Locals Charged in Coleman Rape

4 Guilty DWI Pleas Nets \$750 In Fines

Four persons entered guilty pleas to charges of driving while intoxicated in Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. County Court at Baird during the past week.

Largest fine was assessed on Monday when Calvin Marion Snow of Coleman was fined \$300 and \$52 court costs and given three days in jail.

Mildred C. Fielder of Midland was fined \$200, \$52 costs, and given three days in jail.

Robert Harper Tabor of Dallas was assessed a fine of \$150 and \$54 in costs on a guilty plea. He was given 10 days in jail which was probated one year.

Jordan Lee of Georgia was fined \$100 and \$52 costs. He was also given a three-day jail sentence.

Cross Plains Will Host Area Little League Meet

Cross Plains has been selected as host city for the District 28 Little League Tournament which will unfold on July 25, 26 and 27.

It is the first time since Cross Plains has been involved in Little League that this city has been host for the district meet.

Harold Garrett of this city will serve as the tournament director. He was president of the local Little League organization this year. He asks that all the officers, managers and other officials and helpers with the local Little League continue their cooperation and support in preparing for and during the playing of the district event.

Four teams who survive the area playoff games will tangle in the district tournament here, a single loss elimination event.

Second game, which will also begin at 8 o'clock on Wednesday, July 26, will feature the victor of the Cross Plains-Clyde area playoff, to be held in Clyde July 20, and the champion of the Coleman-Cisco contest slated on July 21 at Cisco.

A double header is on tap for the final night, Thursday, July 27. First game will begin at 6 p.m. and will be the consolation clash, featuring losers in the first two games. Championship will be decided at 8 p.m.

Comptroller Okays Sales, Use Tax Here

City of Cross Plains has been notified by the State Comptroller that the collection of a one per cent sales and use tax here has been approved.

The state's okay of the election and connected paper work allows the city to begin sharing in the one per cent added tax next year. It is expected to bring in an additional \$10,000 to \$12,000 annual to coffers of the city.

Local merchants will begin collecting the additional tax, making a five per cent assessment on all goods now taxed by the state, instead of four cent now being assessed, on October 1, for the last quarter of the year.

Payment will not be received by the city until after April 1, 1973.

2 C. T. O. GRANTS GET OKAY OF GOV. SMITH

Two recent federal grants which involve Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. of Coleman, have been approved by Governor Preston Smith.

One is for \$12,000 which will be used to help solve the problems of poor neighborhood youth. The other is for \$25,000 and involves nine such agencies as the CTO in Coleman. It will aid the local agencies, governments, organizations and individuals.

Both are effective July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973.

New Texas Highway Signs Explained

A straight line isn't the shortest distance between two points if it's painted white or yellow and it's on a Texas highway.

New "symbol" signs and pavement markings have been adopted by the Texas Highway Commission from the revised "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices" released by the Federal Highway Administration.

In many cases, symbols, shapes and colors have been substituted for words. It is hoped that this will give the message to motorists at a glance and remove language barriers.

The new symbol signs that will replace the old word signs are pretty self-explanatory. For example, the new school sign will be shaped like a schoolhouse and will contain black silhouettes of two children on a yellow background.

The new pavement markings are not as dramatic looking, but are equally important.

There is an easy way to remember them:

Yellow lines will be the only color used for centerline markings on two-way highways -- for separating traffic flows in opposite directions. Yellow centerlines have proven to be more visible in fog than white stripes.

White will remain on multiple-lane highways -- for separating traffic flows in the same direction as well as on one-way streets.

Red will be used on raised reflective pavement markers and will denote wrong-way movement. IF YOU SEE RED YOU ARE GOING THE WRONG WAY.

All broken (dashed) lines will be permissive in character while the solid lines will be restrictive (prohibiting).

Two solid yellow lines will be used where passing is prohibited in both directions.

