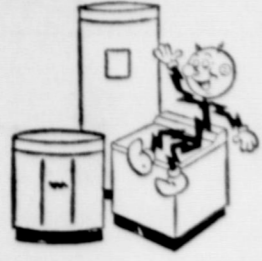

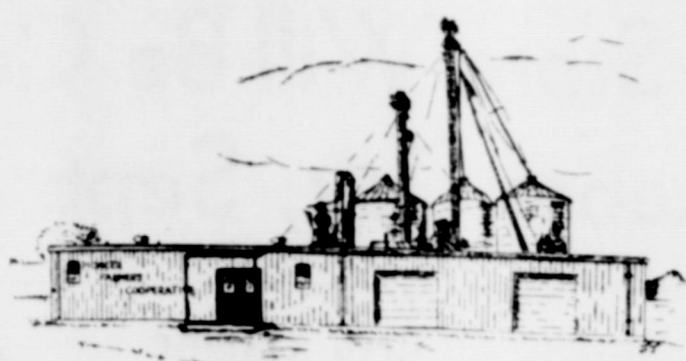

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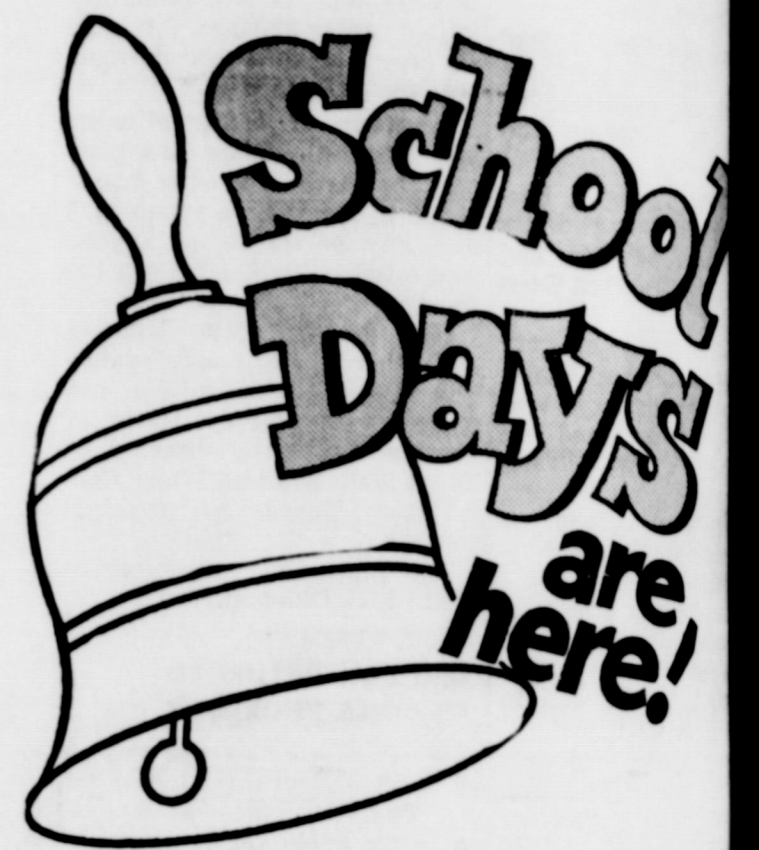

HOME HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

By Barbara Williams

You do not need a special kit of materials to make a fancy window shade; all you need is some tightly woven fabric or wallpaper from HIGGINBOTHAMS, a roller from a worn-out or plain-Jane shade, scissors, a stapler, and your imagination.

Remove the old shade from the roller, saving that piece of wood that slipped into the bottom hem. Using the shade as a pattern, cut the fabric or wallpaper the same size. Remember to allow for side hems in fabric. With wallpaper, you will have to piece your new shade like a bedspread is done; that is, the center strip should be half the width of the finished shade with a strip on either side of it that is one-fourth the finished width. Cover the seams with ribbon or trim. It is wise to make your new shade length plenty long to allow some of the shade to remain on the roller when it is down.

Finish or trim your new shade as you desire and then carefully staple it to the roller, being absolutely certain that you are getting it on straight so that it will roll right. A hem at or near the shade bottom is needed for the wooden pull; make the hem 2" wide.

A few tips: iron-on interfacing applied to thin fabric will give it more body and opaqueness. Or you can glue the fabric directly to the old shade if it is in good condition; use rubber cement or white glue. A good quality tape can be used to attach the shade to the roller instead of using staples. Vinyl cloth also makes a good window shade; sheets are good to use if you are backing it with the old shade or pella.

Finish off your fancy new window covering with an awning or valance, pull-back or straight curtains, or some other trim that is uniquely yours. Friends will surely ask where you came up with such an attractive window treatment, and you can proudly say, "I made it myself!"

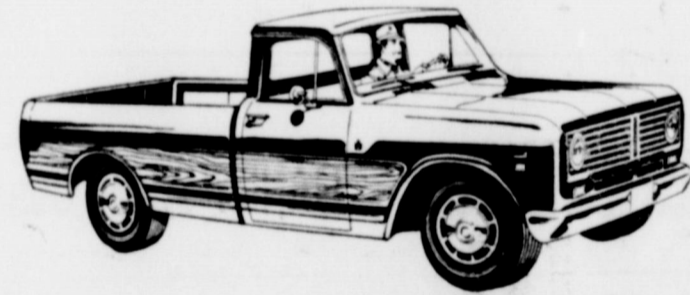
