# County Pioneers To Meet In Park Here Saturday

An expected 400 to 500 Callahan County pioneers will gather in the City Park in Cross Plains Saturday, Aug. 12, in annual old settlers reunion.

The gathering will be the thirty-third such convening of pioneers of this county.

The program will be almost identical to that which was to have been followed by the reunion last year. That celebration was cancelled because of excessive rains.

Festivities will begin with registration starting at 9:30 a.m. at the grounds under the shade of the large oak trees in the

western edge of Cross Plains.

The formal program will begin at 10 o'clock with group singing directed by Mrs. V. E. Hill. Invocation will be given by W. R. Thompson of this city. James Paul Shanks of Baird will welcome the old settlers, and the response will be given by Lester Farmer, former county judge. John Purvis of Cottonwood will lead a silent tribute to deceased pioneers.

Douglas Fry will introduce the principal speaker who will be Homer Taylor of Sweetwater, native of Callahan County and noted educator.

Immediately before spreading of basket lunches at noon, there will be introduction of special guests and announcements by masters of ceremonies Randall C. Jackson of Abilene, Shanks of Baird and M. M. Tabor of Clyde.

Afternoon program will start at 2 o'clock with group singing and more guest introductions.

A highlight of the day will be recognizing of oldest settler in various categories by the masters of ceremonies. Officers for the coming year will also be nominated and elected in a

brief business session.

The day will be ended with square dancing for pioneers, directed by Frank Spencer of this city and E. P. (Pop) Whitaker of Baird, and a group singing of "God Be With You 'Til We Meet Again".

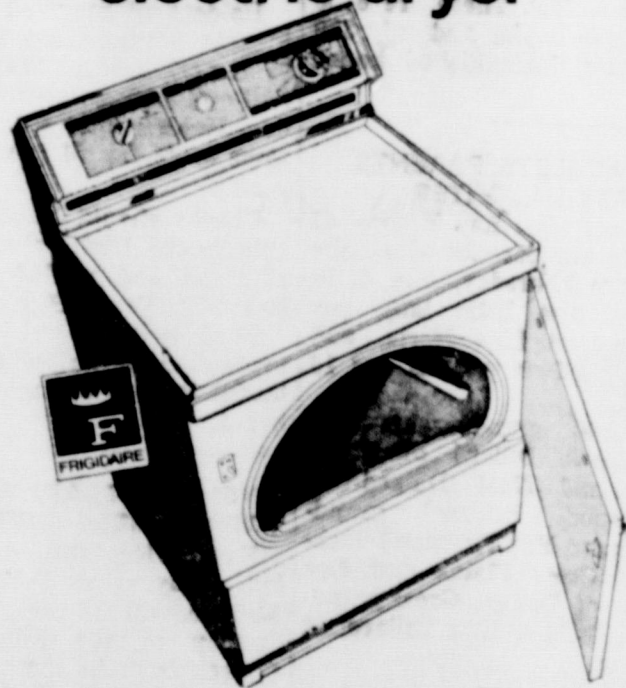

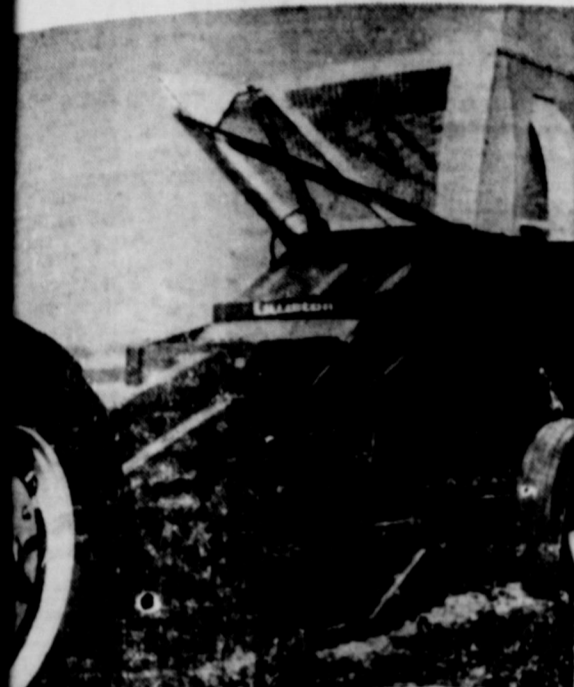

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJB 58)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every ten or more (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established, no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition. "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax, but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for religious purposes, actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land, places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void. "(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the armed services of the United States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency, or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children, and the surviving spouses and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty."

## Borer Strikes Peanuts

Callahan County peanut producers are experiencing problems with the infestation of lesser cornstalk borer which is the major peanut insect, according to Greg Gerngross, county agent. Where the top soil is dry, they are experiencing a significant population increase, and this trend is expected to continue in untreated fields until moisture is received.

Field inspection should be made before the decision to treat or not to treat is made. The base of the plant just below the soil surface should be inspected for feed damage, larval tubes or larvae. Research indicates that irrigated peanuts should be treated when 15 percent or more of the plants are infested and 10 percent on dry land peanuts.

Under hot weather conditions on dryland peanuts, Dasanite used at the rate of one-half pound per acre in 20 gallons of water at 40 pounds of pressure should provide control of this insect in cooler weather. Parathion may be used at one-half to three-fourths pound per acre to control the lesser cornstalk borer. Two or three applications may be required in most cases.

Granular application of Diazinon, Dasanite or Dyfonate may be used on irrigated peanuts. Application should be watered in 48 hours or less after application.

Peanut Leaf Spot may also be a problem in areas where adequate moisture has been received recently. Fungicides should be applied in cases where leaf loss is significant to reduce yield especially in irrigated peanuts.