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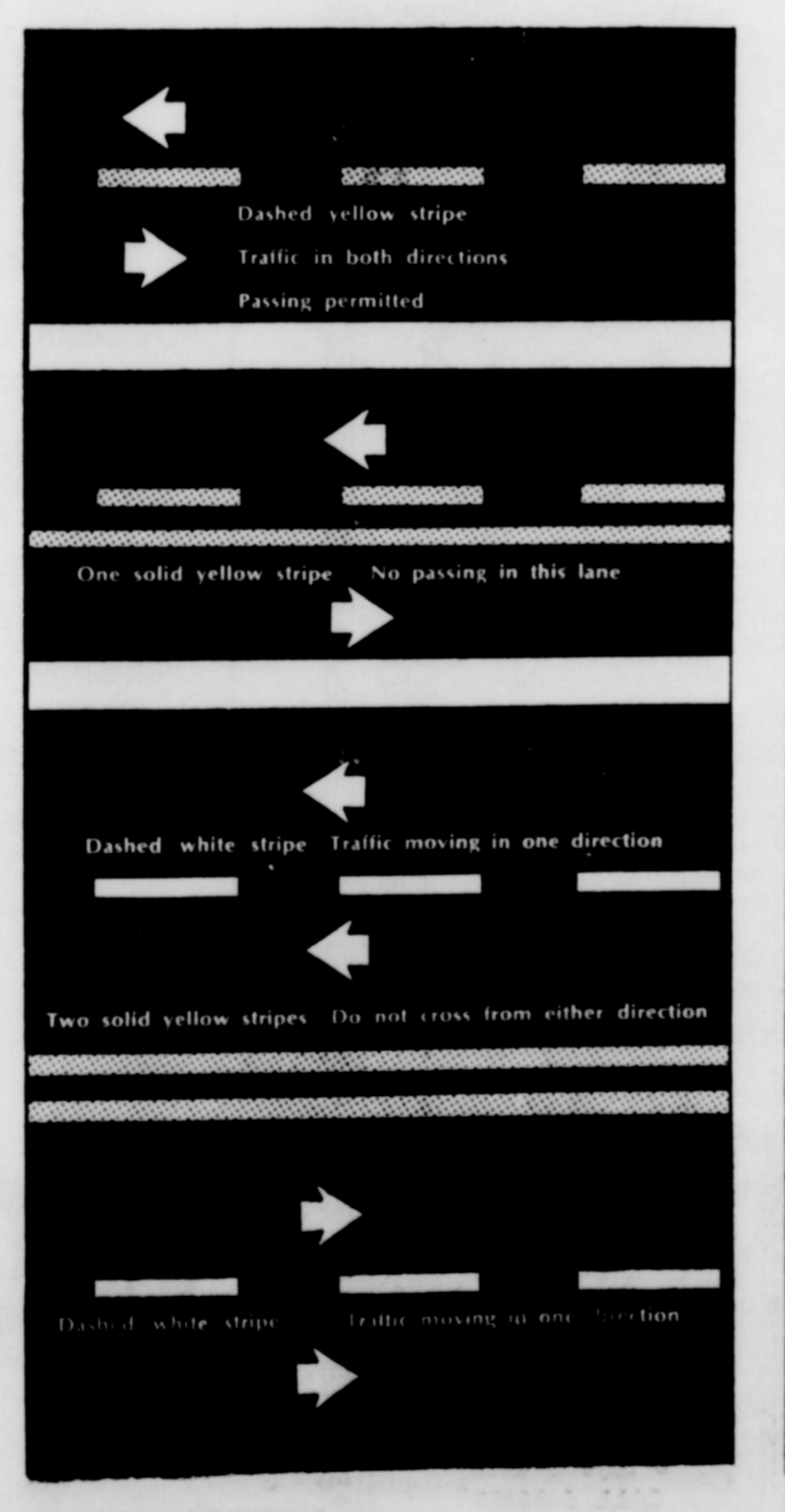

The annual junior rodeo at Baird is scheduled this year to be held July 25 through July 29.

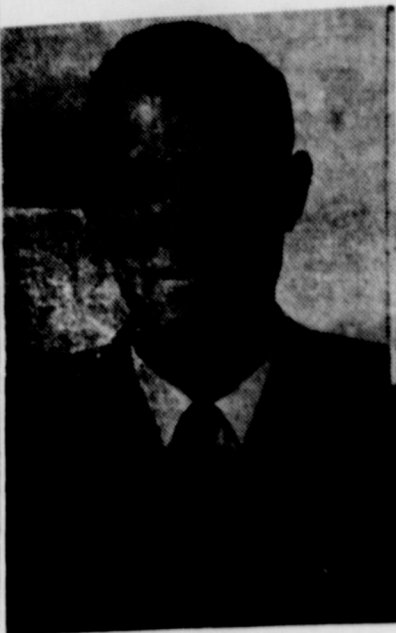
