United Fund Drive Near \$3,300 Goal

Cross Plains area United Fund was only \$119.63 short of a record \$3,300.00 goal shortly before noon Tuesday.

The UF campaign began Friday, Oct. 6, with a door-to-door canvass by 45 local women volunteers under direction of Mrs. Peyton Smith, drive chairman.

It was thought by Mrs. Smith and Jimmielee Payne, United Fund president, that the all-time high goal would still be reached if persons who were missed by the volunteers would leave contributions at the Citizens State Bank.

"We are so close," Mrs. Smith said, "that it would be a shame not to attain the goal." She genuinely thanked all persons who were so generous with gifts and time working in the drive, and said, "If I had to put my hopes for next year into four words, it would be enthusiastically for our community."

Payne agreed with Mrs. Smith and also thanked each worker and donor. "We are well pleased with the way the campaign has been received," he added.

It was noted that every worker has reported and turned in gifts, and only those who have not been contacted and wish to help in the drive are remaining to reach the goal.

The record \$3,300.00 goal was apportioned as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$700, Medical Research Foundation \$50, M. D. Anderson Hos-

pital Tumor Institute \$500, American Red Cross \$175, Salvation Army \$175, Texas Mental Health \$100, local and transient relief

\$500, Christmas cheer program \$300, Girl Scouts, local \$124, Girl Scouts, council, \$346.50, and allocated funds.

Bufs Test De Leon In District Opener Friday

All the marbles go on the line Friday as the Cross Plains Buffaloes and De Leon Bearcats do battle in the District 10-A opener for both teams.

The contest will be played in De Leon, and local fans are reminded that starting with District 10-A competition time of game changes to 7:30 p.m. instead of 8 p.m. as has been the case with the previous five non-conference games.

The Bearcats have been a disappointment thus far this season without a single victory. The unit has played some of the rougher area teams, however, and De Leon always proves tough for the Herd. The Bearcats are defending 10-A kings, and that is not a title the squad will relinquish easily.

Cross Plains and De Leon have not met a mutual foe this season in actual game condition. The Bearcats lost a decision to the Dublin Lions in the team's last outing. Buffaloes managed a scoreless tie with the Dublin team in the season's first scrimmage of the season.

That has been a long time ago, and much has happened to both teams since then. Friday's host soundly defeated the Bisons a year ago.

At least nine lettermen return from that unit which won the 10-A crown last year, and posted an 8-3 season mark, although graduation took its toll. Two backfield standouts return to the Cats in Quarterback Gary Park, 150 pounder, and Tailback John Swirt, 155 pounder. Sterling quality returns in 180-pound Robert Gilder, who is a superb tackle.

Other bearcats back this season with experience under belts include; Buzzy Mahan, 150 pound center, Gary Dodd, 160 pound guard, Bud Golden, 210 pound tackle, Myron Adams, 160 pound tackle, and Jeff Brinson, 165 pound fullback.

Cross Plains has not beaten a De Leon unit in many years on the football field, and Friday's contest should be quite a battle between the conquerors and the victims of past seasons.

Cisco Rebuffs Good Herd Effort In Non-Loop Finale

A beefy host Cisco Lobo team downed Cross Plains Buffaloes 20-6 last Friday night before a large gathering of Cross Plains backers.

The fine crowd of Cross Plains fans weren't dissatisfied with their favorite sons losing as score might imply, for the local Herd was beaten by a 204-pound quarterback, a 220-pound fullback and a couple of average-sized whizkid halfbacks. Boosting the husky backfield effort were several linemen of equal tonage.

The Class AA Loboes, with eyes on a district crown, knew they had played a ball game following the win, however, for during course of play five of their beefy benchmen were sent to the bench by the smaller, but hard-hitting Herdsmen.

A tough and stingy Buff defense held the Lobo rushing attack to only 28 yards in the second half, and a quick-to-learn Buffalo secondary put the basically passing team hosts on the minus side for Lobo second half aerial endeavors.

Buffalo fullback Rod Renfro led the local offense, rushing for 109 yards on 21 carries, or an average of 5.2 yards per tote. In this net was a 30-yard blast which set up Herd's score in final period of play.

Cisco opened up their scoring on their first offensive play of the contest when Quarterback Billy Erwin flexed his strong passing arm to speedy End Darryl Adams. The TD play covered some 65 yards, and ended first quarter scoring after the kick for extras failed. Second quadrant gave Lobos

their remaining points, on a 20-yard pass play from Erwin to End Pepper Puryear for six and the other touchdown on a 26-yard pass play from Erwin to End David Fears with no go on either extra point trip.

