled pies or cakes (2 to 3 days), vegetables, salad greens in moisture-proof wrapping (3 to 5 days), berries in moisture-proof wrapping (1 to 2 days), citrus fruits and apples (7 days), other fruits (3 to 5 days), fruit juices in covered container (3 to 4 days). Bananas should not be refrigerated.

MODERATELY PERISHABLE foods included the following: Baby food, covered in the

original can or jar (2 to 3 days), meats (3 to 5 days), cooked meats and poultry, covered or wrapped (2 to 4 days), cured meats, wrapped, on coldest shelf (sliced ham, 3 to 5 days; bacon, 1 week; whole ham, 2 weeks), cold cuts (3 to 5 days), milk, cream (3 days), evaporated milk in opened can (3 to 5 days), butter, margarine (1 to 12 weeks), cottage cheese in a closed container (3 to 5 days), other soft cheeses (1 to 2 weeks), hard cheeses (3 to 6 months), eggs, in carton, covered dish, or on special rack, (2 to 4 weeks), eggs, hard-cooked in the shell (8 to 10 days), egg whites in covered container (2 to 4 days), egg yolks covered with water (2 to 4 days), mayonnaise and salad dressing in covered container (6 to 12 weeks), root vegetables (2 to 4 weeks), leftover vegetable in covered container (1 to 4 days), canned vegetables in original can or other covered container (1 to 4 days), cooked fruit in covered container (2 to 4 days), canned fruit in original can or other covered container (2 to 4 days).

OSCAR KOENIG HIT BY HEART ATTACK

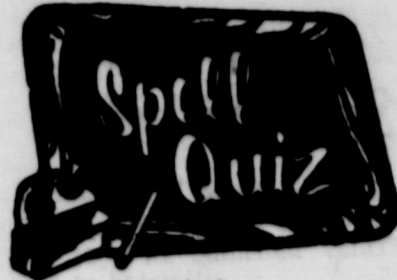