Two more points, finishing Cisco scoring, were tallied by the Loboes in the second period when a Buffalo quick kick was blocked and recovered in the end zone. Remainder of first half displayed two fumble turnovers by Loboes and Buffaloes losing possession on one fumble.

Bisons came out mean in second half, defensively tough and offensively dominate. Third neither team scored, in third period, Buffaloes had 21 offensive plays compared to only nine for the Loboes. Fourth quarter comparison shows Bisons to have handled the oval about equal to offensive tries for the Cisco unit.

Buffaloes scored early in the fourth quarter after possession was gained on the Herd 48 when Linebacker C. B. Hutchins sacked a Lobo fullback. Renfro ran for a fiveyard gain, and Halfback Rex Mayes ran for a 12-yard gain which found the Herd on the Lobo 32. Renfro blasted out a 30-yard, crowd-raising run to the two and Buffaloes were in the doorway for their single score of the evening. Score came on a two-yard plunge by Renfro, and a pass attempt for two extra was incomplete.

Several big plays were made by Buffalo defense, none, however, developing into a score. In fourth quarter Tackle Lynn Koenig got a piece of a Lobo fourth down punt, and Tackle Larry Tatom came up with ball on the Lobo 35. In third period action Buffalo Safety Donny Dillard intercepted a Lobo pass giving the Herd another chance that wasn't developed.

Buffalo Head Coach Don Lee said that he was pleased with the unit showed good spirit through the contest. Lee lauded Dillard, Koenig, Renfro and Mayes as defensive stalwarts.

The loss left the Herd's record on three wins and two losses going into district play.

Amendments 7 And 8 Explained

Editor's Note: Here are analyses of Amendments No. 7 and 8, to the Texas Constitution, which will be voted on in the General Election, Nov. 7. These brief analyses are intended to be unbiased.

You will vote FOR or AGAINST:

Amendment No. 7, amending Article I of the Texas Constitution by adding a new Section 3a to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged, because of a person's sex, race, color, creed or national origin.

Proponents say that protection afforded by constitutional guar-

antees is more effective than statutory prohibitions and the repeal or amendments of discriminatory statutes. Victims of discrimination need the right to use the judicial process to challenge the constitutionality of discriminatory legislation.

They believe that discrimination exists in many fields, and only an equal rights amendment can change the status quo.

Opponents contend that unnecessary because discriminatory laws existing may be repealed by statute and adoption of this proposal could result in confusion and litigation as to the meaning of "discrimination."

Amendment No. 8, would amend Article IV, Sections 4, 22 and 23, of the Texas Constitution, to provide for four-year terms for the offices of governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, treasurer, commissioner of the general land office, secretary of state and certain statutory state offices.

Proponents believe that this change would give state officers sufficient time to master func-

tions of office before embarking on a reelection campaign, and by spending less time campaigning, officials would be able to devote greater energy to their prescribed duties.

They say that this change becoming effective with the general election in 1974, an off-presidential election year, the proposed amendment would perpetuate elections for state office in non-presidential years, and generate greater interest in state politics.

They feel that this change is needed, too, because of the high costs of seeking election to offices.

Opponents feel that long terms of office tend to alienate the official from the electorate, making him less responsive to the rise and fall of public opinion. They say that officials forced to campaign biennially are under almost constant exposure to the wishes and needs of the people.

They contend that too much power is inherent in four-year terms, and say that a governor serving two terms under a four year system would be in a position, through appointments to dominate every state board and commission.

They state that long tenure in office and political corruption run hand in hand. They feel that four years would be too long to retain a poor public official and state that good public officials are usually retained in office as long as they continue to serve the public well.

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**Brazos Basin Gets
 Large Federal Grant**

Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$75,000,000 Environmental Protection Agency grant to the Brazos River Authority for Water Quality Management Planning.

Purpose of the study is to develop a basin-wide water quality management plan for the Brazos Basin and adjoining coastal areas, comprising about one-sixth of the area of Texas. Callahan County is one of 68 in the Basin. The study is to be financed half by State and local funds and half by this federal grant, under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.

The urgency of developing such a plan has been emphasized by federal regulations requiring that sewage systems built with federal assistance in the future must be consistent with basin-wide water quality management plans; if such basin-wide plans are not in existence, the proposed sewage treatment facilities will not be eligible for federal grants to assist in paying construction costs.
